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

City of Charleston in Charleston, SC, Offers SouthArts Traveling Exhibit

The City of Charleston Office of Cultural Affairs presents South Arts' 2021 Southern Prize and State Fellowships Exhibition, on view July 15-August 28, 2022 at City Gallery in Charleston, SC.

South Arts' 2021 Southern Prize and State Fellowships Exhibition is a touring exhibition of the award and fellowship recipients. SouthArts, headquartered in Atlanta, GA, is a nonprofit regional arts organization whose mission is to empower artists, organizations, and committees and to increase access to arts and culture.

Since 2017, its Southern Prize & State Fellowship Program has recognized and awarded direct financial support to some of the top contemporary artists in the region. A State Fellowship is awarded to an artist from the nine Southern states (Alabama, Tennessee, Kentucky, Georgia, North Carolina, Mississippi, Louisiana, Florida, and South Carolina), and a second jury selects the Southern Prize finalists and winner.

This is the third year that South Arts has established a touring exhibition for the program, and the late Wim Roefs, acted as curator for this year's exhibition. A noted curator and visual arts professional in South Carolina, Roefs was co-founder and board member of 701 Center for Contemporary Art and owner of if ART Gallery, both in Columbia, SC.

The 2021 SouthArts State Fellowship cohort includes: Tameca Cole, Alabama; Raheleh Filsoofi, Tennessee; Joyce Garner, Kentucky; Myra Greene, Georgia; Jewel Ham, North Carolina; Ming Ying Hong, Mississippi; Keith Calhoun and Chandra McCormick, Louisiana; Marielle Plaisir, Florida; and Fletcher Williams III, South Carolina. Marielle Plaisir was the winner of the 2021 Southern Prize. 

The 2022 cohort of State Fellows has been announced, and the Southern Prize for 2022 will be announced on Sept. 1, 2022 at the Bo Bartlett Center of Columbus State University. For more information on South-Arts and the State Fellows program, please visit (www.southarts.org). Words from Wim Roefs: "Keith Calhoun

and Chandra McCormick speak of 'dignity, beauty, and strength.' Tameca Cole aims for 'a better future,' and Marielle Plaisir thinks of her 'imagined ideal of utopia without oppression.' Raheleh Filsoofi's challenge of how we view 'others' and Ming Ying Hong's of stereotypes related to the body imply hope. Joyce Garner's 'allegory of people coming together around a table' does, too, as does the confidence that exudes from Myra Greene's rhapsody on the 'beautiful blend of complex information' that is the color brown. Fletcher Williams III focuses on 'our desire to establish a home and self' within the South, while Jewel Ham sees her reclaiming of African Americans' 'time, spaces and histories' as an 'act of resistance." "The good news in dire times is, then,

that a defeatist bunch they ain't, the 2021

South Arts State Fellows. And dire times they are. The earth burns and floods all at once, while science deniers deny and monied interests whistle to the tune of après moi, le déluge. Citizens of color are killed by police and others, but now in plain, recorded view. Alternative facts, internalized fiction and doublespeak beat Orwell at his game. Some pandemic politics present protective masks as shackles of totalitarian rule. If it seems that humanity quickly is becoming irredeemable or its demise, irreversible, the South Arts artists didn't get the memo or haven't resigned themselves to such a fate."

"This doesn't mean these artists are naïve or wide-eyed optimists; it's the very recognition of issues and problems that is the impetus for their work. And they push back, providing hope that improvement and reversal remain possible. Such engagement is no surprise; most of the artists have firsthand experience with issues surrounding race, ethnicity, identity, belonging, colonialism and gender – and typically not as members of dominant groups. Of the nine artists, three were born abroad; Hong was born in China but raised in Los Angeles, Filsoofi is from Iran, and Plaisir was born in France and has roots in Guadeloupe. Of the American-born artists, all but Garner are African American," adds Roefs.

"As in previous years, few of this year's Southern Prize artists are concerned with specific 'Southern' issues. Only Williams explicitly engages the American South. Cole's starting points are experiences in her native South, as are those of Calhoun and McCormick. But the issues they address aren't strictly regional, which is true as well for native Southerners Ham and Garner. The other artists are not native Southerners. As a group, the 2021 South Arts Fellows bring multiple identities to the table, individually and combined.'

On our cover this month is a work by the late Patz Fowle, part of the exhibition *Upward & Onward*, featuring works by Patz Fowle and her husband and art partner, Mike Fowle, on view at the Jones-Carter Gallery in Lake City, SC, through Aug. 27,

Patz Fowle passed away last year on Oct. 14, 2021, but her legacy will live on through her works for years, decades and maybe centuries to come. I talked about her passing, which was a surprise - out of the blue, in my commentary (https://www. carolinaarts.com/1221/1221carolinaartspg4.pdf) in our Dec. 2021 issue. It has some links to articles about her, the new Patz Fowle Visual Arts Studio, part of the Governor's School for Science + Mathematics' (GSSM), and her obituary. This is an exhibit that may just get me back to Lake City, a place I have avoided for years due to a disagreement between myself and ArtFields. That's another story which I won't waste time on again.

