One of our friends in the Carolina Visual Art community is hurting and needs your help. They had a flood and it did more damage than they were insured for. The gallery has served the Upstate South Carolina and Western North Carolina area and its artists for over 40 years. They have shown work by many of the best artists in the region, some for the first time, and now they need your help. Give them a call or send an email and ask them how you can help - write a check, donate some artwork, whatever you can, so we can get back to telling you about the next great exhibit they are presenting. They are not asking for your help, but I will for them. Read about how they are on the mend.

After The Flood...upstairs [artspace] in Tryon, NC, Is On The Mend...

We hope you have been wondering what is happening at upstairs [artspace], Tryon, NC's oldest art gallery.



We've been closed for renovations since September 2021 because water pipes broke and flooded the entire three-level gallery. causing more than \$100,000 worth of damage. We hope to reopen this June or July.



As if the COVID pandemic was not bad enough! Thank goodness we had insurance, even though it will not cover the cost of the entire renovation.


"It has been a most difficult time," Board of Trustees Treasurer Patti Trobaugh said. "We thought being closed because of the pandemic was a problem. What we are calling 'The Great Flood' made matters so much worse. But there's a light at the end of the tunnel, and with a lot more hard work and a little luck, we once again exhibit the finest contemporary art to be found locally and regionally."

As you can see from the photos there was a great deal of water damage to the floors and walls. The entire kitchen is being replaced, as well as much of the hardwood floors. The problem started after a Saturday night reception: After everyone went home, pipes leading to the hot water heater broke, and the water ran freely until it was discovcontinued above on next column to the right

ered on Tuesday. Extensive damage was done on the main top level and the lower gallery. Actually, water made its way to the basement.

"Because we were closed for so long and had employee turnover, we are having to rebuild some of our processes, such as the website, social media, donor management, even our telephone services," Trobaugh said. "We ask that the public and our patrons be patient as we re-establish these routine office and management systems. As we continue toward reopening, we'll keep everyone updated."



The Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art will present works from Colo American artist Nancy Friedemann-Sánchez with the exhibit, Nancy Friedemann-Sánchez: Pinturas De Casta and the Construction of American Identity. Friedemann-Sánchez's paintings reference casta painting, a genre popularized in eighteenthcentury Spanish Colonial Central and South America that purported to depict a racial and social taxonomy of children born of racially mixed couplings.

Friedemann-Sánchez's contemporary casta paintings take inspiration from this problematic genre to reflect on the legacy of colonialism that lingers in the racial and social discrimination and marginalization present in her home country of Colombia and here in the United States. The paintings feature life-size tracings of female bodies adorned with floral imagery lifted from both the indigenous resin technique of mopa mopa and Spanish colonial iconography. Masks from across Latin America and the Caribbean are included to represent stereotypes born of colonial-era mixed-race classifications that continue to perpetuate

Nancy Friedemann-Sánchez is a Colombo-American, mid-career artist with an interdisciplinary practice. She grev Colombia as the child of a Colombian and a United States citizen and migrated to the US as an adult. Her art is about the curious and intense experience of having physically migrated, yet still having a piece of herself rooted in Colombia. She is creating an intersectional feminist visual novel that is a multifaceted project comprised of paintings, sculptures, objects, and mixed media that together—and in different voices—weave a synchronicity of dialogues, passages, and punctuations about hybridity and cultural ownership.

Friedemann-Sánchez is in the Elizabeth A. Sackler Center for Feminist Art; she participated at the 20 Congreso Internacional: La Experiencia Intelectual de las Mujeres en el Siglo XXI in 2012 in Mexico City. Shows include Utah Museum of Contemporary Art, The Nerman Museum of Contemporary Art, Museum of Contemporary Art, North Miami, Blue Star Contemporary, The Bemis Center for Contemporary Arts, La Bienal de Cuenca, Ecuador, Sheldon Museum of Art at the University of Nebraska, continued on Page 9

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College of Charleston in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Kukuli Velarde & Nancy Friedemann-Sánchez

The College of Charleston in Charleston SC, will present two new exhibits including: Kukuli Velarde - CORPUS, on view from May 13 through July 16 and *Nancy* Friedemann-Sánchez: Pinturas De Casta and the Construction of American Identity, on view from May 13 through July 16, at the Halsey Institute of Contemporary Art. A reception for both exhibits will be held on May 13, from 6:30-8pm.

The Halsey Institute will debut Peruvian American artist Kukuli Velarde's CORPUS project in its entirety for the first time. CORPUS is comprised of ceramic and fabric works that encourage reflection on the meaning of survival in the face of colonialism. Fifteen ceramic sculptures, each with matching tapestries, will be presented in a symbolic representation of the annual Corpus Christi festival in Cusco, Perú.

The sculptures reference indigenous pre-Columbian forms and iconographies in a visual representation of syncretic aesthetic, cultural, and religious traditions. CORPUS engages with and confronts Perú's Spanish colonial past, asserting that pre-Columbian sacred entities and the worldview they inhabit were not vanquished by Spanish conquerors, but instead cleverly blended with their Catholic counterparts, ensuring their survival. So too, have the diverse peoples of Perú and greater Latin America formed and reformed political, religious, and cultural identity in the shadow of centuries-long oppression. Velarde's CORPUS asks viewers to consider this resilience via her stunningly detailed and humorously thought-provoking work.

