He now mainly uses canvas and occasionally wood, using mixed media collage, John Maddocks handcrafts instruments from a selection of renewable tonewoods sourced from the North Carolina Appalachian Mountains. His instruments are crafted with an artist's eye, a musician's ear, and a willingness to reach beyond the known or comfortable. Currently his shop makes guitars in four different sizes/ styles, two sizes of mandolins, open-backed banjos, and traditional NC mountain dulcimers. Kulynych Gallery, Through May 11 - Wilkes Heritage Museum collects and preserves historic structures, artifacts, and documents of Wilkes County and serves as a resource center for every Wilkes County citizen and visitor.
