# Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Features Works by R. Buckminster Fuller

The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, is presenting *Altruistic Genius: Buckminster Fuller's Plans to Save the Planet*, on view in the Appleby Foundation Exhibition Hall, Level 1, through Aug. 21, 2023.

This exhibition brings the inventions and designs of R. Buckminster Fuller to Western North Carolina and introduces visitors to Fuller's strategies for the sustainability of humans and the planet relating to housing, transportation, mathematics, and engineering.

This exhibition features two major suites of prints by Buckminster Fuller among other remarkable works from his multi-decade career and is presented in three sections: Inventions; Synergetics; and Black Mountain College and Lasting Influence.

The Inventions portfolio, assembled in 1981 from Fuller's career of explorations along with several existent models, represents Fuller's foresight. In the late 1970s, Fuller published a series of mathematical systems and philosophies to be used in solving problems in all areas of human existence in his Synergetics portfolio.

Significant to Asheville, Fuller taught at Black Mountain College during the summers of 1948 and 1949. It was there that he importantly constructed his first geodesic dome as he experimented to develop more affordable housing.

More than 30 major artworks by

Buckminster Fuller join select examples by artists and designers directly impacted by Fuller's innovations in art and design, including Jade Doskow, Kenneth Snelson, and Kirsten Stolle, among others.

the designs of Fuller's Fly's Eye Dome
and Geodesic Dome with student-produced models on view in the exhibition
- two designs that transformed the history
of modern architecture. Welcoming visitors to the Museum, a replica of Fuller's
Dymaxion Car, on loan from the Lane
Motor Museum in Nashville, TN, will be
on view in the Museum's Atrium for the
duration of the exhibition.

### Southern Highland Craft Guild in Asheville, NC, Offer Works by Graduating Class of Haywood Community College

The Southern Highland Craft Guild in Asheville, NC, will present the *Graduating Class of 2023 of Haywood Community College's Professional Crafts Program*, featuring works by students, on view in the upstairs Main Gallery at the Folk Art Center, from May 13 through Sept.6, 2023.

This show continues the historical relationship between the Southern Highland Craft Guild and Haywood, an educational center of the Guild. This new generation of craft is led by instructors Amy Putansu in fiber, Brian Wurst in wood, Emily Reason in clay, and Robert Blanton in metals & jewelry.

Students of the Haywood program come from all over, with or without prior experience of craft, and sometimes pursuing it as a second or third career. The course of study is challenging, combining craft concentrations with supplemental classes in design, drawing, craft history, business, marketing and photography. Haywood Community College and the Southern Highland Craft Guild share a history that documents the role of craft education in preserving traditional culture, creating economic opportunity and fostering professional practice. All of the artists represent the vitality and creativity of craft practice today, which is the ultimate purpose of both institutions. Many Haywood graduates have become individual members of the Southern Highland Craft Guild and have served the Guild in various capacities.

Instructor Brian Wurst of the Professional Crafts Wood program says, "Our programs have thrived for nearly five decades, and our relationship with the Craft Guild has been a key part of that. We're always thrilled to have work showcased at the Folk Art Center, and in turn scores of our alumni have gone on to become active Guild members. *The Graduate Show* is the capstone of two hard years by these students, and it's a delight to share it in this beautiful space."

Haywood Community College is located in Clyde, NC, just west of Asheville. The college's Professional Crafts Program began in recognition of the region's strong craft heritage. It was envisioned that students would learn the basics of craft media and



how to transform that craft into a business. The clay studio was the first to open in 1974. With the addition of jewelry, wood and fiber studios, a comprehensive curriculum was in place by 1977.