Kukuli Velarde is a Peruvian American artist based in Philadelphia, PA. She is a Page 6 - Carolina Arts, May 2022

Much of her work draws on pre-Columbian traditional forms and iconographies, highlighting colonized and syncretic identities and aesthetic systems. Velarde received a BFA from Hunter College in New York City. She is the recipient of such awards as the John Simon Guggenheim Fellowship (2015), Pollock-Krasner Foundation grant (2012), and Joan Mitchell Foundation grant (1997). Charleston County Public Library in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Susan Davis Trott

The Charleston County Public Library in downtown Charleston, SC, will present Closed for Business, featuring works by Susan Davis Trott, on view in the Saul Alexander Gallery at the library's main branch, from May 1 - 31, 2022.

The exhibit will feature architectural paintings from an archive of photographs taken over a period of decades by Trott and will be her first one person show. Trott moved to Charleston in the late 70's to take a job teaching art in the public schools.

She began photographing local architecture, particularly, the commercial district of upper King Street. Back then parts of downtown were struggling, with unrestored, dilapidated buildings and empty storefronts. She was fascinated by the faded colors, peeling paint, hand lettered signs and rich architectural detail. Photographing buildings became a passion she shared with her husband, fellow teacher and Charleston native, Joseph (Jody) R. Trott Ill. Growing up downtown, he shared with her his lifelong love and vast knowledge of historic preservation.

As the face of upper King Street began to change rapidly, she chose some favorites to paint like the Old Railway Warehouse and the American Theater as it appeared boarded up for many years, and the White Swan Laundry facade demolished in 1995, after generating much controversy between the BAR and the owner. Trott's interest in these buildings is mostly from an artistic point of view and the visual changes they have gone through over the years. Currently she has become less concerned with accuracy and more focused on color and the arrangement of shapes.

Over the years she has painted and sold paintings of architecture and other subject matter locally and nationally. An early watercolor of the Jax Beer sign on the side of a Cumberland Street building won the first

More recently she has become known for her collages of figures and an occasional building. Mcleod Plantation with its simple shapes of cabins is a favorite place to paint as well as the battery. Her love of local architecture remains strong after decades of change.

She attended the art school at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond, VA, and graduated from Winthrop College with the first BFA, (then called Bachelor of Visual Arts) from then new department head, artist and mentor, Edmund Lewandowski, a noted member of the American Precisionist Movement. She later earned an M. Ed from the Citadel and MLIS from USC in Columbia. More recently she names abstract artists Catherine Kehoe and Ken Kewley as being most influential in her current direction. She is a member of the Charleston Artist Collective.

Ella W. Richardson Fine Art in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Renee Levin

Ella W. Richardson Fine Art in Charleston, SC, will present Renee Levin: Riches from the Sea, on view from May 6 through June 2, 2022.

Levin's compositions sometimes read like musical notes; at other times like a single chord. They strike with singularity, as such commonplace findings - sea shells, for instance - are suddenly writ large, as on a 5' x 4' panel.

"I wanted the viewer to be forced to examine the details of the subject painted, get intimate with it, therefore scale allows me to do so," she said. "Scale allows the textures to come forth along with celebrating the beauty of the subjects - the natural patterns. the beautiful lines and curves, sometimes reminding me of the feminine form."

Levin considers her work still life, and the finished pieces belie her painstaking process. "Initially, I set up a photoshoot using shells from my found collection. creating compositions for the painting at hand This is a very time consuming process as I want the composition to look natural but flow and please the eye. I can turn a shell 50 times in one-degree increments to get it right," said Levin. "This process is worth it all as I believe the composition is a big draw to my work. The photoshoots also allow me to work with lighting to create dramatic shadow play. Once a composition is set, I use the photograph in combination with the actual shells, for those intimate details a

painting," she said. "I like to experiment with the arrangement of the object(s), creating a composition that feels right, with the perfect amount of negative space along with movement. However, when painting singular objects, it could very well fall into the portrait genre I suppose," adds Levin. "As a portrait glorifies a human, I do the same but with an object such as a shell, acknowledging my admiration for the subject."

Levin selects shells based on their imperfections, shapes, and patterns and the shadows they cast, she said. Hinged clams are a favorite as they have character and create dramatic shadows. "The scallop has been catching my eye with its beautiful ribbed pattern, oysters with their textures and cracked whelks alike," she said.

Combining polish with grit is a recurring theme in Levin's work. "It is that juxtaposition that actually creates a harmony for me," she said. It also turns up outside of the studio - in "my home, my clothing, pretty much anything I create.'

After retiring, Lake earned his Masters in Art Education and began painting, exhibiting, and teaching art in Tennessee, where he won numerous awards in juried shows. 



The exhibit features a series of metal sculptures of flowers in varying stages of blooming. 

Local artists decorated 32 large fiberglass-composite bass fish that were displayed around town and ultimately auctioned to raise funds for the Arts Center's new home: The Arts Center Warehouse. The project was so popular with the public that "Fish Out of Water 2" was launched and 30 more giant bass were released.

