University of North Carolina at Charlotte, NC, Features Works by Margarette Joyner

University of North Carolina at Charlotte, NC, is presenting *A Legacy of Elegance*, featuring works by Margarette Joyner, on view at the Projective Eye Gallery, at the UNC-Charlotte Center City Building, Uptown Charlotte, through July 16, 2024. A reception will be held on Apr. 4, from 6-8pm.

A Legacy of Elegance places twelve historically-inspired costumes by fiber artist, Margarette Joyner, in conversation with archival portraiture from the 19th century, curated by Kimberly Annece Henderson. Drawing upon trends in formal attire spanning several centuries, Joyner merges traditional and contemporary African textiles with cowry shell embellishments; thus, reimagining high-society garments iconography of cultural significance across many African-descended populations. The interwoven narrative of fashioned textiles and early-format photography pays homage to a rich legacy of self-expression through dress, connecting visual histories past and present.

This collection of garments is a testament to who I have become and embraces the legacy of my ancestors. Like me, the modern fabrics are rich, layered, deep, strong

and multifaceted. The African prints, like my ancestors, are bold, grounded, strong, daring and resilient. Each garment is embellished with cowry shells which were and are used in the African culture to indicate wealth and nobility. These historical garments tell the untold story of descendants of the African American people who were steeped in elegance and grace. My calling was to merge the past with the present so that all will know that we have been, still are and always will be, ROYALTY.

Chaplin is a first-generation student and Bachelor of Arts candidate with a focus in printmaking. She centers her work around current trends originated by black women as a way of highlighting cultural appropriation. As a black woman and a member of GenZ, her work embraces and celebrates these trends, and simultaneously reflects her own experiences of microaggressions and appropriation.

To participate in the optional honors Senior Thesis Exhibition, students must apply in their junior year and have at least a 3.25 GPA in art. Selected students partake in a rigorous program of independent work, group critiques, and a required professional practices component, which culminates in their final group exhibition.

The Art Department at Guilford College is a fine arts studio program, which provides an in-depth experience in making images and formulating and crafting ideas. Painting, Drawing, Printmaking, Sculpture, Photography, and Ceramics are the primary focus areas. Meyer Vogl Gallery in Charleston, SC, will present *GOOD ON PAPER: Group Exhibition*, on view from Apr. 5 - 26, 2024. A reception will be held on Apr. 5, from 5-8pm.

Curated by Gallery Director Katie Geer, GOOD ON PAPER will be the third inception of this group exhibition in which gallery artists are invited to submit works on paper. Some of these artists often work on paper and others typically do not. This year's GOOD ON PAPER, however, is reenvisioned by Katie Geer and promises to showcase works on paper in a new light.

"We've done works-on-paper shows before, but they were usually pretty openended, lacking any guidelines or direction," says Geer. "This time, I have a more distinct vision."

Gallery artists Marissa Vogl, Marc Hanson, Christopher St. Leger and Kathleen Jones were asked to each create 4 works on paper. All 16 paintings will be done on 30x22-inch paper and framed in white. They will be displayed side by side during the show.
