International African American Museum in Charleston, SC, Opens Its Doors on June 27, 2023

The International African American Museum (IAAM), in Charleston, SC, has set Tuesday, June 27, 2023, as the date that the long-awaited museum will open to the public. The opening will coincide with the observance of Juneteenth. The opening festivities will feature a number of community events in the days leading up to the launch, including an opening ceremony on June 24.

"We're excited to open IAAM's doors and showcase the incredible breadth of African American history," said Dr. Tonya Matthews, president and CEO of the International African American Museum. "IAAM strives not only to provide a space for all visitors to celebrate and connect to this history, to these stories, and to this art, but also to find meaning within their own stories. The African American journey is far longer than the 20 years it took to build this museum and we are humbly proud to step up and play our part in this story. It is time."



The attached "IAAM_Interior - Transatlantic Crossings" is a shot from the TransAtlantic Exhibit, a four-minute, large-scale, immersive media experience taking visitors on a journey from African cultural roots, through tragedy of the Middle Passage, and into local and international diaspora scenes and traditions.

Originally scheduled for Jan. 21, the Museum's opening was delayed while City of Charleston staff and contractors worked to stabilize humidity and temperature levels within the new building. With those issues now resolved, building operations will be transferred to the IAAM over the next several weeks, in preparation for the June opening.

The IAAM, which sits at the site of Gadsden's Wharf - one of the nation's most prolific former slave trading ports includes nine core exhibition galleries and a special exhibition gallery, as well as a "floating" gallery that weaves contemporary art throughout the museum. The museum will open with more than 700 artifacts dating from the 17th century to contemporary objects, alongside 1000 image and media collection pieces – all of which help connect the African American journey to its roots and connections to African and African Diaspora communities and cultures. The museum also houses the Center for Family History, a world-class genealogy and ancestry resource center, which began hosting genealogy classes and workshops in 2020. "As this magnificent new museum dem-

onstrates, Charleston isn't just a city where history happened – it's a city where history is still being made every day," said Charleston Mayor John Tecklenburg. "I couldn't be prouder of this extraordinary achievement, and of all the people who've worked so hard over the past two decades to make it a reality."

The museum's opening date coincides with Juneteenth, the annual commemoration of the day in 1865 when 250,000 enslaved people in Galveston, TX, finally learned that they had been freed by the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation – nearly two years earlier. The event has been long celebrated by many African American communities and was formally designated as a national holiday in 2021.

Through programming and a unique, authentic, empathetic storytelling, the IAAM activates its mission to honor the untold stories of the African American journey - celebrating the connections and contributions to American and global cultures – in unique and thought-provoking ways. Earlier this year, IAAM kicked off virtual and inperson programming in honor of Black History Month with a series of opportunities for both the local community and future visitors to engage with a variety of educational content. Next month, as final preparations for the official public opening begin, IAAM will host several in-person programs for the community to attend.

The International African American Museum (IAAM) explores cultures and knowledge systems retained and adapted by Africans in the Americas and the diverse journeys and achievements of these individuals and their descendants in South Carolina, the United States, and throughout the African Diaspora. IAAM is a champion of authentic, empathetic storytelling of American history and is thus one of the nation's newest platforms for the disruption of institutionalized racism as it evolves today. IAAM honors the untold stories of the African American journey from Charleston, SC, at the historically sacred site of Gadsden's Wharf and beyond.



City of North Charleston, SC, Features Works by Kathryn Parker and Jennifer Kirk Hamilton

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that concurrent solo exhibitions of paintings by Kathryn Parker (Mt. Pleasant, SC) and Jennifer Kirk Hamilton (Rock Hill, SC) will be on display at the Park Circle Gallery, in North Charleston, SC, from June 1 - 30, 2023. A reception will be held on June 2, from 5-7pm.

In Light and Life: Scenes of the Low-country, featuring works by Kathryn Parker focuses on familiar Lowcountry landscapes as a means of exploring her expressive impasto style of painting. Though many of her paintings are initially inspired by a photograph or memory, she only loosely refers back to the original image and instead uses her subject as a means to explore the textural possibilities of her medium. Using a combination of oil and coldwax, Parker creates highly textured paintings with visible, expressive brushstrokes.

"I work to capture emotions through my color choices and brushwork," says Parker. She often listens to music while she works to influence her movement and brushwork and develops her paintings intuitively.

Parker earned a degree in studio art from the University of Colorado at Denver. Moving to the South Carolina Lowcountry in 2017 has given her countless inspirations and new networking opportunities. She is a member of the Charleston Artist Guild and the Mt. Pleasant Artist Guild. Her work is part of numerous private collections and has been displayed at Mount Pleasant Town Hall, the City Gallery at Waterfront Park as part of the Piccolo Spoleto Juried Art Exhibition, the Town of Mt. Pleasant Blessing of the Fleet Festival, The Sweetgrass Festival, and Untapped Art Fest. Her work is currently for sale at the Charleston Artist Guild Gallery in downtown Charleston.

If Color Could Talk, Would it Move? Would it Walk?, featuring paintings by Jennifer Kirk Hamilton is also on view. Hamilton's walking dog series *If Color Could Talk, Would it Move? Would it Walk?* developed organically during the painter's daily walks with her dogs. She was taking photos while walking her dogs when she Page 6 - Carolina Arts, June 2023

noticed how interesting the dogs looked in motion and she decided to paint them. After doing several paintings of the dogs, she decided to create a series from the perspective of the walker.

"This developed into years of study," explains Hamilton. "That study became more and more about not just the dogs, but about the actual psychological part of the walk." For many, walking is a tool for contemplation and daydreaming. Hamilton pursues this dreamlike, meandering quality in her paintings about walking her dogs. She is interested in how paint can be used to describe movement on a still image, not just the movement of the dogs, but the forward, shifting perspective of the daydreaming walker. Hamilton credits this creative problem with leading her to new ways of painting.