Another venture - this one permanent and well known to local citizens - is the downtown sculpture of William Church Whitner by Zan Wells. It honors the man responsible for bringing power to "The Electric City." The AAC secured funding from the Duke Energy Foundation, with the county installing the piece on Whitner Street near the courthouse - an illustration of the many partnerships the AAC has become known for fostering. An emphasis on outdoor art has continued with SculpTOUR, a part of the annual juried show. Artists are invited to submit entries for the honor of adding additional outdoor art to downtown.

Additional public art projects and collaborations continued, including the bronze Carolina wrens by Zan Wells placed throughout downtown to help tell stories of historical structures; the Mural on Main at the corner of Main and Orr streets designed by Anderson native Herman Keith, with dozens of volunteers help paint it; a community garden and mural project at the Arts Center; and the Church Street Heritage Project, an installation that tells the story of local black business pioneers. The park features story boxes by Scott Foster, Josh Davis, Sharon Jones, and Diann Simms. Stone benches created to look like people called "Story Tellers" were created by an internationally known sculptor from Colorado, Madeline Weiner.

The Warehouse

As programming grew, the AAC needed more space, as well as greater accessibility. The nearby P&N Railway warehouse, built in 1904 for railway storage, had long stood vacant. Located directly behind the Arts Center, it seemed to meet the AAC's need perfectly. A capital campaign kicked off in 2001 and ultimately raised \$4.2 million for purchase and renovation of the warehouse. The Arts Center moved into the new location in 2006 and expanded into 33,000 square feet. This was the first private-public partnership in the community involving the Arts Center, the city and the county, and this collaboration served as a catalyst for downtown development. (The city maintains the parking lot, and the county built and operates a Farmers Market at the site.)

The warehouse houses not only the Arts Center but also leases to tenants, including The Market Theater, Visit Anderson, the Bay3 Artisan Gallery, Sounds of Carolina Music Academy, Renaissance Interiors, McKay Zorn & Associates Architects, and Living Hope Presbyterian Church. Gallery space is also rented out for special events such as weddings, receptions, and private parties.

With the new, larger home, the Arts Center's budget morphed from \$200,000 to \$400,000 and more. It truly became the cultural hub of downtown Anderson.

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The Future

As the AAC celebrates its 50th year, it is stronger than ever. A new capital campaign aims to retire the remaining \$50,000 debt on the warehouse. Much needed maintenance has also been completed, with roof renovations, refinished gallery floors, and improved HVAC service.



The Anderson Arts Center is home to Bay 3 Artisan Gallery, a cooperative of 15 artists.

A master plan to study a renovation of the Historic Carnegie Library Building, which currently houses the AAC's permanent collection and is used for artist studio space and special event rentals, has received grant funding. The goal is to make better use of the space and incorporate it into the warehouse

Fundraising still includes the annual auction, although it has been moved to August for less competition with other fall events and will now focus exclusively on artwork to better highlight the talent of the local art community. Additional fundraising includes a dinner wine tasting and an art market associated with the annual juried show.



A mural focusing on healthy eating painted on the Arts Center Warehouse, which is located beside the county farmer's market, is a new addition to public art coordinated by the Arts Center.

A new afterschool art studio offers classes for budding artists. A variety of classes are offered for adults as well. While the Anderson Arts Center hosts about ten shows a year in its main gallery, additional shows featuring younger and newer artists are held in the Atrium Gallery on the lower level to encourage their involvement and introduce them to the community.

Community outreach efforts have brought art to the Westside Community Center, an Alzheimer's disease respite program, and a special needs adult daycare group. The goal is to expose as many people as possible to the joys of art. Extra effort is also being made to make the Anderson Arts Center inviting and accessible for everyone.

At age 50, the Anderson Arts Center is more vibrant and inclusive than ever.



Photo by CT Weiss Improvements came quickly as staff pried plywood off boarded-up windows in the rear of the building, tacked linen and carpeting on the walls, covered the fireplace, and removed the steam radiators.

Donations from the community helped fund these improvements. Later, further gallery renovations came after a check for \$64,000 arrived, an unexpected gift from the estate of Maude Barton. Ms. Barton had actually worked across the street at the Calhoun Hotel when that building housed the Chamber of Commerce.

Many changes followed, including the launch of an endowment and the start of a permanent art collection. The number of exhibitions increased, donations for juried show awards grew, and fundraisers like the annual auction of art, items and services kicked off and grew steadily grander, with themes like "Club Hollywood" and "Fire and Ice." "Artlantis" featured a 50-ton sand sculpture and "Fire and Ice: A Glassical Affair" celebrated the art of Dale Chihuly, a world renowned glass artist. The décor included a replica glass ceiling honoring the Chihuly-created glass ceiling of the Bellagio Hotel in Las Vegas.



The Arts Center is known for offering exceptional programs for youth, including summer camps, After School Art Studio and Youth Art Month which reaches students throughout the entire county.

Greenville County Museum of Art in Greenville, SC, Features Works by Jasper Johns and Andrew Wyeth

Tiger Strikes Asteroid Greenville,

The Greenville County Museum of Art in Greenville, SC, has recently reopened after renovations with an ongoing exhibition Jasper Johns + Andrew Wyeth: Repeat Until Empty, featuring eight original works by Jasper Johns and eleven seldom exhibited paintings by Andrew Wyeth.