City of North Charleston, SC, Features Works by Jessie Renew and CJ Howard

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that concurrent solo exhibitions of mixed media works by Jessie Renew (North Charleston, SC) and oil paintings by CJ Howard (Wilmington, NC) will be on display at Park Circle Gallery, from July 6 -30, 2022. A free reception hosted by the artists will be held at the gallery on July 8, from 5-7pm. The public is invited to attend.

In the exhibit, Retrofits, local artist, designer, and illustrator, Jessie Renew presents a collection of interactive, mixed media compositions. To build these pieces, Renew begins by scouring thrift stores, trash piles, buy-nothing groups, sales, and store closings to collect clothing, household objects, toys, craft supplies, and various other objects at the last stop before their ultimate osal. She then breaks down and rebuilds this "stuff" into colorful 3D collages.

The results are works of art that celebrate the visual and narrative interest of everyday items. By changing their context, these objects are freed of their former lives as practical or decorative. "These pieces are about resourcefulness, reusing, and do-ityourself approaches - opposing consumerism, wastefulness, perfectionism, and snobbery," Renew explains. "In that same spirit, Retrofits are an invitation for the viewer to have whatever type of experience they choose - be it surrendering to the color and abstraction, following the clues to create a narrative, or recalling their own memories and associations.


Jessie Renew was born and raised in Johannesburg, South Africa, before immigrating to the United States in 1995. From an early age, her two great passions took form: art and nature. She began art instruction at age 7 and continued through college where she earned degrees in studio art and art history. After college, Renew became a kayak instructor and evolved into a marketing professional in the outdoor industry. In 2016, she befriended a musician who would become her collaborator, and through this experience her passion for art was reignited. She began working freelance and doing art projects in addition to her job. These included chalk art, murals, graphic design, music videos, and illustration. A period of reevaluation led her to relocate to North Charleston and pursue art full time. Currently, she is working in her home studio on mixed-media paintings and sculpture.

In the exhibit, *Holy Humxns*, Wilmington, NC, based artist CJ Howard presents a series of life-size oil paintings that celebrate matriarchs who are artists. "These powerful and complex human beings are raising children, fighting for justice, working to pay

For Creative Corridors 2022, we asked our resident artists to consider how the concept of community plays a role in their individual creative practices and how their work represents this familiar feeling of connection. Community is rooted in the Redux mission and is ever present in day-to-day life as a Redux Studio Artist. Through community comes collaboration, fulfillment, advancement, connection and belonging.

Artists tend to gravitate to communities in an effort to establish a basis for self-expression and self-definition as it relates to their artistic practice. As creative communities develop, artists inherently enrich one another as their individualized creative expression inspires and influences others within their communities.



Riivo Kruuk offered the following statement: "After realizing that most of my work is and always has revolved around some expression of duality, I really began to focus on that. The concept, the medium, level of rendering, and motifs are all very representing of duality. Soccer is the sport that unites the world but war is what divides us. Yet, football (soccer) can have moments reminiscent of ancient battles. Men fighting to be victorious, willing to draw blood from the other to gain the advantage"

"Being of half American, half Estonian descent, I never truly felt 100% one or the other. The mediums in the painting are a duality; oils being a very traditional, historic, and 'soft' medium. While spray paint being a very gritty, rebellious, and contemporary medium. The figures are very masculine and violent while the flowers are very soft and 'feminine'. Some parts of the painting are very rendered and carefully painted while other parts seem unfinished or loosely painted".

the bills, and pursuing their own creativity — every day," she states. "They deserve to be celebrated and commemorated for their work, their love, their passion, their existence.

Infused with tenderness and prayer, Howard's paintings are lovingly handcrafted and feature a wide array of models. For this series, she hems the paintings and hangs them on wooden dowels rather than stretching them. This allows the paintings to move subtly with the air currents. The handcrafted nature of the hemming also connects these paintings to tapestries and displayed quilts, art forms that have been creative outlets for mothers for centuries.

Before her son was born, Howard spent more than a decade curating exhibitions in New York and North Carolina and displaying her own art in group and solo shows throughout the US. In between her work as an arts organizer, she traveled to nine



different countries to collaborate on artwork with other artist-activists. However, her postpartum experience led to a wake-up call that would motivate her to return to her own

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personal art-making practice. Now, when she's not playing dinosaurs with her toddler, she creates oil paintings that celebrate the beauty and complexity of parenthood.

"The Artist in Residency Program is intended to offer a curation of artists inspired by the worldly travels of our muse, Emeline, and will allow for a visual expression of what we think she would have added to her own personal collection," Carly Skinner, general manager of Emeline said. "Stephanie Forbes' 'Divine Armor' Collection is the perfect representation of Emeline's inspirations and her connection to Charleston's history and surrounding landscapes. We could not be more excited to showcase her work to our guests."

