We'll fix any mistakes - and there may be mistakes, hopefully not many, so if you see them, let us know ASAP.

Now one thing that is true every month,

but played even a bigger part this month with such a lack of time, is for those who send us their info about exhibitions they are presenting, whenever they feel like it, the later, more danger there is that their info will get cut short or even cut all together. Our supporters would like to see our issues get launched every month, the evening before the first of the month - in some cases they are paying for that service. We're not going to do anything to delay that because someone else didn't think it would do any harm being a straggler, or a right up to the last minute communicator. When it comes to Carolina Arts, they are very wrong.

During what I like to call "My Troubles," I posted what was going on, or Linda posted what was going on - on my Facebook page, so people could know what was happening.

I want to thank all those folks who sent along well whishes, prayers and words of hope and encouragement for my health. Linda gets most of the credit for this issue while I worked hard staying alive.

Corrigan Gallery in Charleston, SC, Hosts Solo Show of Works by **Gordon Nicholson**

Corrigan Gallery, at its new location in Charleston, SC, presents BETWEEN, a solo show of new works by Gordon Nicholson on view June 3 - 30, 2022, with an opening reception June 3 from 5-8 pm.

As the artist says, "This group of paintings reflects an ongoing visual essay about the landscape between cities, towns, and places that I travel to and from. Of interest are settings often temporal in nature that over time, and without intent, permeate place in one way or another. The text over the paintings is an attempt to balance narrative with image and place in a similar temporal fashion. The images are from around South Carolina and Georgia."

Gordon Nicholson is originally from Ontario, Canada and holds three degrees in architecture. He is a licensed architect and partner in Guess Nicholson Architecture llc and a part time Professor at the Savannah College of Art and Design. He has also taught at LSU and the Clemson Architecture Center in Charleston. His design work has been widely published and recognized for excellence in architecture including an AIA National Small Project Award. His artwork has been similarly recognized and is part of both private and permanent collections including the Medical University of South Carolina's contemporary collection for the Ashley

"As an architect and painter my work s grounded in my region and reflects a desire to understand the complexity of place. In painting I find inspiration in layers and the spatial relationships between text, numbers, and image. I often work in series, exploring different subject matter and media. My paintings are constructed directly on canvas (sometimes reclaimed) or paper to emphasize making over representation. Composition is more as a departure point than a result. I engage subject matter over and over until I have captured something in the work that speaks on multiple levels of depth and texture."

Corrigan Gallery is pleased to now be on Queen Street just off the corner of Church where the owner's parents lived when she was born. Continuing to present contemporary art by artists tied to Charleston and those of the earlier centuries, the new home is perfectly renovated and improved by architect Whitney Powers and Huss Construction. 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



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Lowcountry Artists Gallery in Charleston, SC, Features Works by Tina Mayland

Lowcountry Artists Gallery in Charles ton, SC, will present Lowcountry Lights featuring new works in oil by Charleston artist, Tina Mayland, on view from June 1 - 30, 2022. A reception will be held on June 3 from 5-8pm

Mayland is a native Charlestonian for whom the Lowcountry of South Carolina is as close to paradise as any place on earth. Returning home after 30 years of a high-tech career that took her to Atlanta, DC, and New Jersey as VP of Marketing for AT&T, Tina "rewired" from her allconsuming corporate life and began her "encore career" as a full-time artist.

Mayland's motivation to become a painter comes from visits to her grandparent's farm on Wadmalaw Island, just outside of Charleston. "As a child, I built tree forts in live oak trees, played in the pluff mud of the marshes, and galloped my horse through Lowcountry forests. Capturing the essence of that landscape in my art is a way of recapturing the joys of my youth.'

She continues, "In my art, I strive to capture a moment in time... an experience that moved me. Often, it's how the light played on the landscape and my feeling of wonder in that instant. My heart belongs to the South Carolina Lowcountry. I relish its languid summer days, its moss-covered oak trees that glow orange in the receding light, sunsets too uproarious to be believed, and the vastness of marshes punctuated by the distinctive odor of pluff mud (which to some is unpleasant, but to me is sacred, because it smells like home)."

Mayland endeavors to celebrate the magnificence of nature and her joy living in awe of it. Using thick paint and bold strokes, her goal is to capture the symphony that is the Lowcountry... its unique light, mood, and texture.