Jasper Johns (born 1930) is the world's most critically acclaimed living artist. His work bridges the immediate post-World War II modernist trends of Surrealism and Abstract Expressionism with subsequent movements of the 1960s, including Pop art, Minimalism, and Conceptual art.

Drawn from the Museum's extensive holdings of the artist's work, this exhibition includes only original works. Throughout his career, Johns has recast flags, targets, and other borrowed subjects, and in the process he has transformed both the images and their potential meaning. The works by Johns include examples of encaustic, oil and watercolor, as well as a monotype and an Aquarelle crayon drawing. All works are untitled and range from 1987 to 1996.

Andrew Wyeth (1917 - 2009), regarded as one of the most important American artists of the 20th century, launched his career in 1937 with a sold-out exhibition of his watercolors in New York.

Throughout his lengthy and prolific career, Wyeth focused on two locations:

Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania, his birthplace, and Cushing, Maine, his second home since childhood. Drawing inspiration from the distinctive characteristics of these locations, he revealed universal attributes in his depic tions of landscapes, objects, and people. Wyeth's preference for painting intimate subjects, including his family, his homes, his memories, and his favorite models is evident in this selection of work from a private collection. Seldom exhibited publicly, these paintings include ten watercolors and one egg tempera, ranging from 1964 to 2005.

Regula, a South Carolina native and graduate of Winthrop University, says the exhibit "is who I am - a little quirky, passionate about nature, passionate about how all the races must learn to live and help each other, curious about life beyond our now, and, most of all, hopeful.'



the paint. One experimentation has led to this exhibit of 60 pieces. It is all mixed media work with string somewhere in each piece. Some are colorful but others are more somber in tone.'

Regula has been an art educator in schools from the foothills of South Carolina to the coast, and she briefly worked in Atlanta, using her art educator experience in designing computer-based manuals and training programs. In 1983, she married her husband, Dennis, and moved back to South Carolina, and since has pursued a career as a professional artist. "My work can be found in private, corporate and museum collections, and I have won awards in various regional juried competitions. I also have had solo and group exhibitions throughout the Upstate.

"I cannot remember a time that I did not make 'stuff,'" Regula says. "My hands have always been busy twisting wire, tearing paper and in general just making things. I come from a family of people who used their hands to build houses, work gardens and make clothes. I never really had an art lesson until I went to Winthrop, but I knew that I wanted to major in art and learn everything they could teach me. It was while in college that I met professional artists and realized that this was what I wanted - to be an artist. After college, I always worked on my art, mostly pen and ink, but to survive I had to find a job. Teaching was the obvious choice. This left me with very little time and energy to pursue my dream of a professional artist. It was not until I married an understanding man, that my dream began to come true."

"Since 1983 my real life began," she continues "This exhibit is dedicated to my husband, Dennis Regula. He has made it possible for me to be me."

Most of the works in the exhibition will be available for purchase, with prices ranging from \$250 to \$3,000.



The Sumter County Gallery of Art in Sumter, SC, is presenting two new exhibits including: Be One Traveler, featuring works by Thomas Washington the Younger and Overwhelmed and Spellbound, featuring works by Jordan Sheridan, both on view through June 24, 2022.

Thomas Washington the Younger is a Columbia-based multimedia artist who was born in Springfield, MA, and grew up in a restrictive Pentecostal family, Washington has pursued art in one form or another since early childhood. After his father was laid off, the family headed to South Carolina. Washington finished his education at Columbia High School. After that, he joined the military, entered the working life, and eventually started a family. He and his wife, Kenyatta, have two children. Washington's jobs along the way have varied - everything from manual labor and telemarketing to truck driver.

Washington believes that perhaps the most important pursuit of an artist is the facilitation of Escapism. He approaches each painting as a Narnian door...or that lamppost beyond, coaxing a wanderer into another realm. Since his childhood, he has produced works from this perspectivefrom being hired (out of high school) to illustrate in a local graphic anthology, he strives to tell stories in every medium; to breathe life into the fantastical by imbuing it with the familiar...and to find fun and fulfillment along the way.

Washington entertains all sorts of creative notions - the importance of world peace, an unshakeable belief in fundamenta similarities that make Humanity one big family and strong opinions on interstellar travel.

Washington's latest paintings, even his experimentation with watercolor, tend to be very focused pieces of work. Washington the Younger sees his subjects as both mythic and contemporary. Like the knights of old, they are fighting their own battles, but they are also in a present-day reality where the deck is stacked against them.

Moving on from his first medium of colored pencils and paper to the next level came about as a challenge from Kenyatta: "I need you to make a bigger splash this time," he recalls her saying. "Here's your canvas, here's your paint. Do something." The work that has emerged draws from many sources - not just the working life of someone trying to keep a roof over his head, but also someone who's upbringing emphasized that eternal damnation was not an idle concept.