"As the years and paintings continued, my work evolved into more abstract, expressionistic, and introspective versions. I use colors, brush strokes, and paint drips to mimic emotions, actions, and movement...I found myself manipulating each stroke as deliberate as a step."

Hamilton lives and works in Rock Hill, SC. She has been a professional artist since 1976 and maintains her art studio at the Center for the Arts on Main Street. She began her art career working primarily with watercolor and explored a variety of subjects, including landscapes, florals, and figures in the landscape. She found her signature style in 2001 when she began painting her two dogs walking in the park.

Hamilton's work is collected throughout the east coast and Canada and she has won numerous awards in the state including Best in Show 2008 SCWS Annual Exhibition. In 2016, after years of self-study and tutelage from nationally known instructors, she returned to Winthrop University to pursue her BFA degree with a concentration in Sculpture.



The Charleston Museum in Charleston, SC, Continues Celebration of 250th Anniversary

The Charleston Museum, located on Meeting Street in downtown Charleston, SC, is pleased to announce its 250th anniversary exhibit, America's First Museum: 250 Years of Collecting, Preserving, and Educating, on view in two parts through Jan. 7, 2024. Part 2 of the exhibition will go on view starting on June 17 and continuing through Jan. 7, 2024.

The Museum's collection celebrates the natural and cultural history of the South Carolina Lowcountry. Today, the Museum's collections, which include over 2.4 million objects, are unmatched in their interpretive value to South Carolina history and the nation.

Part one of America's First Museum: 250 Years of Collecting, Preserving, and Educating began on Dec. 17, 2022, and displays objects that span its impressive history. As a key seaport in the American South, the Museum's collections came in from every corner of the globe before they took on a more Lowcountry South Carolina focus in the 20th century.

Accordingly, the exhibit reflects diverse collections. Highlights include objects from ancient Rome, Sumerian cuneiforms, a chief's helmet from the Sandwich Islands acquired in 1798, Japanese Samurai armor, the earliest known Charleston sampler, the suit worn at the Court of St. James by Thomas Pinckney when minister to Great Britain, and exquisite fans made by African American craftsman Tobias Scott.

Commemorating two and a half centuries since its founding and spanning nearly 4.6 billion years of history, we are pleased to present America's First Museum: 250 Years of Collecting, Preserving, and Educating - Part 2. This year-long exhibit will feature a wide array of objects that tell the story of this impressive institution and its remarkable collections. Part one will highlight objects from ancient Rome, Chief's helmet from the Sandwich Islands acquired in 1798, Colonial dress, (https://www.charlestonmuseum.org/).

and Japanese Samurai armor. Opening on June 17, part two will showcase a church pew made by enslaved hands measuring 20 feet in length, centuries old Archaic carved bone pins, a skull from the largest known flying bird and a couture Fortuny

"It is an incredible privilege for all of us at the Charleston Museum to curate and offer an exhibit as special as this," said Carl Borick, Director, The Charleston Museum, and primary author of *The Charles*ton Museum: America's First Museum. "Bringing in objects from our five major collections and a tremendous group effort by our curatorial and exhibits team, this engaging exhibit not only highlights the history of the Museum but also documents the history of our area, both the positive and the difficult, through these wonderful collection pieces."

The Charleston Museum, founded in 1773 and considered America's first museum, is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization located at 360 Meeting Street in downtown Charleston. The Museum is home to the most extensive collection of South Carolina-related natural and cultural history materials known, two National Historic Landmark Houses and the Dill Sanctuary, a 580-acre wildlife preserve. The Museum's mission is to educate Charleston area residents and visitors about the natural and cultural history of the South Carolina Lowcountry through collections, exhibitions, preservation, conservation, research, and related programming. Museum exhibits provide a comprehensive overview of the South Carolina Lowcountry, while its historic houses offer insight into the families that owned the properties, the people they enslaved, and historic Charleston architecture. The Dill Sanctuary is only available for special scheduled programs.



Charleston Crafts Gallery is spotlighting four of our artists producing fine craft inspired by the global environment. While these talented artists will be featured, the work of all Gallery members will be on display and available for purchase, including jewelry, wood puzzles, encaustic paints, fiber art, mixed media collage, apparel and accessories, plus functional and decorative objects in wood, ceramic, and glass.

LuAnne Rosenzweig learned sewing and garment construct from her mother. Her wearable art began with cotton origami jackets consisting of 6 separate squares of fabric sewn together, and through folding and minimal cutting, the squares evolved into a swing jacket with raglan sleeves. Rosenzweig repurposes vintage clothing into sling purses, long, multi-paneled knit vests, bow ties and hand-dyed silk scarves.

Raquel Quiroz is a fiber artisan originally from Peru living in Charleston. She designs all of her beautifully knitted and crocheted works of art into knitted garments, acces-

sories and sweet, lovely dolls. She infuses contemporary style into centuries-old traditions passed down through her family for generations.

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





Davies has a 'beginners mind' and loves exploring different mediums, subjects, and techniques as she continues her artistic journey. Currently she is working on collage and abstracts, pastels, and local landscapes in oil and acrylic.

Bob Taft has been creating pottery for over eighteen years, and can always be surprised by the outcome. Sometimes firing a piece doesn't go as planned because the kiln will always have its say. A piece you think is great going in, can die in the stress of the fire. A good piece can rise to greatness. It's a gamble, and that keeps the process interest-

Taft enjoys the fact that the creative process of creating pottery yields an actual product and he typically creates woodfired stoneware forms, as well as raku and porcelain pieces. His work leans toward the traditional southern pottery style and he is particularly skilled at throwing large vessels and lidded jars.


Taft believes that fire was the first magic technology humans learned to control.

changed the nature of food, making it safer and tastier. It transformed clay from mud into vessels and gods, helped to make totems to protect us and jars to keep wine and grain safe. While potters can still fire pieces in bonfire pits, the majority of today's work is fired by the electric kiln.