Mayland served on the Board of Directors of the Charleston Artist Guild for 4 years and is a member of the Seabrook Island Artist Guild. She's also active in the community, serving on the Board of Trustees of the Middleton Place Foundation and on the National Board of Directors of the Archeological Institute of America. Her work is represented by the Wells Gallery at The Sanctuary on Kiawah Island and by Lowcountry Artists Gallery in downtown Charleston. A recovering workaholic, she is reveling in her "rewired" life. Says Mayland, "I'm testament to the fact that you-can-go-home-again and that the post-career stage can be the most fulfilling!

Public Works Art Center in Summerville, SC, Features Photographs by Kirsten Hoving in the West Gallery

Public Works Art Center in Summerville, SC, will feature Fabricated Visions, photographs on silk by Kirsten Hoving from June 16 - July 30, 2022. A reception will be held June 16 from 5:30-8:30pm.

Fabricated Visions is a collection of evocative photographs printed on silk and paper collage. In some works, the fabric is mounted only at the top over a digital underprint on a panel to create free-flowing photographs that gently move with air currents or in response to the movements of viewers. In others, the silk is stabilized on a transparent substrate that, in turn, is lifted over a secondary digital photograph or hand-made paper collage to create an unexpected three-dimensional effect.


Hoving's combination of silk fabric with other photographs and materials creates mysterious images that allude to poems, myths, and transcendent experiences. Although her subjects are quietly commonplace - a ladder propped against an apple tree, a figure entering a doorway, a swimmer lifting an arm – she presents them in unusual ways that elevate them to poetic visions. Hoving's materials and processes support the metaphors in her work, as silk, whether flowing or threedimensional, provides the underpinning for imaginative musings and fabricated


Kirsten Hoving is a photographer and interdisciplinary artist from Charleston, SC, whose art balances on the edge between fact and fiction. Over the last fifteen years, Hoving has shown her work in galleries around the world and has published several books, including Svala's photographer Emma Powell. With a PhD in art history from Columbia University, Hoving had a long career as a professor and scholar of modern art, with books and articles on many topics, including Surrealist photography and the assemblages of Joseph Cornell. Those interests heavily influence her creative practice.

Hoving frequently combines photographs with unusual processes, materials, and presentations to evoke quiet dreams, myths, and half-remembered tales. Using unexpected viewpoints, three-dimensionality, and kinetic elements, she expands photography's decisive moments into visionary states of mystical wonder. Our imagination, she believes, is what makes us human, and our ability to see the world through metaphors, stories, and poetic allusions connects our minds to our hearts.


Art League of Hilton Head on Hilton Head Island, SC, Features Works by Debi West

direction for Spartanburg, SC, artist Jane Allen Nodine. These colorful and dynamic works offer a sense of optimism as felt by the artist in the advent of a new year. In Nodine's latest work you will see paint floating in more paint. Color competing for more space. Form and flection taking hold of the overall composition.

"Since the pandemic began, I have been driven to develop works that bring joy over doom. I have a keen interest in color and how it can soothe or agitate, calm or excite. I often use dynamic color combinations with juxtapositions or overlapping to create

elements that pop or peek out from under the layers. Those layers of color are made with heavy bodied and thinned paints to build a surface that draws the viewer into the work to explore spatial anomalies that often shift according to the ambient light and vantage point," said Nodine.

Nodine is Distinguished Professor Emerita and retired University Gallery Director at the University of South Carolina Upstate where she served as head of the art program for over twenty years. Nodine exhibits widely in the US and abroad and has been recognized with numerous awards including an NEA/SECCA Southeastern Seven IV Fellowship from the Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art and two South Carolina Arts Commission Artist Fellowships. In 2012 she received the Award for Outstanding Artistic Achievement by the Southeastern College Art Conference and in 2002 she was awarded a Belle W. Baruch Visiting Scholar Fellowship to Hobcaw Barony Plantation in Georgetown, SC.

Francis Marion University in Florence, SC, Offers an Exhibition **Installation by Doug McAbee**



The Adele Kassab Gallery at the Francis Marion University in Florence, SC, presents Even When It's Dark, an exhibit of works by Doug McAbee. The exhibit is on view through August 11, 2022.