He doesn't sound mournful or melodramatic. For Washington, the paintings are simply a reflection of inner reality. He hasn't completely left his past behind. It's right there in his chosen name, an appellation he likes both because it's archaic and because it's true. "I am a lot like my father," he offers. I'm the prodigal son, as they would say," he reflects. I'm Thomas the Younger.²

painting, sculpture and installation as she explores the visual dimensions of identity and motherhood. Sheridan received her Master of Fine Arts degree from the University of South Carolina in 2021, and her Bachelor of Fine Arts in Painting from the College of Charleston in 2011. Her awards include the Graduate Studio Art Research Award from the University of South Carolina, and a residency at Stormwater Studios in Columbia, SC. Sheridan has volunteered for three years with the Amigo Skate Nonprofit; collecting, organizing and transporting skateboard equipment to Cuban youth in Havana. Through this organization she has developed intimate relationships and a deep passion and appreciation for the culture of Cuba.

Sheridan has a three-year-old son, Samuel, who enjoys monster trucks and being outdoors. Her 2021 thesis exhibition at the University of SC's McMaster Gallery, The Mother, a painting and textile installation focuses on her identities as a mother and artist. Her woven installations hover over a gallery space like a vibrantly colored spider web. The fibrous mass is meant to represent, in the artist's own words, the 'stretching, fragmenting, shifting" nature of the relationship between mother and child. The pieces can also send off danger signals (like a spider's web) warning of a sticky, impenetrable entanglement - such as motherhood.

Sheridan observes: "I imagine the maternal experience as an enveloping, polymorphous mass that is ever stretching, fracturing, and shifting. This body of work documents, communicates, and aestheticizes my personal experience of being a mother to my young son, Samuel. Through painting and installation, I visually communicate the paradox of feeling both overwhelmed and spellbound as a mother, of reconnecting the fragmented pieces of my identity, while the boundaries between Samuel and myself are often blurred. My paintings and installation inform each other, the crocheted installation is a 3-dimensional extension of my painting practice with its own unique and deliberate mark making and form, its woven structure accosts and envelops the viewer to situate them in my position and identity as the mother. My paintings are made through a close examination of the installation and how it exists and behaves in space."

Sheridan currently resides in Columbia, SC, with her partner, Ian and son, Samuel. They recently welcomed a daughter Kora in early March.

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Blue Spiral 1 Gallery in Asheville, NC, Offers New Exhibits

Blue Spiral 1 Gallery in Asheville, NC, will present new exhibitions, on view from May 6 through June 22, 2022.

In the Main Gallery will be the exhibit, TOPO, which considers topography as explored by artists working in different contexts, media and locations. 
Josh Copus, Will Dickert, Judith Duff, Candice Hensley, Matt Jones, Eric Knoche, and David Stuempfle.

Founder, John Cram (1948 - 2020), opened Blue Spiral 1 on New Year's Eve of 1990 with a vision of creating a home for the many artists who had settled in the region in the mid-to-late 20th century. Additionally, he needed a suitable space to exhibit the recently acquired estate of Southern Modernist, Will Henry Stevens (1881 - 1949)

At the time Cram opened Blue Spiral 1, Asheville was a shell of itself. Having suffered through the post-industry recession, downtown buildings were boarded up and artists were moving to the area because the rent was cheap and the scenery inspiring. Cram recognized a need, took a chance, and made an investment that altered the trajectory of visual culture in Asheville. What was once a defunk radio supply shop flanked by an adult theatre and plumbing supply store, is now one of the largest and busiest galleries in the South. Three decades later, Blue Spiral 1 is the heart of a booming art scene in downtown Asheville.

For 30 years, Blue Spiral 1 has exhibited work by artists and makers in a three-story, multi-gallery setting. Maintaining a diverse and extensive exhibition schedule, the gallery presents over 25 shows annually. Thematic group exhibitions and individual artist showcases rotate in the Main and Lower Level galleries every other month, while the gallery's Upper Level features a wide array of works by over 100 represented artists.





Even though I despise chaotic living myself, I believe my paintings reflect our overloaded contemporary lifestyle," adds Genka

"It is ironic that now I am inspired by the beauty of Japan as well, and I consider my personal culture to be a fusion or hybrid of both east and west. Since I was born and raised in the east, Okinawa Japan, I carry with me sensibilities and traits from my early years of development from an eastern perspective. I have now lived in the west for a little more than half my life. Although



I pursue the best from both these cultural experiences, I often struggle internally with battles caused by significant differences. Today, cultures are much more homogenized than they were during my youth. I wonder, is this a good transition or are we all losing our uniqueness?"

"My perspective on east and west is that eastern cultures are nurtured or controlled by nature, while in the west, cultures predominantly aim at controlling nature. Both seem to have certain advantages, as well as disadvantages. To live in peace with myself, optimistically, I need to accept and adopt these differences and celebrate the enriched life as my reward," says Genka.

"During the past 30 years, globalization has accelerated exponentially and brought nuch richness and abundance to human civilization. Again, I cannot help wondering f we are approaching one global 'value,' and is that value moving toward conformity and a more bland, universal society?"

"Today, most urban environments look and feel the same no matter where in the world one is located. And seldom do we visit a new place that does not offer almost any style, cuisine, and fashion, from all distant and local cultures."