Occasionally Taft has opportunities to fire in the raging fires of an anagama or groundhog wood fired kilns. Whatever method, as a potter he conspires with luck, heat, time, and the chemicals of glazes to create a piece. And if everything aligns, he has created something greater than what

Taft is a founding member of the Greenwood Area Studio Potters, a local potters guild with over 25 members. He studied wheel throwing with Gary Clontz at Piedmont Technical College's Creative Economies Program in Edgefield, SC. While the program is no longer available, in the years that it was active, it produced over 30 potters who still live and work in South Carolina, Georgia, and North Carolina.







The University of South Carolina Upstate in Spartanburg, SC, is presenting reflect, featuring works by Leah Mulligan Cabinum, on view at the Upstate Art lery, through Aug. 5, 2023.

Cabinum's unique work lures the viewer into a labyrinth of playful complexity. The relationship of materials, symbolism and concepts are intertwined as a process and as metaphor for growth and discovery. Cabinum said, "My work is a means for me to explore my identity. Comprised of light-infused acrylic tubing and mylar, the viewer is invited to experience an everchanging, morphed perspective from within a reflective environment. The repetition and physicality of this piece merges the form with the concept.



The University of South Carolina in Columbia, SC, is presenting Needlework: Women's Unspoken Art, an exhibition which celebrates women's artistry and imagination through needlework, on view at the McKissick Museum, through Aug. 31, 2023.

More than a required skill for girls and women in the 19th century, hand sewing was an act of creative expression. From functional household textiles, to clothing, to home décor accents, small embellishments made a big statement as an indicator of women's artistry and imagination.

The exhibition was guest curated by art history major and USC staff member Rachel McKeown. This exhibit celebrates the individuality and craftsmanship of historic textiles from McKissick Museum's permanent collection. The exhibit examines the embellishments as fine art, contending that the aesthetic qualities and skillful mastery of techniques are of greater historical significance than the textile's function. Viewers are thus encouraged to closely examine the quality of the needlework, rather than

the type of textile, on display.

Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center in Asheville, NC, Offers Exhibit Focused on the College's Links to Mexico

Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center (BMCM+AC) in Asheville, NC, will present Black Mountain College and *Mexico*, on view from June 2 through Sept. 9, 2023. A reception will be held on June 2, from 5:30-8pm.

Black Mountain College (1933–1957), a small but remarkably influential liberal arts school in rural North Carolina, had important links to Mexico that until now have been little investigated. A crucible of twentieth-century creativity, BMC galvanized and inspired artists and intellectuals from around the world, while Mexico's innovations and age-old traditions - in fine and applied arts, architecture, poetry, music, performance, and more - dovetailed with, and indeed drove, global impulses toward modernism and beyond.

Among the many key BMC figures whose lives were importantly touched by experiences in Mexico were Anni and Josef Albers, Ruth Asawa, John Cage, Jean Charlot, Elaine de Kooning, Buckminster Fuller, Carlos Mérida, Robert Motherwell, Charles Olson, Clara Porset, M.C. Richards, and Aaron Siskind.

In turn, engagements with BMC and its legacy have played a significant role in shaping contemporary approaches to art in Mexico, evident in the works of Jorge Méndez Blake, Iñaki Bonillas, Abraham Cruzvillegas, Jose Dávila, Gerda Gruber, Lake Verea, Gabriel Orozco, and Damián Ortega, among others.

The exhibition BMC/MX features works by these and other prominent contemporary Mexican artists alongside a selection of historic works by BMC artists, highlighting the ways in which ideas and modalities are translated across materials, space, and time.

Related programming, planned in collaboration with Mexican artists, features a series of public events, including a performance by artist (and BMC/MX co-curator) David Miranda to take place at Different World; an exhibition visit (in Spanish and English) with BMC/MX Project Director Eric Baden; and a series of experiential art events in the BMCM+AC library.

The exhibition is accompanied by the book Black Mountain College and Mexico (forthcoming late summer 2023), which investigates the people, ideas, and practices linking BMC and Mexico during the life of the school, as well as resonances between BMC and the work of contemporary Mexican artists. With contributions by BMC/ MX's curators, as well as by artist Abraham Cruzvillegas, design scholar Ana Elena Mallet, and author and activist Margaret Randall, this fully illustrated volume brings new light to this complex and underexplored subject.

BMC/MX is an investigation into modes of communication - the arenas in which new ideas and alliances may come to be - between Black Mountain College and Mexico, between past and present, between form and idea.


BMC/MX's Project Director Eric Baden is a photographer and from 1994 to 2022 was professor of photography at Warren Wilson College in Swannanoa, NC. He is the founding director of photo+, a multidisciplinary arts event held in Asheville, NC.

Artist and educator David Miranda is curator at the Museo Experimental El Eco (Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México, UNAM), and teaches at the Escuela Nacional de Pintura, Escultura y Grabado "La Esmeralda" in Mexico City.

Diana Stoll is an editor, writer and curator who works with institutions such as The Museum of Modern Art and the J. Paul Getty Museum. She has served as an editor at Aperture and Artforum magazines, utes writings to prominent arts publications.

Founded in 1933, Black Mountain College was one of the leading experimental liberal art schools in America until its closure in 1957. After the Bauhaus in Germany closed due to mounting antagonism from the Nazi Party, Josef and Anni Albers readily accepted an offer to join the Black Mountain College faculty. During their 16year tenure in North Carolina, the Alberses helped model the college's interdisciplinary curriculum on that of the Bauhaus, attracting an unmatched roster of teachers and students including R. Buckminster Fuller, Elaine and Willem de Kooning, John Cage, Merce Cunningham, Mary Caroline (M.C.) Richards, and Robert Rauschenberg.

The Black Mountain College Museum + Arts Center (BMCM+AC) was founded in 1993 to celebrate the history of Black Mountain College as a forerunner in progressive interdisciplinary education and to celebrate its extraordinary impact on modern and contemporary art, dance, theater, music, and performance.

