701 Center for Contemporary Art in Columbia, SC, Offers Work by John Sims

701 Center for Contemporary Art in Columbia, SC, is presenting a solo exhibition of works by John Sims, 701 CCA's Artist in Residence, *AfroDixia: A Righteous Confiscation*, on view through June 25, 2021.

Sims' activism goes all the way back to his college days. After graduating from Antioch College, he returned as special assistant to the Dean of Faculty, where he created and organized the Cross Cultural Field Program (CCFP) and African American Cultural Week (AACW), a program of 26 events celebrating the African American experience, featuring Henry Threadgill, R.L. Burnside, Karen Williams and many others. That annual event became the AACW Blues and Gospel Fest and celebrated its 25th anniversary in 2016.

The CCFP, an academic service learning program, took a diverse group of students to the South to learn about African American culture by visiting areas in Charleston, Sea Islands, and rural Georgia. The program received strong support from both Coretta Scott King and congressman John Lewis and was covered by *The New York Times*, going on to become a vital part of Antioch College's history of creating innovative curricula. These two projects later inspired the creative cultural activism that has come to be a foundational component of JohnSimsProjects.

Sims has given lectures and presented his exhibitions not only nationally but internationally in countries such as Hungary, Spain, Slovenia, Israel and Argentina. His work has been featured in *The New York Times, USA Today, The Wall Street Journal,*





Washington Post, CNN, NBC News, The Guardian, The Root, ThinkProgress, Al Jazeera, Guernica, Art in America, Transition, Sculpture, FiberArts, Science News and the science journal Nature. He has written for major publications such as CNN, Al Jazeera, The Huffington Post, Guernica Magazine, The Rumpus and The Grio.

John Sims, a Detroit native, is an interdisciplinary conceptual artist who creates multimedia projects spanning the areas of mathematics, art, text, performance and political-media activism. His main projects are informed by the vocabulary of mathematical structure, the politics of sacred symbols and poetic reflections. With his roots in Sarasota, FL, Sims' work is heavily influenced by the South. He is particularly inspired by the 1990s protest against the Confederate flag flying over South Carolina's capitol. He will be staying here in Columbia, SC, during his residency with 701 CCA.

USC Lancaster's Native American Studies Center in Lancaster, SC, announces a summer Contemporary Artist-in-Residence program continuing through Aug. 31, 2021, featuring Catawba artist Alex Osborn.

Osborn will demonstrate his work with photography, digital collage, and drawing, creating an evolving art installation in the Center's Five Points Gallery.

Working both remotely and on-site at the Center, Osborn's virtual residency will feature artist talks and interviews, and will give viewers an inside look at his worksin-progress. During each program, the audience will have the chance to interact with Osborn and ask questions about his artistic process and creations. By the end of summer, Osborn plans to have five digitally-created pieces of artwork that show Catawba heritage and culture through a contemporary lens. "I want people to reflect on their own identities and understand that Native American culture and artwork, especially Catawba culture and art, isn't only in the past," said Osborn. "We create it today and will continue to impact society and the community around us.'

Catawba artforms, artistic mediums he works with, identity through art, cultural documentation, contemporary art in Catawba and Native American culture today, and more.

Osborn will demonstrate and discuss his work on select Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays through August Other residency dates include June 17-19, July 8-10, and July 29-31.

On Aug. 12 from 6-8pm, viewers can ioin the artist for a talk and demonstration about the exhibit installation. If the current health situation continues to improve, there will be two opportunities on Aug. 27 and 28 from 10am-4pm, where the public can tentatively see a live installation of murals in-person in the galleries. Artist-in-Residence events can be viewed live via Facebook or Zoom, using the registration links that will be provided on the Center's social media pages.