"As I am processing my thoughts and translating them into my paintings, I am asking myself what can I extract from the complexities of our environment that present a true sense of harmony in our world? There is a simplicity in the foundations I am drawn to and inspired by, such as color, 'architectural' spaces, and society's rich need to communicate. With every mark I make, I am responding to the past (history) and present, as well as the influence these two aspects will have on our future. These circumstances, that is my Asian origin leading to living in the west, have inspired my exhibition's title: East (past), West (present), and Beyond (future fusion)."





The Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, is presenting *Make* Room for Iov feat Hope, Jude Lobe, and Alice Levinson, on view through May 22, 2022.

"Is it an odd technique that makes and breaks and mends to create objects?" asks glass artist Susan Hope. That is how her artwork is created. Broken pieces of colored glass are fired together to become sheets that are then broken up, sorted and fired again to become images with depth and beauty that one layer alone can never achieve. In the heat of the kiln, under the pressure of gravity the broken glass becomes again a beautiful and stable structure.

"In making these pieces" says Hope, 'I was reminded that brokenness is not an ending if there is a willingness to learn, yield and change. It isn't an odd technique really, it is how Life changes us. Applied to our personal lives or to our world at large, we can be encouraged that the brokenness, pressure, and sifting we encounter will produce a glorious transformation if we trust in the process with an open heart and make room for Joy."



North Carolina State University in Raleigh, NC, is presenting Across the Threshold of India – Photographs by Martha Strawn, on view in the Robert K. Black and J. Ormond Sanderson Gallery, at the Gregg Museum of Art & Design, through Nov. 12, 2022.

Sarasvati, Hindu goddess of the arts and knowledge, surrounds and permeates the mysteries of spice, taste, and art in Indian culture. One practice in honoring her spiritual foundation is to sanctify the space between physical and spiritual existence by the creation of evanescent drawings, which are typically made of rice flour carefully sprinkled on the ground in transitional spaces to create intricate patterns. Martha Strawn, visual ecologist and photographer, has documented the practice of making these "threshold drawings" (kolam or rangoli), and presents them at NC State's Gregg Museum of Art & Design in Across the Threshold of India—Photographs by Martha Strawn.

The designs have captivated her for over thirty years, resulting in image after image of these special diagrams drawn on the actual thresholds of Indian homes. They are usually created by the women of the family, and serve to symbolize the separation of secular and sacred spaces, and as a protection from evil, ill will or bad luck. The designs, often based on natural forms, may be used to separate rooms within a house, a home from the street, or a business from the bustle of the surrounding world. The patterns, which are often quite intricate, can often be found in other examples of Indian vernacular art such as tapestries, rugs, cloth, and architecture. The exhibition will include a selection of Strawn's photographs enhanced with examples of Indian culture and design from I the Gregg's permanent collection.

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, in Chapel Hill, NC, is presenting two new exhibits including: Modern Black Culture: The Art of Aaron Douglas, and Myth & Memory: Selected Works by the MFA Class of 2022, on view concurrently at Ackland Art Museum, through June 19, 2022.

Modern Black Culture explores how Aaron Douglas (1899-1979), one of the most important modernist artists of the Harlem Renaissance, gave visual form to the idea that Black American culture is a modern culture of diaspora. Douglas created figures embodying Pan-African ideas of Black achievement and creativity. He chronicled 20th century Black American culture and

able gift," Strawn says in the preface to her book. In addition to photography, Strawn has engaged in extensive research based on interviews with the women who make these diagrams, documenting Indian culture over a period of over thirty years.

Threshold designs may be created to mark a wide range of life's mileposts, such as fertility rituals, weddings, births, or deaths. Patterns and techniques are passed down through generations, from grandmother to granddaughter and vary from region to region. As Strawn has noted, "These diagrams are magical and mysterious in their complexity and in their simplicity."

Martha Strawn, a Professor of Art Emerita at the University of North Carolina in Charlotte, co-founded The Light Factory Contemporary Museum of Photography and Film, was a Fullbright fellow to India, and a National Endowment for the Arts fellow in photography. Her photographs have been exhibited worldwide, and in addition to the book, Across the Threshold of India. Art, Women and Culture, she is the author of Alligators: Prehistoric Presence in the American Landscape (1977), and (with Yi-Fu Tuan) Religion: From Place to Placelessness (2009).

tours, and a multimedia performance, God's Trombones, featuring songs, sermons, and the art of Aaron Douglas. This production by OnQ Performing Arts of Charlotte uses the text of James Weldon Johnson's 1927 work "God's Trombones: Seven Negro Sermons in Verse," digital projections of Aaron Douglas's original illustrations for the Johnson work on view in the exhibition, and a variety of gospel songs and spirituals arranged by Billboard History Maker Dennis Reed Jr. Two ticketed performances will be held at the Hayti Heritage Center, a cultural arts and arts education venue housed in the historic St. Joseph's AME Church in Durham.

In Myth & Memory: Selected Works by the MFA Class of 2022, five artists interrogate practices of history-making and history-keeping at the individual, institutional, and systemic level. Beginning with personal narrative, each artist engages a vocabulary of fantasy to make visible that which has been forgotten, obscured, or erased by white heteropatriarchal modes of dominance. Through intimate gestures and acts of subversion, they reframe the lens through which memory is archived to tell new stories from a restructured past. Their work imagines potential futures in which marginalized bodies are not under siege.