The "Divine Armor" collection is inspired by armor from the 3rd and 4th century worn by Roman soldiers. The collection will feature 10 helmets of salvation displayed on gallery pedestals and three armor busts hung on the wall made with papier-mâché, all of which were constructed using over 100 oyster shells collected from marshes throughout Georgia and South Carolina. Additionally, there will be five oyster paintings and a collection of jewelry. All oysters used were delicately selected and composed carefully to honor the Roman uniform and provide an analogy of the

spiritual battle gear during imprisonment by

the Roman army.

A native of Augusta, GA, Forbes originally managed gallery operations and hosted monthly showcases at Gaartdensity Art Gallery in Augusta and purchased it in 2011. After selling the gallery, she moved on to gain a diverse experience in photography, graphic design and freelance work and eventually attended The Savannah College of Art and Design on a full tuition scholarship, graduating Magna Cum Laude in 2019. She currently resides in Savannah.

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


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Art League of Hilton Head, SC, Offers Works by Saundra Renee Smith

The Art League of Hilton Head, SC, will present How We Git Gullah, featuring works by Saundra Renee Smith, on view at Art League Gallery, located mid-island inside Arts Center of Coastal Carolina, from July 6 through Aug. 13, 2022. A reception will be held on July 6, from 5-7pm.

Saundra Renee Smith, local Gullah artist. captures the essence of being an authentic Gullah/Geechee native of the Lowcountry in How We Git Gullah.

Smith's work is nostalgic, showing simplistic and innocent scenes of a symbiotic existence with the earth, guided by the wisdom of the ancients. Inspired by the beauty of her native St. Helena, Smith's paintings feature lush, green fields, moss-covered oaks, and rivers "carrying food, health, and Gullah folk tales on every tide." She uses colorful acrylic paints and mixed media on all manner of materials, including canvas, board, glass, vinyl and tin.

Gullah means "kinfolk." How We Git Gullah is a tribute to the notion of a cultural family with a homeland ranging down the East Coast from North Carolina to Florida in a swath known as the Gullah/Geechee Cultural Corridor. The exhibit will have short stories of Gullah life interspersed among the artworks. "My aim is to foster communication, connections, and a sense of cultural humility," says Smith.



The Artists Collective | Spartanburg in SC will present *Interconnect*, featuring works by Greer paper artist Christina Laurel, on view in the Solomon Gallery, from July 5 through Aug. 27, 2022. A reception will be held on July 21, until 9pm, during the Spartanburg ArtWalk on the third Thursday each month, hours are extended until 9pm, with an art talk at 7pm.

The exhibition features an installation of suspended 3-D elements constructed of shoji-paper accompanying each 2-D series, Laurel says. "Butterfly drapes with my 'Remnants' series, gingko strands with my 'Survivor' series, and lily pads with my 'Fossilized' series. Plus, as an acknowledgement of how COVID affects my art, paper fans with my latest 'Mask' series.

"Interconnect is a continual evolving activity that is paramount to our and all spevival," she adds. "Intercor active verb, a common thread of benefit to the planet. Butterflies, lily pads, gingko – they pollinate and detoxify. Recognizable beauty, fragile yet strong, ephemeral yet enduring. Finding balance as quiet and chaos interconnect in our world today."

Laurel was inspired by biodiversity scientist E.O. Wilson, saying she was "moved" when she learned from him that even butterfly species are becoming extinct. "Influenced by a Japanese aesthetic, especially the Edo period, I began using shoji paper to construct suspended butterfly cocoons, gingko strands and lily pads as my chosen nature motifs," she says. "Metaphorically, the motifs represent the temporality of life - the butterfly - as well as the 200-millionyear survival of life – the gingko. I continue to be moved."

As for what she hopes visitors to the exhibit take away, Laurel says, "What I hope and what people take away from any exhibit cannot be prescribed. My hundreds of handtraced, hand-cut and assembled shoji-paper installations, as well as intricately pieced mixed-media/collage pieces, represent

"I appreciate hearing what each viewer brings to the artwork," she adds. "I often wish I could walk into an exhibit and see my work as if 'for the first time."

Tiger Strikes Asteroid Greenville in SC is presenting Subjective Objects, featuring works by Hanna Odom, Jordan Sommer, Kate Burke, Maggie Walton, and Wesley Fry, on view through July 15, 2022.

Bechtler Museum of Modern Art in Charlotte, NC, Features Works by Annemarie Schwarzenback

The Bechtler Museum of Modern Art at the Levine Center for the Arts, in Uptown Charlotte, NC, is presenting Annemarie Schwarzenback: Departure Without Destination, on view in the Fourth-Floor Gallery, through July 31, 2022.