Josh Coté has always been immersed in art. His grandparents were both oil painters, and his father was a watercolorist. He grew up "on the road" in the '60s, '70s, and '80s, traveling to art fairs up and down the east coast with his family. As a kid, he was inspired by authors like Lewis Carroll, H.G. Wells, and Dr. Seuss, whom he credits for drawing him into "a magical dream world."

After studying painting and drawing at the University of Michigan's School of Art continued above on next column to the right | & Design, Coté became a self-taught sculp-



tor. He's best known for his fanciful wire sculptures of wild and mythical creatures, created using only needle-nosed pliers and a hammer. The wire is cold-worked, painstakingly hand-manipulated, and wrapped and woven to create the desired structure. His finished works are much like pen and ink drawings in sculptural form, and many of his pieces include antique found objects that evoke a sense of child-like nostalgia.

Established in 1992, Grovewood Gallery is noted for its charming, old-world set-

in child portraiture. In between my commission work, I 'paint outside the lines' using the same knowledge of painting skills: use of composition, edges, color, value, temperature of light and color. The same skills can be used to move viewer eyes around an abstract or a landscape or a portrait."

"With forty plus years of painting children's portraits with a heavy hand in landscape portraits, I've eventually worked my way to letting go of figures within the landscape for a pure landscape," adds Hargrove. "Over time of painting landscapes, details go away until I pretty much was painting abstracted landscapes. Currently, I've been experimenting with pure abstract without any landscape or figurative reference within the painting."

"An artist's career never stays static if one is continually learning and experimenting with mediums, form, and techniques. We experiment. We grow. We change. We keep repeating the process as we mature in our work and in our lives," says Hargrove.

The WEDGE is the legacy of John Payne, sculptor, inventor, engineer. Although no longer with us in the flesh, Payne's vision continues to inspire an entire generation of artists aand visitors alike. He was always the first to help artists by giving

Surrounded by 12 gorgeous acres, much of woodblock printer Kent Ambler's work depicts the wildlife and woodlands around his home. Each woodcut brings to life a memory or a moment drawn from the richness of his environment.

Potter Shawn Ireland creates rustic yet refined functional wares from a variety of natural materials. Wild clay and mineral additions add a deep sense of place to his clay and glazes, while wood firing allows for unpredictability in the glaze and results in an aged look. He is well-known for his animalware: vases, candlesticks, and bowls often in the shape of animals or with animal features that were inspired both by his beloved pottery mentor Douglass Rankin and historical pottery of the Etruscan culture.


Blowing Rock Art and History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, Features Works from Gardena High School

The Blowing Rock Art and History Museum (BRAHM) in Blowing Rock, NC, will present *GIFTED: Collecting the Art of California at Gardena High School*, 1919-1956, on view in the Fort & Atwell Galleries, from June 20 through Dec. 30, 2023.

GIFTED: Collecting the Art of California at Gardena High School: 1919-1956 was developed for the hundredth anniversary of the Gardena High School Art Collection (GHSAC) in 2019 and illustrates the unlikely history of a communal approach to collection-building and a microcosm of California's modern art history. A century ago, an exceptionally focussed art collection was born out of the recommendation of a school principal. He urged the senior class of Gardena High School to gift the school with an original landscape painting by artist Ralph Davison Miller. Thus began an unprecedented annual tradition:

For nearly 40 years, each senior class selected, purchased and donated works of art to the school, ultimately amassing an exceptional permanent collection of paintings. Each gift was carefully selected and purchased from an artist of note, often reflecting historical content from that year. The high level of sophistication demonstrated by the students' choices was the result of the aesthetic discourse and collaboration

nurtured by the school.

Today, the Gardena High School Art Collection is widely acknowledged as one of the nation's outstanding collections of early 20th century California art, with works by some of the state's most celebrated artists. Through more than 40 paintings, *GIFTED* traces the history of Southern California art in the early 20th century, when plein-air painting and the Arts and Crafts movement were flourishing, and chronicles the school's ambitious efforts within the wider cultural scene of Los Angeles at that time.

GIFTED: Collecting the Art of California at Gardena High School, 1919-1956 is organized by the GHS Art Collection, Inc. in association with the Gardena High School Student Body and curated by Susan M. Anderson. BRAHM's presentation of this exhibition is generously supported by the Miriam & Robert Hayes Charitable Foundation. Additional funding was provided by Our State Magazine.

University of North Carolina at Greensboro, NC, Offers Works From Its Collection

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro, NC, is presenting Making Room: Familiar Art, New Stories, on view at the Weatherspoon Art Museum's 1st Floor: Louise D. and Herbert S. Falk, Sr. Gallery, Sculpture Courtyard, 2nd Floor: The Gregory D. Ivy Gallery, Weatherspoon Guild Gallery, and Gallery 6, from June 3 through Spring 2024.

How might the Weatherspoon better engage with museum participants to share fuller and more inclusive stories of American art? This question sparked an eighteenmonth-long curatorial and programming project starting in January 2022. We've been listening to people as they share what matters to them in the museum, and we've created this installation of the museum's art ollection based on what we learned

Making Room: Familiar Art, New Stories presents 43 artworks from the Weatherspoon's collection of more than 6,500. Each was chosen in response to what more than 4,000 community members told us they care about. These visitor responses - which ranged from poems to doodles to personal statements were gathered in multiple ways. Within the Inquiry Hubs, for example, the visitor engagement team coordinated pop-up gallery performances and facilitated collection-based inquiry and play. One thing we heard repeatedly: caring requires doing. As one museum visitor wrote, "I show my family I am there for them through actions." We chose to organize this installation around the broad theme of caring—of being there—using four spaces dedicated to what we heard people care about: FAMILY, COMMUNITY, PLACE, and MEMORY.