Participating artists are the five UNC-Chapel Hill Class of 2022 Master of Fine Arts in studio art candidates: Raj Bunnag, Charlie Dupee, Hugo Ljungbäck, Phượng Duyên Hải Nguyễn, and Stella Rosalie Rosen. Myth & Memory is curated by Laura Ritchie '10 (BFA), a curator, arts administrator, and cultural worker in Durham, NC; she is a founder and former Executive Director of The Carrack.

Every year the Ackland presents works by the Master of Fine Arts in Studio Arts candidates in an exhibition selected by changing guest curators. The artists will also be displaying their thesis projects at other locations in the Triangle.

Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, **Offers Works by Contemporary Artists**

Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, is presenting Truth and Memory, featuring works by six contemporary artists, on view through June 25, 2022.

This exhibition brings together the work of six contemporary artists of color living and working in North Carolina. Clarence Heyward, Lynn Marshall-Linnemeier, Juan Logan, Renzo Ortega, and Samantha Rosado, range from well-established professionals to emerging talent. Collectively, their work reflects on and responds to personal, cultural, and historical memory

Truth and Memory was conceived by artist Beverly McIver, and curated by McIver and three of her students at Duke University, Marie-Louise Bennett, Nzinga Simmons and Emily Xu, where she is professor of art. As they write in their collective statement as curators, "Memory is central to identity formation. It forms how we define ourselves and our relationship to the world. It forges powerful bridges between the past and the present, enabling the bygone to infiltrate the contemporary. Personal memory refers to an understanding of the past that has been experienced first-hand. Cultural memory refers to an understanding of the past that has been passed down generationally through oral traditions and other culturally specific customs. Historical memory refers to an understanding of the past informed by narratives about specific historical periods and events. Working both abstractly and figuratively, the artists presented in this exhibition create works that query and reflect on both personal and collective memories - grappling with the ways in which the past continues to inform the present."

Samantha Rosado is a Puerto Rican, cisgendered, gay woman who works primarily with oil painton canvas. Though she was drawn to the arts in her youth, she

explores notions of the Black American experience. His work investigates cultural truths, challenges stereotypes, and questions identity. Heyward believes it's important to "paint his truth" and uses persons of color as subjects in his work as homage to his culture. Beginning his journey as a full-time artist in 2019, he is best known for his dynamic and fresh take on figurative art.

Heyward relocated to North Carolina to study Art Education at North Carolina Central University. He has shown his work nationally and has been featured in venues including the 21c Museum of Durham, the Harvey B. Gantt Center for Cultural Arts, the Block Gallery Raleigh, the Nasher Museum of Art and the Contemporary Art Museum of Raleigh. Heyward was the recipient of The Bright work Fellowship residency at Anchorlight, Raleigh in 2020, the Emerging Artist in Residence at Artspace, Raleigh in 2021 and was the NC State Artist in Residence 2022. His work is in the collections of several notable private and public institutions. He currently lives and works in Raleigh, NC.

Renzo Ortega (Lima, Peru 1974) is an artist based in Carrboro, NC. He received a BFA in painting from the Escuela Nacional de Bellas Artes del Perú (1999), studied at the Art Students League of New York (2000-04), and has his MFA in painting from Hunter College (2014). Ortega's artwork has been exhibited in solo and group shows in the United States and Perú and has been commissioned to create pubic art projects and community murals.

Ortega's recent solo exhibitions have been at LUMP Gallery in Raleigh, NC, (2021), Espacio Venancio Shinki ICPNA in Lima-Perú (February 2020), Vox Populi Gallery in Philadelphia (March 2019), The Power Plant Gallery at Duke University (February 2019), and at The John and June Allcott Gallery at UNC Chapel Hill (January 2018). Ortega's artwork has been exhibited in museums such as the NASH-ER Museum of Art (Durham, NC, 2022), Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art SECCA (Winston-Salem, NC, 2020), the Works on Paper: 2017 Exhibition at The Weatherspoon Art Museum in Greensboro, in the S-Files Biennial at El Museo del Barrio (New York 2007) and Queens International Biennial at the Queens Museum in 2006.

Ortega is a recipient of the 2018-2019 North Carolina Arts Council Artist Fellowship Award, 2018-2019 Ella Fountain Pratt Emerging Artists Grant Durham Arts Council, 2018 Orange County Arts Commission Artist Project Grant, and 2016 Queens Council on the Arts New Work Award. In 2013, as a Kossak Travel Grant recipient, Ortega traveled to Berlin to study German Expressionism, and also in 2015 traveled to Honduras as a part of the U.S. Department of Cultural Affairs Cultural Envoy Program. He partook in the Visiting Artist Residency at the Rubenstein Arts Center at Duke University in 2019, and In 2020, he was the inaugural artist of the New Wave Art Wknd artistresidence program in West Palm Beach. Born in Nashville, TN, Juan Logan

now lives and works in Belmont, NC. Logan's artworks address subjects relevant to the American experience. At once abstract and representational, his paintings, drawings, sculptures, installations, and videos address the interconnections of race, place, and power. They make visible how hierarchical relations and social stereotypes shape individuals, institutions, and the material and mental landscapes of contemporary life.