Writer, journalist, photographer, traveler, cosmopolitan and cultural icon Annemarie Schwarzenbach (1908-1942) was one of the most dazzling and contradictory figures in modern Swiss cultural history. Consumed by wanderlust, a desire for social progress, and a sense of adventure, Schwarzenbach traveled extensively through Europe, Central Asia, Central and North Africa, and the United States between 1933 and her death in 1942. While Schwarzenbach saw herself primarily as a writer, she was a pioneer of photojournalism in Switzerland. Her work as a journalist, coupled with her upper-class background and her status as the wife of French diplomat Claude Clarac granted her extraordinary freedom of travel for the

Annemarie Schwarzenbach: Departure Without Destination, presented in collaboration with Zentrum Paul Klee in Bern, Switzerland, is the first major retrospective dedicated to the photography of Annemarie Schwarzenbach.

Curated by Martin Waldmeier with

the Zentrum Paul Klee, this exhibition features archival material, film, and 200 photographs drawn from the approximately 7,000 photographs in the estate of Annemarie Schwarzenbach, which is held in the Swiss Literary Archives in Bern, Switzerland.

Schwarzenbach was born in 1908 into the affluent Schwarzenbach-Wille family of Zurich industrialists and graduated with degrees in history in Zurich and Paris. Because of her political and sexual orientation, she turned her back on her conservative family and established con-

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nections with the German literary diaspora, particularly with the siblings Klaus and Erika Mann. In 1931 she lived in Berlin before moving, after the National Socialist seizure of power, to Spain, Russia, and Iran, where she published prose and ournalistic writings

Despite her years-long struggle with drug dependency, over the course of the 1930s, Schwarzenbach professionalized herself as a travel and features journalist. On joint trips with female writers and photographers such as Ella Maillart, Marianne Breslauer and Erika Mann, she turned her attention to social and political subjects, including the rise of National Socialism, the workers' movement in the United States, the consequences of modernization and the role of women in society. Her photographs, though, also reveal a longing for foreign lands and the poetry of travel. Some 300 articles by Schwarzenbach were published in Swiss magazines and newspapers in her lifetime. From 1933 these articles were increasingly accompanied by her own pictures, although most o Schwarzenbach's photographs remained unpublished before her death at the age of

When her literary work was rediscovered in the 1980s, Schwarzenbach became celebrated as a writer, female pioneer, and gay icon. Her gender-bending fashion sense and her lifestyle were the inspiration for Clare Waight Keller's Spring/Summer 2019 line for the fashion house Givenchy.

It was not until recently that Schwarzenbach's contributions to photography were recognized. Her images and writings are closely intertwined and document the upheavals, tensions and conflicts of the period leading up to World War II. Schwarzenbach's photographs also convey private themes, such as life in exile, the search for identity, homosexuality and the desire to transgress conventional gender roles. Above all, though, the photographs express Schwarzenbach's unbridled passion for travel - and her search for encounters with the unknown, the "departure without destination" as an existential experience. The exhibition title *Departure*

Without Destination refers to the life of Annemarie Schwarzenbach, which was characterized by great restlessness, homelessness, deracination, departure, and a search for hope in foreign countries.

These themes run like a thread through Schwarzenbach's writings and her photographic work and connect the work with the literary tradition of the modern age.

The exhibition is divided into six chapters featuring Schwarzenbach's work. A Love of Europe addresses Annemarie Schwarzenbach's first years as a photojournalist and her travels through Europe, revealing Schwarzenbach's cosmopolitan attitude. The Happy Valley follows Schwarzenbach's famous car journeys through the Middle East and Central Asia. She made four trips to Turkey, Palestine and Syria, Iraq, and Iran, and as far as Afghanistan and India. She wrote her bestknown literary work, The Happy Valley,

Between the Continents features intermediate places such as streets, harbors or ships' decks that become the sites of a temporary community and the settings for farewells and new beginnings. Travels in America deals with her travels in the United States in 1936-1938 where Schwarzenbach engaged intensely with a new understanding of politically committed photography and encountered a society that was still deeply marked by the economic crisis after 1929. Unemployment, poverty droughts, the decline of the cotton industry - her attention is focused on the American system and explores the differences between rich and poor, but also the widespread misery of the African American population in the southern states. The New Earth addresses her ambivalent views on the relationship between nature and culture in the context of mechanization and industrialization. Minor Encounters, tells the story of people she met on her travels and offers a personal view of her circle of frienTM ds.

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Mint Museum Randolph in Charlotte, NC, Offers Works by Diedrick Brackens

NC, will present Diedrick Brackens: ark of bulrushes, on view from July 16 through Dec. 11, 2022.

The exhibition presents a new series by Los Angeles-based artist Diedrick Brackens including large-scale (8-feet) weavings and premiering the artist's first woven sculptures. Known for making colorful textiles about African American and queer histories, Brackens has developed a process of combining the tactility of yarn with the ethos of storytelling. For this exhibition, the artworks tell timeless narratives about emancipation and remediation through pattern, body, and the power of craft.