This exhibit features 2D and 3D work created by Doug McAbee. His body of work is recognized by its use of bright colors, bold, often humorous imagery, and its positive message. The sculptures are created out of hollow formed steel and coated in bright, pleasant colors that resemble candy coatings. The anthropomorphic forms are lively and happy and are placed in the exhibit to interact visually with one another and with the drawings nearby

McAbee's individual drawings are created with brightly colored ink placed on wood panels. The imagery in each drawing shares a narrative with the viewer designed to engage the audience in a visual conversation. The characters feature birds, humans, and other creatures interacting to overcome negative influences and sharing messages of love, inclusion, and unity.

Even When It's Dark features a site specific mural consisting of imagery drawn directly onto the walls of the gallery to complement the drawings and sculptures. The colors, imagery, and content are shared between the 2D and 3D works of art creating a positive, immersive visual experience in the gallery.

Born in South Carolina, Doug McAbee learned to weld at the age of seven.

While his imagination was running wild, his father taught him practical construction methods with steel. The sense of play and exploration he valued then is still with him as he creates whimsical and organic drawings and sculptures.

McAbee earned his MFA degree from Winthrop University. He is an associate professor of art at Lander University in Greenwood, SC. He lives in the middle of nowhere with his family and his dogs and he creates drawings and sculptures when he's not teaching. He loves waffles and running and he's rarely still. McAbee explores humor, color, and narrative in his creative work. His father was a great storyteller and McAbee is interested in the power of imagery and story in his visual communication with viewers. He was also raised by wolves.

One thing that unifies humans is the smile. Regardless of any perceived physical or ideological differences humans may have, all it takes is a shared smile to bring us to the same level. As viewers move through this exhibition they will likely be tempted to smile at the absurdity, the liveliness, and the humor in the work. For that time, the viewers and the artist are all together, unified with a smile. Even when it's dark, there are reasons to smile.

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

flickering brushstrokes and gorgeous colors, and then have the extraordinary spatial experience of entering into Mc-Cavour's gallery installations. The effect will be like walking into a painting that has been magically atomized.

In the Shadow of Monet: Giverny and American Impressionism will be on view from June 11 through Sept. 4, 2022.

In 1883, French Impressionist painter Claude Monet (1840–1926) settled in Giverny, a French village nestled at the confluence of the Seine and Epte rivers. This is the scene of the CMA's beloved Monet landscape painting, The Seine at Giverny (L'Île aux Orties, Giverny), on view in this exhibition. Glimpses of the new, still-radical Impressionist style he pioneered inspired many American artists to go study in France where the movement was developing in real time.

American artists traveled to Giverny and home again for four decades at the turn of the 20th century, transforming the American art scene. This exhibition features over 40 artists, including Giverny Colony founders Willard Metcalf and Louis Ritter as well as Richard Edward Miller, Lilla Cabot Perry, John Singer

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Sargent, Mary Fairchild MacMonnies, and Guy Rose. It also includes two of the CMA's rarely seen watercolors by Blondelle Malone, a Columbia artist who was one of those Americans to venture to Giverny. She pursued a meeting with Monet and painted in his garden in 1904.

While other villages outside Paris, such as Barbizon and Pont-Aven, made for summertime painting idylls for the French, Giverny seemed to attract artists from abroad. English was the dominant language among these artists, and so this colony had its own mood and sensibility. Monet served as a reluctant figurehead for personal exploration among the settings he popularized, including his famous haystacks. Those in the artist's inner circle. like John Singer Sargent, worked directly with him in his garden, while Monet's stepdaughter Blanche Hoschedé-Monet served as a conduit to the first young artist arrivals and often painted with them in her father's garden.

The exhibition reflects the different generations of those attracted to Giverny from the first intrepid painters in the mid-1880s to those more established artists who settled there in the early 1900s, some even staying through World War I.

Vibrant in terms of painterliness and wonderful color, In the Shadow of Monet is an opportunity to see works that reside in private collections and away from view. with a few spotlight loans from other art museums as well as pieces from the CMA Collection. This exhibition is an introduction to many artists visitors may not already know and a way to see how art movements spread geographically. Impressionism was a transitional modern movement that offered a new freedom to modern artists to experiment with seeing and conveying the world around them.

In the Shadow of Monet: Giverny and American Impressionism, was organized by the Columbia Museum of Art.