Logan is currently the Conservation Manager at the Vollis Simpson Whirligig Project. This project is actively restoring thirty-one large-scale sculptures created by artist Vollis Simpson for the city of Wilson, NC.

Antoine Williams is an interdisciplinary artist who is heavily influenced by speculative fiction, history and his working-class upbringing in Red Springs, NC. An artist-educator, Williams received his BFA from the University of North Carolina, Charlotte, and his MFA from UNC Chapel Hill. He helped start the God City Art Collective in Charlotte, where he participated in a number of socially engaged, community-based art projects.

Williams has exhibited in a number of places, including at the Mint Museum of Art, Michigan State University, Columbia Museum of Art, Smack Mellon Brooklyn, 21c Museum, Elsewhere Museum, Prizm Art Fair, The McColl Center of Art and Innovation, the California Museum of Photography as well as many other venues

Williams has taken part in residencies at The Center for Afrofuturist Studies, The Hambidge Center, and in 2022is slated to attend the Joan Mitchel Residency in New Orleans. Williams' was also a part of the 2021 Drawing Center viewing program, He is also a recipient of the 2017 Joan Mitchell Award for Painters and Sculptors and the 2018 Harpo Foundation Grant Award. His work is in the collection of the Mint Museum and the North Carolina Museum of Art. He's given talks at Auburn University and UNC-Chapel Hill. Williams is an associate professor of art at Guilford College.

Lynn Marshall-Linnemeier has been documenting the American South since 1989 and works both figuratively and abstractly. She researches and collages photography, painting, and writing, with primary source documents from diaries and letters, which she incorporates into her image-based mixed-media quilts, 2-D and 3-D sculptures, and mixed media works. With an aim of re-examining and re-framing historical figures, she engages her subjects through dialogue focusing on their life stories and historical incidents attached to place.

Marshall-Linnemeier is inspired by African-American and indigenous cultural traditions as well as stories from people that she has met during her travels, which include international residencies. Her vibrant paintings explore personal investiga tions into movement and transformation often drawn from concepts surrounding ancestry, memory and written language. The Federal Art Project, formed under the WPA, afforded opportunities to a diverse group of artists, including women, African Americans and recent immigrants from China, Russia and Germany. This monumental effort to put artists back to work resulted in a collection of artworks intended to uplift the national spirit and encourage creativity in the face of great challenges. The Gibbes is one of a select group of institutions across the country that houses a historic collection of Federal Art Project prints. Gallery 2 & 3, Through Oct. 9 - "William Eggleston Photographs from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection". It is said that William Eggleston's unique ability to conflate the epic and the everyday has made him one of the most impactful figures in late 20th century photography. A native of Memphis, TN, Eggleston first photographed his local environs in the 1950s in black-and-white but became one of the first fine art photographers to use color to record his observations in a more heightened and accurate way. Today, his strikingly vivid yet enigmatic images of parked cars, billboards, storefronts, diners and other artifacts of the ordinary world are considered groundbreaking. The photographs presented in this edition of the museum's Charleston Collects exhibition series were selected from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection and represent many of the pioneering artist's most notable works. The exhibition will be accompanied by a full-color catalog with an essay on the artist by Simon Constantine, Ph.D., professor of photographic history at Birkbeck, University of London, and Sotheby's Art Institute. Galleries 1, 4, and 5, Permanent Exhibition -"18th and 19th Century American Paintings and Sculpture". American paintings, from colonial portraits to Civil War-era landscapes, occupy the Gibbes Main Gallery. Portraits of leading political, social, and military figures include works by Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Benjamin West, Gilbert Stuart, Thomas Sully and Samuel F.B. Morse. The gallery also features landscape and genre scenes by Angelica Kaufmann, Louis Mignot, Eastman Johnson, Conrad Wise Chapman, and William Aiken Walker. The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the Campbell Rotunda, and decorative art objects on loan from the Rivers Collection. Gallery 5, Permanent Exhibition - "Miniature Portraits". The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance". At the turn of the twentieth century. American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and the lowcountry region. Works in this gallery were created over the past forty years by artists who are native to the area, who have worked here, or who have created objects that reflect the complex story of the region. The works are grouped to reflect several themes including the southern landscape, the human figure, abstraction, and the legacy of slavery in America. Though Krisel may not be a household name among Spartanburg residents, he has made a significant artistic contribution to the Spartanbura community. Born in Brooklyn, NY in 1920, Krisel's interest in art and design started at a voung age. He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Plet Mondrian, who dreatly influenced his abstract style. After studying architecture at the New Bauhaus in Chicago from 1946-1949, he received his graduate degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in 1952. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor, Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. 



Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. 

Terra Incognita places viewers inside a dynamic and curious environment fractured with subtle shifts, signs of life, and whispers of alarm, drifting toward an uncertain future. As such, the work reflects the spatially and temporally dispersed forces of the late-capitalist-driven climate catastrophe, simultaneously ever-present yet often beyond our everyday perceptions.