In addition to being one of the most innovative and important artists on the rise in the United States, Brackens' work incorporates traditions important to the Southern region - baskets that relate to Cherokee nation and the Gullah people, quilts that resonate with all cultures, but a particular exploration of quilts in the African-American historical narrative. Brackens' deeply colored weavings pull imagery from 19th-century Freedom Quilts - used as a communication tool by enslaved people traveling along the Underground Railroad - and star constellations that have been used to navigate the external world and internal psyche for thousands of years. The central focus of Brackens' artwork always returns to the Black body represented in form or implied

Intertwined with the patterns are dynamic human figures mimicking animals associated with constellations. This positioning aligns the body within the cosmic proportions of the universe, inferring empowerment of the individual and of a people.

The sculptural basket boats in this exhibition take different forms that reference the human body in communion with nature. The ark is Brackens' sculptural prototype of a boat that he hopes to float on the Mississippi River. Made with enough room for a passenger to sit upright or lie down, the body and boat can float and bob down the river as one.

The floating of reed basket boats is significant in legends of deliverance, including the Biblical story of the exodus of the Israelites where an "ark of bulrushes" carried the infant Moses up the Nile River. Taking its name from this story, ark of bulrushes gestures to craft itself as a form of mythology - the passing on of tradition, technique, and narrative. Brackens practices textile craft with unique vision and perspective, spinning new definitions of what it means to live today.

Diedrick Brackens (born 1989, Mexica, TX; lives and works in Los Angeles, CA) is best known for his weavings that explore narratives about queerness, masculinity, and the Black experience in the

The images in her work are deliberately decontextualized. However, when shown in a group, their fragmentary nature is further emphasized, suggesting they are excerpted from a larger narrative.

Billie Zangewa (b. 1973, Blantyre, Malawi; lives and works in Johannesburg, South Africa) creates intricate collages composed of hand-stitched fragments of raw silk. These figurative compositions explore contemporary intersectional identity in an attempt to challenge the historical stereotype, objectification, and exploitation of the black female form. Beginning her career in the fashion and advertising industries, Zangewa employs her understanding of textiles to portray personal and universal experiences through domestic interiors, urban landscapes, and portraiture. Often referencing scenes or experiences from everyday life, Zangewa has stated that she is interested in depicting the work done by women that keeps society running smoothly, but



McColl Center for Art + Innovation in Charlotte, NC, **Offers Works by Resident Artists**

The McColl Center for Art + Innovation in Charlotte, NC, is presenting several exhibits including: In Body and *Potluck*, both on view through Aug. 3,

As a society, we are acutely aware of the power and issue that exists in notions of "body." We exist in a time where violence against, legislation to control, alterations to, and the dynamics of living in our own skins play out across headlines and in our homes every day.

Inaugural Parent and Educator Artists-in-Residence Hong Hong (she/ her), Wanda Raimundi-Ortiz (she/her), Sarah Sudhoff (she/her) and K Sarrantonio (they/them) center their bodies - as subject or tool - in the creation of works that explores questions of identity, family history, motherhood, parenthood, isolation and contemporary society.

Artist Hong Hong's work marries the intensely physical paper making process with the color and compositional awareness of painting. Often working outdoors under the sun, Hong's repeated motions - soaking, beating, rinsing, and carrying pulp, pouring and pushing the fibers on her screens, then lifting the large sheets of paper connect her to her environment and notions of time. Her ongoing movements yield an almost ritualistic choreography or movement to create an object that is both present and decaying, formed yet fragile like nature, our bodies, and time.

Rhythm, movement, and painting are also present in Wanda Raimundi-Ortiz's work. An interdisciplinary artist, her love of 18th century painting uses the formal figure, landscape, rich costuming and color to dissect cultural constructs of Latinness, Blackness, elitism and class. Her durational performances use her body as a vehicle to break down boundaries between the artist and the viewer. Her content becomes personal as she directly engages with her audience, who are required to ultimately see her as a human being engaging in challenging issues.

Like Raimundi-Ortiz, Sarah Sudhoff's body is a primary medium in her work. Her performances, photographs and videos interweave themes of gender, science, with her personal experience as a woman, mother, sister, and daughter within shifting family and cultural dynamics. We see Sudhoff's presence in each of her artworks. Her body is evident; suspended or engaged in action, or through the evidence of her touch - bite marks and piles of pencil shavings are evidence of her physical

labor. There is little representation of Queer, transgender, masculine of center pregnancy and parenthood both in art and popular media. K Sarrantonio uses their personal life experience to create images that reflect their personal experiences while representing aspects of queer domesticity that challenge our collective cultural practice of gendering the body. Trained as a printmaker, their screenprints are often taken from video stills of their performances. Materials including paper, fabric, fishing line, wood and steel bring flexibility, fragility, transparency, tension and illusion to K's work.

