The Craven Arts Council in New Bern, NC, will present two new exhibits including: Juneteenth, featuring works by local African American artists, on view in the Bank of the Arts, Main Gallery, from June 11 - 30, 2021, and Lee Hood, a local artist known for both his paintings, on view in the Bank of the Arts, Director's Gallery, from June 11 - 30, 2021. A reception for both exhibits will be held on June 11, from 5-8pm.

Juneteenth is celebrated on June 19th every year and commemorates the announcement of the Emancipation Proclamation in the state of Texas after the Civil War. In honor of this historic celebration of freedom in the South, local African American artists will present works about the holiday, African American History, their experiences as African Americans, and what freedom means to them.

Some artists featured in the Juneteenth exhibition include Maximillian Mozingo, Crystal Felton, Tyrone Brown and Diamond Campbell. All pieces in the exhibition feature a wide variety of mediums and range in style from afro-futurism to portraiture.

Lee Hood is a local artist known for both his paintings and his process for painting - painting en plein air. Hood grew up

in Eastern North Carolina off the Pamlico Sound. From an early age, Hood took art classes and then started his career in the army. Through opportunities in the military, he took art lessons from Dr. Alexander at Central Texas College in 1990's.

Hood returned to downtown New Bern and began en plein air paintings of the streetscapes documenting the architecture. He has not only painted en plein air in New Bern, but also in Haiti. He currently operates a studio on Middle Street on the second floor above Cow Café, where he paints his own works and offers painting instruction and group art parties. Hood also does reproductions of his own work and reproduces other artists paintings as well.

Watts grew up in an artistic family and painted for many years but chose a career in business. She devoted herself to painting full time in 2018 and uses the creative process to explore materials and process of abstract expressionism, which she has

been drawn to since childhood. Watts's art has been included in local, regional, and national exhibitions. She is a member of the Wilmington Art Association and Art League of Leland and her work is available at Water+Color Gallery, Sunset River Marketplace, online at (adriennewattsart.com), or by appointment at her studio.

Heirloom basketry was not concerned about the esthetics of the design or finished product; the focus was that the basket met an intended purpose. Today basketry is enjoyed as objects of art and they are made with a myriad of materials both natural and man-made. Milat designs and weaves primarily reed, cane, and seagrass, fashioning her pieces with multiple techniques within each basket. Pam Milat has a focus to bring the history and the Art of Basketry to others.

Milat was raised in a culturally rich environment by parents that sang in a city choir as they dated, who provided opportunities for a mesh of country and city continued on Page 30

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
