continued from Page 52 age." Ben Long's frescoes, celebrated for their technical mastery and expressive depth, are grounded in rigorous drawing and careful study. This exhibition, presented in honor of the installation of his fresco Psalm 23 at Rumple Presbyterian Church in Blowing Rock, explores the essential figurative nature of Long's practice. Featuring preparatory cartoons, figure studies, and selected portraits, the exhibition highlights the artist's ongoing engagement with the human form. Beyond their role in refining his figural compositions, Long's portraits also reflect the interconnected nature of artistic production and patronage. Many of the individuals he depicted were not just subjects but also collectors and benefactors, whose support—both financial and civic—helped make his large-scale frescoes possible. Through this lens, the exhibition considers the relationship between private commissions and public works, offering a broader understanding of the networks that sustain monumental art. This show is briefly in conjunction with the new permanent installation of "The Good Shepherd" fresco at Rumple Memorial Presbyterian Church. Schaefer Gallery, Through May 11 - "Dail Dixon: Modern at Scale". Dail Dixon, FAIA, is an architect, craftsman, and a modernist at heart. This installation, featuring works from his woodworking studio, explores how this celebrated North Carolina architect, known for his innovative design sensibilities, translates modernist principles into playful, functional artworks. Dixon's birdhouses—originally developed to benefit the Penland School of Craft-are more than whimsical objects; they reflect a refined mastery of proportion, material, and form. Drawing inspiration from the iconic Case Study Houses and a family history of birdhouse design, Dixon's work bridges architecture and craft, modernity and tradition. Rankin West and East Galleries, Through June 8 - "Storyboard to Storybook: The Beulah Campbell Collection at Appalachian State University." featuring an exhibition celebrating the creativity behind mid-20th-century children's literature. Featuring more than 30 original illustrations, collages and preparatory drawings, "Storyboard to Storybook" offers a behind-the-scenes look at how artists crafted iconic children's stories. Spanning the 1950s to the 1980s, the collection explores themes of identity, heritage and imagination, reflecting the shifting cultural landscape of the time. Cannon Gallery, Through Dec. 25 - "The Shape of Color: Understanding Color Theory in BRAHM's Collection". Color is fundamental to human perception, yet its nature has fascinated and perplexed philosophers, artists, and scientists for centuries. Through observation, experimentation, and artistic practice, they have developed theories to define and manipulate color as both a science and a sensation. From Antiquity through the 20th century, these evolving ideas have shaped how we see and use color in art and design. This exhibition explores key milestones in the history of color theory through seven case studies, each centered on a single work of art from BRAHM's Permanent Collection. Alongside these works, diagrams and historical models illustrate how color has been classified, studied, and understood over time. By examining these varied approaches, The Shape of Color invites us to consider the ways in which color influences our perception, emotions, and the visual world around us. Fort Gallery, Through May 4 - "SHIP/SHAPE: Page Laughlin and David Finn". The exhibition features more than 20 paintings and sculptures that explore and delight in the various manifestations of ships as image, symbol and metaphor. The exhibition showcases two distinct, but interrelated, bodies of work presented side by side. Although at first glance the two artists' work might appear radically differentmedium, use of color, physicality—on closer examination strong parallels emerge. Both artists' works subvert expectations with layers of complexity and meaning. This marks the first time in over 30 years that the two artists, who are a couple, have developed an exhibition together. For Laughlin and Finn, one could understand both these bodies of work as portraiture of a sort: studies of seemingly familiar subjects. Atwell Gallery, Through Aug. 10 - "Considerations: An Installation by Sarah Vaughn". Vaughn's "Considerations" invites visitors to step into a landscape of thousands of carefully crafted glass river rocks. Made using techniques like blowing, flame-working, casting, and laminating, these fragile stones are stacked and arranged to create an immersive installation that explores how we experience and remember the world around us. Each glass rock represents a moment in timesome tied to personal memories, others shaped from reclaimed glass, blending stories of loss and creation. Ongoing - "Reimagined Ginny Stevens Gallery: Blowing Rock, A History Exhibition," features a diorama of the iconic Mayview Manor Hotel. This immersive exhibition celebrates the town of Blowing Rock's rich history and features an extraordinary new highlight: a 1-to-87 scale diorama of the Mayview Manor Hotel, crafted by

renowned Charlotte-based realist painter and diorama artist Dan Nance. The reimagined exhibition is a collaboration between Ashlee Lanier, a freelance curator with a master's degree in public history from Appalachian State University and a bachelor's degree in osteoarchaeology from North Carolina State University, and Ian Gabriel Wilson curator of exhibitions and collections at BRAMH. Samantha Burnette, graduate student in the hublic History program at Appalachian State University, supported the project through extensive review of available historical materials and photographs in partnership with the Blowing Rock Historical Society and BRAMH.