The exhibition Amanda McCavour: Bright Little Day Stars, will be on view from June 18 through Oct. 2, 2022.

Poet Martha Lavinia Hoffman describes flowers as "bright little day stars scattered all over the earth." Artist Amanda McCavour lifts those stars up into the air in this exhibition, creating hovering constellations of colorful flora. The Toronto-based artist creates astonishing embroideries by stitching into watersoluble fabric she then dissolves to leave only the stitching. She is interested in thread's assumed vulnerability, its ability to unravel, and its strength when it is sewn

Pink Field, Blue Fog (2016–2022) transforms an entire gallery into an abstracted field of flowers, complete with hovering cloud. Bright Little Day Stars also includes Bloom (2022), a brand-new body of floral work in colored metal, also hanging from the gallery ceilings to create an immersive environment. Created specifically for this exhibition, it consists of circular wire shapes based on mathemati-

"I'm often inspired by things that are related to memory and looking back," says McCavour. "This is a common theme I can see throughout my room pieces, the more abstract dream spaces and some pieces inspired by botany. It is important to me that the subjects relate to the material of thread somehow - either its delicacy or transparency."

McCavour holds a BFA from York University, where she studied drawing and installation, and has recently completed her MFA in fibers and material studies at Tyler School of Art in Philadelphia. McCavour shows her work in galleries nationally and internationally with recent solo exhibitions in Gatineau, Quebec; Williamsport, Pennsylvania; and Vancouver, British Columbia. She has received grants and awards from The Canada Council for the Arts, The Ontario Crafts Council, The Toronto Arts Council, The Handweavers and Spinners Guild of America, The Ontario Society of Artists, The Surface Design Association, and The Embroiderers Guild of America for her work.

Amanda McCavour: Bright Little Day Stars, was organized by the Columbia Museum of Art.


paint would become the backdrop for my dogs. Still, I strive to transcend the singular category of dog art."





Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center in Asheville, NC, will present Jo Sandman / TRACES, on view from June 3 through Sept. 3, 2022. A reception will be held on June 3, from 5:30 - 8pm, featuring a Gallery Talk with Katherine French, Curator of the Jo Sandman Legacy Project.

After a life-changing summer studying at Black Mountain College, Boston-based artist Jo Sandman decided to devote her life to art. At BMC during that pivotal summer of 1951, she studied painting and drawing with Robert Motherwell and Ben Shawn and photography with Harry Callahan and Aaron Siskind, took classes in anthropology and French, and was exposed to the ideas of faculty artist Joe Fiore as well.

It was this "galvanizing experience" at BMC that prompted Jo Sandman to decide to follow the path of an artist. She went on to develop and maintain a studio practice exploring painting, drawing, experimental sculpture, installation, and photography for more than sixty years, always with an acute awareness of the lingering traces of history, memory, purpose, and meaning embedded in her wide-ranging choice of materials, imagery, and processes. Sandman's restless curiosity has always led the way forward.

After her summer at Black Mountain College, Sandman earned her BFA in fine art from Brandeis University in 1952, and then reconnected with Abstract Expressionist painter Robert Motherwell at Hunter College in New York. She also studied with Hans Hofmann at the Hans Hofmann School of Painting in Provincetown, MA, and again in New York City, where she served as registrar to help pay tuition

During this time in New York, Sandman became a member of the legendary artists'

group The Club and frequented The Cedar Tavern where the Abstract Expressionists and avant-garde poets gathered to drink, talk, and argue about art. Sandman also studied at The Art Institute of Chicago and, in addition to maintaining a robust studio practice, she taught at Wellesley College, The Art Institute of Chicago, Massachusetts College of Art and Design, and many other visiting artist posts.

Sandman's work is included in the permanent collections of the Addison Gallery of American Art, Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center, Dallas Museum of Fine Arts, Huntington Museum, Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, and the Seattle Museum of Art, as well as college art museums at Bates, Bowdoin, Brandeis, Amherst, MIT, Mt Holyoke College, NYU, Rhode Island School of Design, Smith, UNC-Greensboro, and Wellesley. 

Walton, originally of St. Petersburg, FL is a long-time resident of Asheville. Being a committed artist from her childhood, she proceeded to earn a BA in Studio Art from Salem College and a BFA in Painting from the University of North Carolina at Asheville. At its roots, Walton's work is spontaneous. She emphasizes nature, shape, form, and color, but this is all achieved by first applying paint randomly to the surface and embarking on a journey through the process of painting.

