We just want to be clear that there will only be that one work on display at this time and a much larger exhibit of Yerkes' works will come later.

We've featured work on our covers before by artists who are no longer living, but this was a first for us and probably won't be the last time it happens, as we at Carolina Arts like to keep a spotlight on our senior artists who keep creating art sometimes right up to their passing.
