The exhibit brings together the work of artists Ana Carolina Meza and Katharine Miele. Centering on the mechanisms of material manipulation the exhibition considers the circular nature of construction and deconstruction. The works featured in the space are formal explorations of line, shape, and form that speak to architectural elements. Ana Carolina Meza works with rhythmic geometry to create scaled structures of PLA material in a limited color palette, conceptually considering movement, displacement, and immigration. Katharine Miele considers the signs of wear and ritualistic usage as forms of storytelling and physical movement through embroidery and work with found objects. Together Meza and Miele work to examine objecthood as a way of understanding connection and place.
