The Cameron Art Museum in conjunction with the North Carolina Museum of Art, Winston-Salem, is proud to present "We Belong Here: The Gutierrez Collection" - the first public exhibition of a collection of contemporary art built over the past decade by North Carolina-based collectors Onay Gutierrez and Jeff Childers. The exhibition features over forty works created in the twenty-first century by over forty international contemporary artists working in a broad range of media, engaged with current social, political, cultural, and personal issues. Gutierrez and Childers, who began their collection in 2015, describe their collecting philosophy as "revolving around the contemporary cultural landscape of their time through a cross section of artistic voices primarily from underrepresented communities." Through Oct. 5 - "The Game Changers: Diebenkorn, Frankenthaler, and Rauschenberg". This new exhibition highlights three art world mavericks: Richard Diebenkorn, Helen Frankenthaler, and Robert Rauschenberg. Working with guest curator Ben Billingsley, "The Game Changers" celebrates the monumental, yet sometimes-unsung contributions of these three visionary artists with works spanning approximately 40 years of each artist's career. Abstract Expressionism established American artists as the leaders of a revolution that continues to impact the contemporary scene. Artists across the country responded to the new techniques with their own innovations, inventing Pop Art and setting the stage for Post-Modernism along the way. Helen Frankenthaler, Richard Diebenkorn, and Robert Rauschenberg created essential works in the mid-20th century, forever changing what American art would look like and what it could mean to us. Their artworks are at the core of Cameron Art Museum's collection, which showcases prints by modern American artists using various techniques, including lithography, intaglio, and screen-printing. Ongoing - Cameron Art Museum presents the only sculpture park in the country created to honor the United States Colored Troops and their fight for freedom. The opening of PNC USCT Park marks the one-year anniversary of the unveiling of Boundless, the public sculpture by artist Stephen Hayes that commemorates the United States Colored Troops and the Battle of Forks Road. This park creates a gathering space for the more than 60,000 visitors from across the country who come to CAM each year and the 8,000 school children who visit the museum on field trips. PNC USCT Park will become a community space for gathering, field trips, classes, workshops, storytelling, live music and USCT living history events for years to come, in which the sculpture Boundless will be the centerpiece.