In times like these, we find comfort in the humble tradition of Potluck, a meal in which members of a community offer what resources they have to be shared by all. This tradition, which grew popular during the Great Depression, feels necessary today, not only as an act of self-care but as an act of radical compassion for our neighbors.



on paint as his primary medium. In describing his work, he once said, "I don't paint to make people happy or to match furniture. I hope my paintings make people think."

Perhaps most noteworthy about Moore's oody of work is how hard it is to categorize. Beginning later this month, Waterworks is dedicating all of its galleries to the paintings of this amazing artist, and a brief stroll through the exhibition will attest that his work is as varied as it is thought-provoking. One views a portrait of an elegant gentleman painted in the style of a Gilbert Stuart, and a few steps away is a triptych illustrating multiple aspects of a Salisbury treasure, Hurley Park. Nearby hangs a nude with touches reminiscent of the cubism of Juan Gris or Georges Braque. A short distance from that is a yellow canvas with nothing more than a half-finished face of a beautiful woman entitled "Memory."

That curiosity about all types and styles of artwork is perhaps the reason Moore spent most of his career as an art teacher. He loved art and wanted to share it with others, whether they were young college students, older retirees looking for something to keep themselves busy, or young children



just starting to recognize the joy of artistic

He taught briefly at the University of Alabama, then, as an assistant professor at Coker University in Hartsville, South Carolina. In 1974, he moved to the Piedmont area of North Carolina where he served as Director of the Art Department of Mitchell Community College in Statesville, North Carolina for 32 years.

After retirement from Mitchell in 2004, Moore discovered Waterworks and immediately immersed himself in its programs. His love affair with the Center lasted for the rest of his life. He served on the board of directors, and taught figure drawing and art appreciation classes for several years while simultaneously volunteering for any assignment that needed filling. Moore particularly loved working with young artists, to build in them a fire of appreciation for art, similar to his own. In 2008, Moore was the first person to receive Waterworks' Volunteer of the Year Award, because of his demonstrated commitment to volunteerism and the arts. Most recently, he served on the Exhibitions Committee, locating and showing the works of local and regional artists who had previously received little attention.

Waterworks partnered with the Lutheran Services Abundant Living Adult Day Care (now Trinity Living Center) program, where participating artists create portraits of clients and donate them to their families. Moore was a ready volunteer for that program and, no doubt, many local residents now have his paintings of their loved ones hanging in their homes.

Moore was involved with a number of other art organizations. He was a Juried Member of the Associated Artists of Winston-Salem, and an active member of Plein Air Carolina (PAC-Salisbury) and Mooresville Artist Guild. He was a Lifetime Member of The Artist Guild of Statesville and the Iredell Museums, and served on the Advisory Board for Mitchell Community College's Fine Arts program.

Moore left behind a body of work that reflects his curiosity, his openness to trying new ideas, and his love of people. And, true to his goal, they make people think.

control, which is undone through woundings within the work. In a world of instant gratification, the act of sitting with heavy thoughts and repetitive processes for an extended time becomes a statement in itself, bringing that act to the content and context of the work.

This work is in many ways about the people who should be in the room, and are not there. It is about the presence of absence. A meditation on grief, the passage of time, the fleeting nature of joy, and the struggle to hold contradictory feelings simultaneously. It is about anxiety and the lack of control, the stiff upper lip and carrying on regardless.



Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, Offers Works by Richard Misrach & Guillermo Galindo

The Asheville Art Museum in Asheville, NC, will present *Border Cantos I Sonic Border*, a unique collaboration between American photographer Richard Misrach and Mexican American sculptor and composer Guillermo Galindo, uses the power of art to explore and humanize the complex issues surrounding the Mexican-American border. Organized by Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art, the transformative and multi-sensory experience will be on view in the Museum's Appleby Foundation Exhibition Hall from July 22 through Oct. 24, 2022.

Misrach, who has photographed the border since 2004, beautifully captures landscapes and objects, including things left behind by migrants. His large-scale photographs, along with grids of smaller photos, highlight issues surrounding migration and its effect on regions and people, and also introduce a complicated look at policing the boundary.

Responding to these photographs, Galindo fashioned sound-generating sculptures from items Misrach collected along the border, such as water bottles, Border Patrol "drag tires," spent shotgun shells, ladders, and sections of the border wall itself. The sounds they produce give voices to people through the personal belongings they have left behind. The composition embraces the Pre-Columbian belief that there was an intimate connection between an instrument and the material from which it was made, with no separation between spiritual and physical worlds. Based on the Mesoamerican Venus calendar, Sonic Border plays for a total of 260 minutes and is separated into 13 cycles of 20 minutes. Within these cycles, the instruments play in small groups of two or more, or all together as an orchestra.