Walton's process is an emotional reaction to the paint and environment, which in the end creates a piece of the artist's inner-self that ignites a mutual connection within the viewer. Walton is an active teacher of her craft and has received multiple fellowships around the country to continue to develop as an artist. Her work has been exhibited internationally and has also become part of major corporate and private collections.

When the COVID-19 lockdown period arrived in March of 2020, I found myself at home "limited" by place and workspace, however, without the limitation of a certain amount of time to create. Having been a painter most of my adult life, I found myself wanting to explore different ways of expressing myself beyond the abstractions of recent years such as "The Water Series". I began constructing assemblages of torn paintings on paper, repurposed by weaving, sewing, and gluing to create new painting surfaces. As the limitations of the



time period developed, so did the threedimensional works and the exploration of new ways of painting.

The combination of oil paint, wax, spray paint, and pigment sticks are present in this collection of works. Once limits were lifted and I moved to a much larger studio space, the paintings on canvas were beginning to change also, the work was getting larger and bolder. Recently, an important group of paintings, Steps, has emerged which are whimsical, bold, and have an architectural aspect which echoes both the constructs and the abstraction. As the period of limitations has receded, I am excited to showcase this new body of work and continue to push myself forward with the exploration of new methods of feeding the soul through paint-

This exhibition showcases photography and sculpture from three significant bodies of work created over the last two decades, addressing topics such as environmental justice, insti-

tutional racism, and indigenous futurism. "As artists and agents of Indigenous imagination, we are more than our shared histories of colonization," said artist Wilson. "There are other aspects of our experience that we must express and convey and these expressions must be received with respect. This necessity requires that we tell our stories well, with the vision of a people who understand the generative power of representation. It is in this particular process of self-expression that we practice Native representational sovereignty.'

AUTO-IMMUNE RESPONSE (AIR)

This project began in 2005 and continues today. In it, a figure known only as The Protagonist navigates a post-apocalyptic landscape populated by Native People. Wilson himself portrays the central figure, a role at once empowering, sacred, and therapeutic. Fusing multiple genres of photography, he confronts historical and intellectual trauma, considering how he has come to embody such trauma.

tered practice that convenes indigenous artists, art professionals, government leaders, and the general public in the performative ritual of studio portraits. Wilson employs large format (8x10) wet plate collodion studio photography, the same process that has so deeply influenced our collective understanding of Native American people and our national identity. Augmented reality technology and smart devices map videos to the portraits, connecting the images to the subjects' voices and perspectives.

CONNECTING THE DOTS

Most Americans know the story of the Navajo Code Talkers, who used the unwritten language as code to help win World War II. Lesser known, but arguably more consequential, is that the fissile material used in the development and stockpiling of atomic bombs was sourced from Indigenous nations, in particular Navajo Nation. *Connecting the Dots* is based on a photographic survey of the over 500 Abandoned Uranium Mines

(AUMs) located on the Navajo Nation. The AUMs are physical manifestations of a complex and traumatic history, and this project raises awareness of the Navajo Nation's efforts to receive remediation for the uranium extraction that has poisoned the land and impoverished a people.

Wilson is creating an unconventional photographic survey using drone-based, aerial, and app-activated photography to empower Diné people to re-story their narrative. The project uncovers environmental and social degradation, but more importantly, it creates a platform for voices of resilience and a vision for restorative systems of economy and memory-making.

Wilson's art projects center around the continuation and transformation of customary Indigenous cultural practice. He is a Diné photographer and trans-customary artist who spent his formative years living on the Navajo Nation. Wilson studied photography, sculpture, and art history at the University of New Mexico (MFA, Photography, 2002) and Oberlin College (BA, Studio Art and Art History, 1993).

In 2007, Wilson won the Native American Fine Art Fellowship from the Eiteljorg Museum, in 2010 the Joan Mitchell Foundation Award for Sculpture, in 2016 the Pollock-Krasner Foundation Grant for Photography and in 2020 Wilson was the Doran Artist in Residence at the Yale University Art Gallery.

Wilson has held visiting professorships at the Institute of American Indian Arts (1999-2000), Oberlin College (2000-01), and the University of Arizona (2006-08). In 2017, Wilson received the NM Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts. His work is exhibited and collected internationally. Wilson is Program Head of Photography at Santa Fe Community College.