Staff also focused on how the museum's own learning and growth could be made visible in this installation. We listened to the art department professors who said the collection lacked examples of social practice art, then acquired photographs of commu-

nity performances by artists Dread Scott and Lorraine O'Grady. You'll find them in the COMMUNITY and PLACE rooms, respectively.

We reviewed the physical needs of objects in our collection and sent an iconic light-based sculpture by artist Tom Lloyd for specialized electronic repairs. It now shines a light on issues of social justice in the MEMORY room. We discovered, in dialogue with a contemporary artist, how stories about people who impacted the Weatherspoon itself might lead to the creation of new artwork. You can see Angela Fraleigh's painting inspired by famous art collectors Etta and Claribel Cone in the FAMILY room.

Another word that we encountered repeatedly while reading visitor responses was "connect." We hope that you find Making Room to be a place to connect with yourself, with works of art both new and familiar, and with your family and community. This installation is at once the culmination of a project and a waystation on an ongoing journey of learning by do-

ing. Thank you for participating! We invite you to continue to do so. New stories will emerge, and new choices will be made.


University of North Carolina at Greensboro, NC, Features Photographs from Collection of Bank of America

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro, NC, is presenting Shared Space: The New Era (1987-2019) | Photographs from the Bank of America Collection, on view at the Weatherspoon Art Museum's 2nd Floor: The Bob & Lissa Shelley McDowell Gallery, through Aug. 5, 2023.

Shared Space: The New Era (1987– 2010) | Photographs from the Bank of America Collection acts as a time capsule, traversing an evolving social landscape through photographs and video created over the span of more than 20 years. The exhibition features 35 images by 23 international artists who explore how the physical spaces in which we interact have evolved alongside our increasing access to a virtual "global village." The works illustrate the ways in which our homes and backyards, city streets and plazas, ports and airplanes, and urban and rural landscapes have grown into collective spaces through communication avenues such as the World Wide Web and social media, as well as globalization.

The images range from depictions of masses of people congregating in public spaces to environments physically transformed by the demands of a global economy. The photographs also illustrate some of the adverse effects of our fast-paced technological age, particularly the impact of humankind's ever-expanding footprint and the dysfunction and discord that can lurk beneath surfaces. Shared Space is ultimately open-ended, inviting us to reflect upon the exponential growth of our collective "shared space" and imagine the unbounded common areas of our future.

Cone Memorial Endowed Director of the Weatherspoon Art Museum, said, "As a hub for innovative teaching and learning, the Weatherspoon is an inclusive and dynamic catalyst for people's engagement with art and one another. Partnering with Bank of America to present this diverse collection of contemporary photography, we collectively create an opportunity for visitors to experience these artists' perspectives while considering their own."

The exhibition acts as a time capsule, its point of departure 1987, the year US President Ronald Reagan and Soviet General Secretary Mikhail Gorbachev signed the Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Treaty (INF), a historical nuclear arms agreement. This event, along with the fall of the Berlin Wall and the dissolution of the Soviet Union, marked the end of the Cold War and a new era of globalization. Included in the exhibition is an actual fragment from the Berlin Wall, marking the moment in 1989 when East and West Berliners were able to communicate and traverse freely across the former boundary. Parallel to these events was a technological revolution with the rise of the World Wide Web, which created a vast digital world without borders.

"This exhibition will truly resonate with anyone who experienced the emergence of the World Wide Web and personal access to such technologies as smart phones and iPads. These photographs were created at the cusp of this new reality and indicate what artists were drawn to both technically and thematically at this historical moment,"

says Elaine D. Gustafson, Curator and Head of Collections and Facilities at the museum. She organized the exhibition's presentation at the Weatherspoon.

She adds that the exhibition presents a rare chance to see work by such renowned photographers in one fascinating exhibition. "It focuses on an international cast of artists who were major practitioners of the medium, so it's a unique opportunity to view work by these artists in one place at one time," she notes. "The majority of the images are large scale and were produced with large-format cameras. As a result there is a level of detail that is spellbinding. I think visitors will be amazed by what the photographs capture and convey."

Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, Offers New Exhibitions

The Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting several exhibitions including: *Black Mountain College: Seedbed of American Art*, on view in the Northwest Bedroom Gallery, through June 25, 2023; *Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Reynolda*, on view in the Master Bedroom Gallery, through Dec. 31, 2023.

The exhibit *Black Mountain College:* Seedbed of American Art is on view in the Northwest Bedroom Gallery.

Black Mountain College, which was open in western North Carolina from 1933–57, was a site of collaboration among people, practices, disciplines, and performances that generated astonishing creativity and continues to spark innovation among contemporary writers and artists. It was a college for free spirits, where both faculty and students could explore new ways of learning and fresh approaches to the varied subjects that comprise the liberal arts

This exhibition is curated by Thomas Frank. Dr. Frank is professor emeritus from Wake Forest University and an editor of the Black Mountain Studies journal. He has selected works by former students and faculty of the short-lived experimental college from the collections of Reynolda and Wake Forest, including Josef and Anni Albers, Jacob Lawrence, Lyonel Feininger, and Robert Rauschenberg.

The exhibit *Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Reynolda* is on view in the Master Bedroom Gallery.

"Into a daybreak that's wondrously clear / I rise." Maya Angelou's poem "Still I Rise," published in 1978, was an assertion of dignity and resilience in the face of oppression. In the 1980s, Angelou used Reynolda as her stage, sharing words of humanity, survival, and triumph. But before her, numerous Black lives impacted and intersected with the story of Reynolda. Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Reynolda examines the lives of the Black women and men who helped shape Reynolda as it evolved from a Jim Crow era working estate into a museum for American art.

From 1912 through the 1950s, during one of the most repressive climates for Black people in North Carolina history, Black men and women navigated Reynolda's segregated spaces—farming the land, constructing buildings, and working as domestic staff within Reynolda's walls. During this era, segregation, the exploitation of Black labor, and laws that regulated Black behavior affected the lives of all individuals in the Reynolda story, whether at Reynolda or at the R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company.