Presented in English and Spanish, Border Cantos | Sonic Border offers perspective on the challenges of migration, inviting us to bridge boundaries. When experienced as a whole, the images, instruments, and emanating sounds create an immersive space in which to look, listen, and learn about the complicated issues surrounding the Mexican-American border. While the artists do not seek to

provide solutions to these issues, they do provide insight into a place where most people have never ventured, creating a poignant connection that draws on our humanity.

William Waldo Dodge moved to Asheville in 1924 as a trained archite and a newly skilled silversmith. When he opened for business promoting his handwrought silver tableware, including plates, candlesticks, flatware (spoons, forks, and knives), and serving dishes, he did so in a true Arts and Crafts tradition. The aesthetics of the style were dictated by its philosophy: an artist's handmade creation should reflect their hard work and skill, and the resulting artwork should highlight the material from which it was made. Dodge's silver often displayed his hammer marks and inventive techniques, revealing the beauty of these useful household goods. The silver works in this exhibition are drawn from the Museum's Collection

The Arts and Crafts style of England became popular in the United States in the early 1900s. Asheville was an early adopter of the movement because of the popularity and abundance of Arts and Crafts architecture in neighborhoods like Biltmore Forest, Biltmore Village, and the area around The Grove Park Inn. The title of this exhibition was taken from the famous quotation by one of the founding members of the English


Arts and Crafts Movement, William Morris, who said, "have nothing in your house that you do not know to be useful or believe to be beautiful." Not only did Dodge follow this suggestion; he contributed to American Arts and Crafts silver's relevancy persisting almost halfway into the 20th century.

Standing behind the substantial presence of the large format Polaroid 20×24 camera - weighing 200 pounds and the size of a refrigerator - artists peer through the view-

of creating the unique large dye transfer prints imparts framing to a scene and quality to an image that balances subtlety with boldness, softness paired with an undeniable presence. The 20×24 Polaroid adds an additional layer of veiling and diaphanous softness to the imagery in Joyce Tenneson's *Transformations* series, which she began in 1985 and engaged with through 2005.

Transformations features partially or fully nude figures poetically presented; Tenneson's photographs have always been interested in the magic of the human figure, contained within bodies of all ages and emotions in a broad range that are both vulnerable and bold. She interweaves elements that feel vaguely mythological or symbolic,

of gods and goddesses, both mighty and mercurial. Elements such as shells, fruits, or daggers are expressions of inner journeys and self-discovery, and draped fabric and netting echo the shifting flow of time, energy, and identity. The ethereal quality imparted by the Polaroid process resonated with Tenneson, who stated: "I often felt like a channel - the images that had been part of my inner psyche for years emerged from some mysterious source."

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

The Southern Highland Craft Guild in Asheville, NC, is presenting its annual Graduating Class of 2022 of Haywood Community College's Professional Crafts Program, on view in the Main Gallery of the Folk Art Center, through Sept. 7, 2022.

Located on the second floor of the Folk Art Center the show continues the historical relationship between the Southern Highland Craft Guild and Haywood, an educational center of the Guild. One of the most anticipated shows of the year, the class of 2022 represents works of wood, metal, and fiber.

This new generation of craft is led by instructors Amy Putansu in fiber, Brian Wurst in wood, Emily Reason in clay, and Robert Blanton in metals & jewelry. The main gallery of the Folk Art Center is adorned with hanging tapestries and woven totes, pierced and soldered jewelry, and wooden furniture, soon to be heirlooms for one's home.

Students of the Haywood program come from all over, with or without prior experience of craft, and sometimes pursuing it as a second or third career. The course of study is challenging, combining craft concentrations with supplemental classes in design, drawing, craft history, business, marketing and photography. Haywood Community College and the Southern Highland Craft Guild share a history that documents the role of craft education in preserving traditional culture, creating economic opportunity and fostering professional practice. All of the artists represent the vitality and creativity of craft practice today, which is the ultimate purpose of both institutions. Many Haywood graduates have become individual members of the Southern Highland Craft Guild and have served the Guild in vari-

ous capacities.

Instructor Brian Wurst of the Professional Crafts Wood program says, "Our programs have thrived for nearly five decades, and our relationship with the Craft Guild has been a key part of that. The Graduate Show is the capstone of two hard years by these students, and it's a delight to share it in this beautiful space."

Haywood Community College is located in Clyde, NC, just west of Asheville. The college's Professional Crafts Program began in recognition of the region's strong craft heritage. It was envisioned that students would learn the basics of craft media and how to transform that craft into a business. The clay studio was the first to open in 1974. With the addition of jewelry, wood and fiber studios, a comprehensive curriculum was in place by 1977. After high school, Courtney went to college at the University of New Mexico where she discovered clay and graduated with a BFA in Ceramics. 

July 1 through Dec. 10, 2022, is a celebration of Bart Vargas' use of materials, form, pattern, and color through sculpture and painting. This twenty-year retrospective of Vargas' work consists of objects and images built from salvaged materials. Many of these award-winning works have been exhibited across the nation and world, graced book covers and publications, bu have not previously been exhibited in North Carolina.