The Southeastern Center for Contemporary Art (SECCA), an affiliate of the North Carolina Museum of Art, offers a front row seat to the art of our time through exhibitions, experiences, and education programs with a focus on regional working artists. H20 Installations at GreenHill in Greensboro, NC, Offers Advance **Ecological Awareness through Art**

GreenHill Center for North Carolina Art in Greensboro, NC, offers H2O, an ambitious, multi-media exhibition that highlights novel approaches to environmental stewardship on view through June 25, 2022. Works by Caroline Armijo, James Barnhill, Carolyn Henne, Bryant Holsenbeck, Kevin Palme, Barbara Tyroler, and Will Warasila feature large-scale, site-specific installations, documentary photography, and environmental art collaborations. There will be a closing reception on June 25, from 6-8pm with an Artist Talk by Kevin Palme from 5:30-6pm. *H2O* Family Artmaking will be offered weekly through June 20th at LeBauer Park from 1-2pm.

"Through public art installations, a multi-faceted gallery exhibition and robust programming, H2O spurs community conversations and calls to action to protect and preserve our water systems," explained Barbara Richter GreenHill's, Executive Director. "Exhibiting artists explore converging disciplines of art and science to innovate solutions, raise awareness, and re-think the roles we all can play to create a better tomorrow.'

Curator Edie Carpenter shared: "Artists in this exhibition engage us in a deeper understanding of our relationship to water as individuals and communities. Their works invite us to reflect on such ecological challenges as the proliferation of single-use plastics, pollution of groundwater and oceans, as well as questions of social justice raised by the loss of access to clean water. H2O offers creative approaches to repurposing waste products and advocates for change.

The centerpiece of the H2O exhibition is a cascading public "waterfall" composed of 10,000 plastic bottles by environmental artist Bryant Holsenbeck. Located in the atrium of the Greensboro Cultural Center, the "waterfall" is one of several installations that draw attention to the waste stream of our society.

"Holsenbeck's work offers a compelling example of community-building around environmental stewardship", explained Barbara Richter. "Collaborating partners for sourcing and prepping discarded bottles for the mammoth installation include Unifi Corporation (a global leader in recycling plastics), Greensboro Day School, and The Rotary Club of Greensboro." In advance of the exhibition, workshops at GreenHill offer public opportunities to help build the 'waterfall' through bottle cutting and binding spiraled plastic. "When H2O is over," explained Richter, "repurposed water bottles will transform into high-performance fibers at Unifi's Reidsville plant.

ming for all ages through June, from in-depth artist presentations to elementary school Eco-Art Education, created in partnership with the City of Greensboro's Department of Water Resources. Green-Hill Director of Education Jaymie Meyer notes: "Many North Carolinians are not aware that they, as individuals, impact our waterways. People may not realize, for instance, that 80% of ocean debris comes from inland sources and stormwater drains that channel debris directly into streams." Meyer shared that #H2O, a juried online exhibition, allowed young artists to explore their personal interpretations of water conservation. The companion exhibition opened to middle and high school students across the state in early March.

Caroline Armijo (Greensboro) is creating an immersive, site-specific installation Page 26 - Carolina Arts, June 2022



for H2O composed of large hexagonal columns suspended from the ceiling and pavement stones made from encapsulated coal ash developed in partnership with the North Carolina A & T Center for Composite Materials. Interviews, photographs. and objects belonging to residents of Walnut Cove, North Carolina tell the stories of living in proximity to coal ash. Armijo is a mixed media artist who in 2017 was awarded an Art Place America, National Creative Placemaking grant.

James Barnhill (Greensboro) Barnhill is presenting a sculptural installation including paintings on marine panel and tar, inviting reflection on the Deep Water Horizon (2010) and Exon Valdez (1989) marine disasters. Barnhill is a sculptor best known for his public monuments. Major works include February One commemorating students who participated in the Woolworth sit-in. The sculpture is located on the campus of North Carolina A&T University.

Carolyn Henne (Tallahassee) Henne's videos show her Sea Stars living sculpture reef on Newport River in Beaufort, NC. Offering an environmentally positive approach to growing oyster reefs, Henne's sculptures are fabricated from a patented material developed with Sandbar Oyster Co. and Dr. Niels Lindquist of UNC's Institute of Marine Sciences. Henne heads the MFA art program at Florida State University.