While the struggle for equality did not end with the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the story of Reynolda pivoted to one of a public cultural institution. When it opened its doors in 1967, Reynolda's intersection with Black lives shifted as the young, fledgling museum provided a venue for Black artists to celebrate their art. Artists such as Jacob Lawrence, Romare Bearden, and Maya Angelou transformed the historic setting into a stage for their art and teachings. Through art, letters, photographs, and audiovisual recordings, Still I Rise: The Black Experience at Revnolda examines Reynolda's complicated past in a space designed for reflection and heal-

Artworks Gallery in Winston-Salem, NC, Features Works by Karen Kopf and Jessica Tefft

Artworks Gallery in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting two new exhibitions including: *D.C. al Fine*, featuring new works by Karen Kopf, on view through July 1, 2023, and *Peaceable Kingdom*, featuring new works by Jessica Tefft, on view through July 1, 2023. A receptions will be held on June 2, from 7-9pm and an Art Crush will be held on June 16, from 7-9

Karen Kopf is inspired by Jazz, classical, and rock music, merged with the natural world to create a sensory experience rather than a narrative one. Sketching the natural forms in the world, she then composes the painting by overlapping individual forms to create more forms within the whole. The result is a web of conflicting energies with many intricate textures.

Gold, silver and copper leafing is used liberally throughout the works. The overall impression of the paintings is a tactile and luminous interpretation of the energy within forms in nature.

After studying painting in Austria for a year, Kopf established a studio in Marbella, Spain on the Costa del Sol. Five years under the bright Spanish sun added an intensity to the colors of her palette and a wide range of experiences and exhibitions to her career as a professional artist. Her works from this period are in collections all over the world.

Upon returning to the US, she painted in

upstate New York, where she was resident director of Guy Park State Historic Site. Eventually she moved to Winston-Salem where she earned a Master's degree from Salem College and worked for twenty years as a teacher while she and her husband raised two sons. She currently exhibits at Artworks Gallery in Winston-Salem.

A framed print of the *Peaceable King-dom* by Edward Hicks hung in Jessica Tefft's living room when she was growing up.

The lion's eyes appeared to watch over her. Later, she realized Hicks' painting was a visual sermon promoting spiritual and earthly harmony. In addition to being a painter, Hicks was a Quaker minister, and his works were based on Isaiah 11:6-9: "The wolf also shall dwell with the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; and the calf and the young lion and the fatling together; and a little child shall lead them."

When Tefft created this new body of work, she thought about how the *Peaceable Kingdom* would look today in our guncrazed country. These works express her thinking on how the things we hold most beautiful are also the most targeted.

Tefft is an artist and professional photographer based in Winston-Salem. She believes art offers her the language to explore themes of trauma and healing. She also sees art as a lens through which to interpret current events. She worked as a photojournalist in Washington, DC, and elsewhere and has exhibited and won numerous awards for her work.

Photojournalism took her from Cuba to the Alaskan wilderness, and then the presidential campaign trail. She assembled and edited an entry for coverage of the DC sniper that was a Pulitzer Prize finalist. She graduated from Wake Forest University with a degree in studio art and is currently working toward a master's in public administration. She is the founder and executive director of The Art SHAC, a creative reuse nonprofit providing affordable art supplies to her community.

She studied art at the Maryland Institute College of Art, Baltimore, MD, then moved to New York City where she studied at the Art Student's League of New York and the Stanley William Hayter's Atelier 17.

Among her many honors, Gillespie received The Alice Baber Art Fund, Inc. Grant Award; a Doctor of Pedagogy, Niagara University, Niagara Falls, NY 1990; a Doctor of Fine Arts (Honoris Causa)

Caldwell College, Caldwell, NY 1976; an Allied Professions Award, Virginia Society; The American Institute of Architects, Richmond, VA, 1986; Distinguished Alumni Award, Maryland Institute, College of Art, Baltimore, MD 1983; Outstanding Services Award, University of Arkansas at Little Rock, AR, 1983; and, the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Women's Caucus for Art in 2001.

She also received the Gala 8 "Distinguished Woman" Award at Birmingham Southern College in 1987 honoring women who have made "lasting contributions to our society in the fields of endeavor ranging from the arts, medicine, philanthropy, journalism, government, sports, entertainment and business".

In addition to her demanding studio work, Gillespie served as a Distinguished Professor of Art, Radford University, Radford, VA, 1997-99; on the Board of Trustees, Maryland Institute, College of Art, Baltimore, Maryland 1996-99; on the Board of Trustees, Maitland Art Center, Maitland, FL 1996-99; and on the Art in Public Places Committee, Broward Cultural Affairs Council, June 1993-June 1994; and as Visiting Artist, Radford University, Radford, VA, 1981-83 where she initiated the University's permanent art collection through a gift of her own work and where her work is now archived, also she was a Woodrow Wilson Visiting Fellow from 1985-1993. During that period, she made week-long visits to small private colleges throughout the country and gave public lectures, coached and taught young artists.

Early in her career, Gillespie contributed to the women's art movement through her work at Artist in Residence, Women's Interart Center, New York, NY 1972 and her lecture series at the New School for Social Research, New York, NY 1977.

Gillespie is the subject of numerous reviews, critical essays, film and radio interviews and a book Dorothy Gillespie published by the Radford University Foundation Press.

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

The Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, is presenting Sequential: New Work, featuring works by Chieko Murasugi and Renzo Ortega, through July 8, 2023.

Painting is a sequential endeavor. A painting consists of a sequence of brush strokes, a series is a sequence of paintings, and a body of work is the culmination of the artist's production. Every painter is also indebted to the long succession of painters who preceded them. In this exhibition, painters Chieko Murasugi and Renzo Ortega, arriving from very different backgrounds and pictorial approaches, create works that speak to the idea of sequence, both within the canvas and outside of it, all the while expressing their vision of what painting means at this

Murasugi employs personal symbols and visual illusions within an abstract language to access the realm of ideas. She visualizes the notion of chance by using a computer program to "roll the dice" and introduce randomized elements into ordered sequences and patterns. In these paintings, selected features are randomized within both traditional and novel patterns to create a balance between predictable and unstable perceptions.

Murasugi frequently employs the hexagon, a Japanese symbol of longevity and a shape that holds personal significance. By chance, her parents narrowly escaped the fires from M-69 incendiary bombs dropped on Tokyo during WWII, bombs housed in hexagon shaped containers. In other paintings, Murasugi incorporates the recently discovered Einstein hat shape that is based upon the hexagon and creates tile patterns that do not repeat. Lack of repetition is a crucial characteristic of randomness.



ment, "As a trained scientist, my explorations often begin with a question. In most paintings shown here, my question was: can one detect random/chance events within an ordered field? My answer so far, not surprisingly, is yes and no, it varies with the circumstances. It depends, for instance, upon the location, salience, and relative quantity of the random elements. As I continue these investigations, I ponder to what degree chance affects lives, and whether random events receive due credit. These, of course, were my original questions."

Chieko Murasugi was born in Tokyo to a mathematician father and artist mother, and immigrated to Canada with her family when she was three years old. Growing up in Toronto, she studied Social Psychology (BA, McGill U) and Visual Arts (BFA, York U) before earning a doctorate in Experimental Psychology, specializing in Visual Perception (PhD, York U). She was awarded an NSERC Postdoctoral Fellowship to conduct visual neuroscience research on monkeys at Stanford University. After publishing several scientific papers, she began an independent painting practice in San Francisco while raising two children with her neurophysiologist husband. She moved to the NC Triangle in 2012. In 2019, she received an MFA in Studio Art from UNC-CH, and co-founded BASEMENT, an artist-run experimental project space in Chapel Hill.

Murasugi has exhibited her paintings and mixed media works widely in galleries and museums, including Greenhill, and the Ackland, Wiregrass, Weatherspoon, and Mint Museums. Her paintings can be found in public and corporate collections, such as Duke University, City of Raleigh, TIAA, and Honeywell. Chieko is the recipient of Wildacres, Black Mount College and Art Center (digital), and Hambidge residences, as well as an Ella Fountain Pratt Emerging Artists Grant and grants from the Orange County Arts Compractice is featured in Liza Roberts' 2022 book, "Art of the State: Celebrating the Visual Art of North Carolina."

Renzo Ortega offered the following statement, "Art generates bonds and belongs to people's memories. My artwork reflects the sociopolitical and geographical context where I live. In Lima-Perú, where I grew up, the Andes' colors melt with urban chaos. I lived in a multicultural New York for 16 years. I now live in North Carolina, where the landscape view transformed the colors of my palette. These transitions have influenced my art practice; I embody freedom in the various styles that coexist in my paintings, and I believe painting is an infinite loop of life itself, a vast universe of artistic creation."

"In North Carolina, I have been working on a series of paintings about my impressions of our current times," adds Ortega. "My native heritage, empowered by my immigrant experience, solidifies my American identity that connects and acknowledges the lands of the original

Duke University in Durham, NC, is presenting Andy Warhol: You Look Good in Pictures, on view at The Nasher Museum of Art, through Aug. 27, 2023.

For Andy Warhol, the camera was a device through which he saw the world. The artist was rarely without one, whether it was his beloved portable Polaroid SX-70 instant, a conventional 35mm single lens reflex, or the movie cameras with which he made hundreds of films. Photographic imagery - his own, other artists', and everyday massproduced commercial photographs - was the foundation for nearly his entire artistic vision and output.

Andy Warhol: You Look Good in Pictures explores the breadth of the artist's relationship with photography through several distinct bodies of work including screenprints of celebrities, all of which were taken from photographs, a group of Polaroids and black and white snapshots illustrating his social circles, and an early silent film of the curator Henry Geldzahler from 1964.

Often re-photographing and re-imaging

the same subjects over and over again, Warhol focused as much on the act of photography as he did the people in the images. One of the disarming things about Warhol's image-making process was the way in which he often disregarded established photographic conventions such as composition, exposure, and other technical elements that make a "good" photograph. He constantly documented his life and those around him in candid pictures with a freewheeling manner and once quipped, "My idea of a good picture is one that's in focus and of a famous person."

Today, Warhol's work feels more prescient than ever. He would have no doubt loved social media networks, aesthetically enhancing digital filters, and delighted at the ubiquity of smartphones capable of spreading images across the globe at the touch of a button.

University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NC, Offers Exhibition **Focused on Peck Collection**

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NC, is presenting Focus on the Peck Collection: Studying with Rembrandt, on view at the Ackland Art Museum, through Aug. 6, 2023.

Rembrandt van Rijn understood drawing as the foundation of the visual arts. This Focus on the Peck Collection installation presents works by Rembrandt, Philips de Koninck, and Abraham Furnerius that illustrate and exemplify the drawing exercises Rembrandt assigned his pupils. Through the completion of these exercises, students perfected their ability to draw from life and learned to create naturalistic images and compositions in the style of their master.

In January 2017, the Ackland Art Museum received its largest gift to date when Sheldon Peck (UNC-Chapel Hill, BS '63, DDS '66) and his wife Leena donated their extraordinary collection of 134 mostly 17th-century Dutch and Flemish master drawings, as well as significant funds for the stewardship of the collection, new acquisitions, and an endowed curatorial position in European and American art before 1950. At least one example from the collection is always on view at the Museum, but because these works of art on paper are light-sensitive, we rotate a select number of drawings with other objects from our permanent collection in an ongoing display called Focus on the Peck Collection.

Sheldon Peck, a native of Durham, is a double alumnus of the University, receiving his undergraduate degree from Carolina in 1963 and his doctorate from the UNC School of Dentistry in 1966. He and Leena enjoyed distinguished careers as prominent orthodontic specialists and educators in the Boston area.