The cotton fields grow preachers, women in fancy dress roll collards into cabbages, okra smugglers prepare for customs, and a yearning for connection is evident in the subjects moving through what often appear to be strange dream worlds. Along with triumphs and celebration, there is wear and tear.

This exhibit will offer a rare opportunity to see a wide range of engravings, including several larger ones rich with narrative stories. Metal engraving is one of few artistic techniques that is absolutely direct. Like a draftsman or a painter, the engraver has to present his vision with the end of a simple tool. Fantazos' works demonstrate both a mastering of the craft and a unique artistic vision where the dark humor and carnival of Eastern Europe fuses with a Southe gothic through a magical realism.

Hillsborough Gallery Of Arts in Hillsborough Offers New Exhibition

There will be more of my bells available and I will also be taking the opportunity to bring in more of my larger pieces than I usually have on display at the gallery."

working to bring peace to the world. He celebrated their accomplishments even as he acknowledged the realities of racism, violence and oppression they faced and overcame. Some of his fighters—Harriet Tubman, George Washington Carver, Marian Anderson and Mahatma Gandhi—are familiar historical figures; others are less well-known individuals whose determination and sacrifice have been eclipsed over time. Drawn entirely from the collection of more than 1,000 works by Johnson given to the Smithsonian American Art Museum by the Harmon Foundation in 1967, this exhibition is the first-eve presentation of this series in Johnson's home state of South Carolina. "Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice" is organized by the Smithsonian American Art Museum with generous support from Art Bridges, Faye and Robert Davidson, and the Jacob and Gwendolyn Lawrence Foundation. Gallery 9. Through Aug. 7 - "A New Deal: Artists at Work". During the Great Depression of the 1930s, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt launched his ambitious Works Progress Administration (WPA) programs that sent millions of unemployed Americans back to work, including more than 5,000 artists. The Federal Art Project, formed under the WPA, afforded opportunities to a diverse group of artists, including women, African Americans and recent immigrants from China, Russia and Germany. This monumental effort to put artists back to work resulted in a collection of artworks intended to uplift the national spirit and encourage creativity in the face of great challenges. The Gibbes is one of a select group of institutions across the country that houses a historic collection of Federal Art Project prints. Gallery 2 & 3, Through Oct. 9 - "William Eggleston Photographs from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection". It is said that William Eggleston's unique ability to conflate the epic and the everyday has made him one of the most impactful figures in late 20th century photography. A native of Memphis, TN, Eggleston first photographed his local environs in the 1950s in black-and-white but became one of the first fine art photographers to use color to record his observations in a more heightened and accurate way. Today, his strikingly vivid yet enigmatic images of parked cars, billboards, storefronts, diners and other artifacts of the ordinary world are considered groundbreaking. The photographs presented in this edition of the museum's Charleston Collects exhibition series were selected from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection and represent many of the pioneering artist's most notable works. The exhibition will be accompanied by a full-color catalog with an essay on the artist by Simon Constantine, Ph.D., professor of photographic history at Birkbeck, University of London, and Sotheby's Art Institute. Galleries 1, 4, and 5. Permanent Exhibition -"18th and 19th Century American Paintings and Sculpture". American paintings, from colonial portraits to Civil War-era landscapes, occupy the Gibbes Main Gallery. Portraits of leading political, social, and military figures include works by Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Benjamin West, Gilbert Stuart, Thomas Sully and Samuel F.B. Morse. The gallery also features landscape and genre scenes by Angelica Kaufmann, Louis Mignot, Eastman Johnson, Conrad Wise Chapman, and William Aiken Walker. The paintings collection is complemented by examples of neoclassical sculpture on view in the Campbell Rotunda, and decorative art objects on loan from the Rivers Collection. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Artist Amanda McCavour lifts those stars up into the air in this exhibition, creating hovering constellations of colorful flora. The Toronto-based artist creates astonishing embroideries by stitching into water-soluble fabric she then dissolves to leave only the stitching. This exhibition includes a brand-new body of floral work in colored metal, also hanging from the CMA gallery ceilings to create an immersive environment. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. Upon realizing Krisel was also a sculptor. Milliken hired him to design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water.