The Peck Collection started as a collaboration between Sheldon and his late brother Harvey and continued as a joint interest



Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, Offers New Exhibit

The Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, will present From Earth To Sky, featuring terra cotta pottery vessels by Garry Childs, artistic fine furniture by Pete Rodrigues, and watermedia collage paintings by Nancy Smith, on view from June 27 through July 23, 2023. A reception will be held on June 30, from 6-9pm.

Garry Childs' artwork is formed on a potter's wheel from terra-cotta clay. After the clay has stiffened up enough to handle, but is not completely dry, he applies glazes and then carves patterns through the glaze into the damp clay. When completely dry the pots are fired in a gas kiln to a little over 2,100 degrees.

"In the past few years I have been applying some local clays directly to the pots in a liquid form. These clays are used straight from the ground with all the naturally occurring impurities and organic material to provide interesting surface textures," says Childs

"The shapes and forms of my work have become more and more important to me," says Childs. "We often refer to parts of pots like parts of the human body. Neck, shoulder, belly, foot and lip are used for both. I see people in the curves of the shapes. Many have what I think of as a feminine form with slow soft curves. Put your arms around one, you'll see what I mean.'

"I still feel new to the gallery and to the art world as a whole," says furniture maker Pete Rodrigues. "For the last 25 years, I have created pieces out of wood. Becoming a resident artist in the gallery has allowed me to be more creative, using my imagination and discovering possibilities."

Rodrigues is excited about his new wall art that will be a part of From Earth To Sky.

"These artistic designs consist of contemporary shapes and are held to the wall with magnets. 

The first American miniature portraits were painted in Charleston, and today the Gibbes is home to one of the most prestigious portrait miniature collections in the United States. Containing more than six hundred objects, the collection spans nearly two hundred years and represents the work of over a hundred artists. Small enough to fit in the palm of the hand, these tiny portraits were treasured remembrances of loved ones in the age before photography. Presented in state-of-the-art display cases, and in viewable storage drawers featured miniatures include works by Mary Roberts, Jeremiah Theus, Henry Benbridge, Charles Wilson Peale, Pierre Henri, Edward Greene Malbone, George Engleheart, and Charles Fraser. Gallery 6, Permanent Exhibition - "20th Century American Regionalism and the Charleston Renaissance". At the turn of the twentieth century, American artists looked to their European counterparts and beyond as they developed identifiably American artistic movements. Two particularly strong influences during this time period were French Impressionism and Japanese woodblock prints. Another prevailing theme during this period was the growing interest in American subject matter. American regionalism and social realism played important roles in the development of art in Charleston, which flourished as a destination for artists, particularly during the years of 1915 to 1945 a period now known as the Charleston Renaissance. Gallery 7, Permanent Exhibition - "Modern and Contemporary". Modern and contemporary art in America encompasses a wide range of styles, subject matter, and media. As a whole, the diversity of modern and contemporary art reflects the rich and varied heritage of our nation and

This exhibit will focus on the military career and subsequent legends and legacy of General Francis Marion (1732 – 1795). 

He attended the American Artist School in New York city as a teenager where he met renowned modern artists, including Piet Mondrian, who greatly influenced his abstract style. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. 



A century later, the Blowing Rock Charity Horse Show has transformed into a monumental event on a beautiful preserve that draws equestrians from across the country due to its reputation for being an exceptionally "fun" show for participants and spectators alike. A Hundred Years of Horses commemorates this growth and success through stories and objects illuminating the history of BRCHS. collection on the second floor of the Museum, Through Oct. 31 - "Guiding Winds," an installation by Rosalia Torres-Weiner, curated by Jennifer Sudul Edwards. The installation is part of the "Interventions Series", a new series at the Mint in which contemporary works are placed amongst permanent collection installations to create a critical dialogue between past and present. The history of humanity is a story of movement - groups migrating over land and water, carrying their ancestral practices with them. Traces remain, even when a tribe has moved on or hostile outsiders try to erase those traditions. Stories and symbols integrate, creating cultural strata that create a timeline of all who lived on a land. The maps and explanations throughout museum galleries illustrate this - sometimes overtly, other times subtly. Ongoing - "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". From crocks, jars, and jugs to pitchers, candleholders, and vases, "turning pots" is one of the oldest and richest craft traditions in North Carolina. For more than 200 years, members of the Cole family have been potting in central North Carolina Randolph, Moore, Lee, and Montgomery counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship, as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for handmade, traditional pottery. Bridges and **Levine Galleries, Ongoing -** "Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection". Focused on the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer, this installation is a survey of contemporary British studio ceramics. Comprising functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and today, the show features work by artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Gordon Baldwin and Rupert Spira, and cuttingedge ceramicists such as Julian Stair and Kate Malone. Several recently-gifted works from the Grainers are included. Alexander, Spangler, and Harris Galleries, Ongoing - "Portals to the Past: British Ceramics 1675 - 1825". The Mint Museum's collection of eighteenth-century British pottery and porcelain is widely respected for its scope and quality. The collection numbers over 2,000 objects and includes important examples of both salt-glazed and dry-bodied stoneware from Staffordshire; tin-glazed earthenware from Bristol, Liverpool, and London; and creamcolored earthenware from Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and Yorkshire. Notable eighteenth-century porcelain factories represented include Chelsea. Bow, and Vauxhall in London, Longton Hall in Staffordshire, Worcester, Bristol, and others. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. Ongoing - "Arts of Africa". The African continent is remarkable in its geographic, social, political, and cultural diversity. Photographic imagery—his own, other artists', and everyday mass-produced commercial photographs—was the foundation for nearly his entire artistic vision and output. Carter has helped style the Afrofuturism movement for almost 40 years. This dichotomy of eradication, restoration, and the ongoing struggle of the species is the inspiration for this exhibition. 