According to Vargas, "Aspects of salvage, appropriation and repetition run through all my works. I recover local materials deemed unwanted or useless, including trash, recyclables, and surplus items and then transform them into playful, approachable and thought-provoking objects. This practice is most obvious in my sculptures, in which I use readily identified objects such as plastic bottles, cardboard, keyboard keys and empty paint containers. I play with the familiarity of these materials by blurring their identities into universal forms like spheres, globes, maps, pyramids, pills and skulls. These works address such diverse topics as contextual regional geography, the damaging effects of plastic on our bodies and global environment and the multitudes of waste created by technological advancement."

Vargas is a visual artist, educator and advocate from Bellevue, NE. He received his BFA from the University of Nebraska

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Appalachian State University

at Omaha and his MFA at the University of Minnesota, Twin Cities. He has exhibited nationally and internationally, and his work can be found in many collections throughout the United States, Europe, Asia, Australia and South America. His works have also been featured in many publications including Sculpture Magazine, New American Paintings and HGTV Magazine.

The exhibition. Folded and Gathered: Nicole Pietrantoni, on view in the Mezzanine Gallery, from July 1 through Feb. 4, 2023, consists of vibrant printed accordion books on Japanese papers that expand to create large scale installations. Much of her work is informed by her time in beautiful but ecologically fragile landscapes.

According to Pietrantoni, "My artists' books and installations explore the representation of beauty in times of loss, photography's role in producing memory and humans' relationship to the environment. Taking an experimental approach to the book form, my art asks how the book and printed matter can both enable and undercut humans' active role in constructing and idealizing images. Rather than a fixed site or single image, the fragmented paper columns, text, and book forms engage the world as an unstable accumulation of processes, perceptions and narratives."

Pietrantoni is the recipient of numerous awards including a Fulbright to Iceland, an Artist Trust Fellowship, a Larry Sommers Printmaking Fellowship, a Leifur Eiríksson Foundation Grant, the Manifest Prize and a Graves Award for Excellence in Humanities Research and Teaching. She received her MFA and MA in Printmaking from the University of Iowa and her BS in Human and Organizational Development and Art History from Vanderbilt University. Nicole served as the President of SGC International in 2016 - 18, the largest professional organization dedicated to scholarship in printmaking, book arts and papermaking in North America. Nicole is an Associate Professor of Art at Whitman College where she teaches printmaking and book arts.

The exhibition, *Installation with* Ukrainian Flag: Lowell Hayes, on view in

Blowing Rock Art and History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, Offers Several New Exhibits

Blowing Rock Art and History Museum in Blowing Rock, NC, is presenting several new exhibitions including: Fragmentary Dimensions: Painting & Sculpture from Chenoweth • Halligan Studios, on view in the Atwell Gallery, through Aug. 28, 2022; Imminent Perils: To Wonder at Trifles in the Paintings of John Beerman, on view in the Rankin West Gallery, through July 31, 2022; Wildflowers: Glass Sculptures by Ronnie Hughes, on view in the Schaefer Gallery, through Aug. 21, 2022; and Jagged Path: the African Diaspora in Western North Carolina in Craft, Music, and Dance, on view in the Fort Gallery, through Oct. 22.

Jan Chenoweth and Roger Halligan work in markedly different dimensions: Chenoweth collapsing expansive forms onto a relatively two-dimensional surface and Halligan building outwards, expanding graphic compositions into three-dimensional space. Both artists pursue abstraction rigorously, manipulating familiar yet sometimes unexpected materials into novel forms and surfaces. Seen together here, their work is marked by both its differences and a subtle shared vocabulary

Living and working in Lake City, SC, Chenoweth and Halligan redeploy the detritus of our modern world - beachside garbage, caution tape, traffic cones, building materials - and create serendipitous windows into common landscapes and into their own process of making. Fragmentary Dimensions is an opportunity to look closely and discover the cunning breaches hidden within the work of these two artists where abstraction reigns but gives way to ruminations on the world we've built for ourselves and the aesthetic potential therein

In the exhibition, *Imminent Perils: To* Wonder at Trifles in the Paintings of John Beerman, Beerman's paintings are uncommonly contemporary in their glimpses of natural and built environments. He carefully frames the landscape, illuminating its beauty without erasing the persistent trespass of human development; rigid edges of buildings, dilapidated fences, and straying power lines are just as much part of Beerman's compositions as the tranquil skies, rippling waterways, and sprawling fields. In these honest representations of precarious landscapes, Beerman quietly captures the anxiety and the awe of experiencing Nature's beauty in the 21st-century.

In a lecture given at Wellesley College in 941 titled The Art of Literature and Commonsense, eminent author and critic Vladimir Nabokov urged his listeners to value experiences of wonder over commonsense principles. Nabokov emphasized a seemingly irrational "capacity to wonder at trifles - no matter the imminent peril... and it is in this childishly speculative state of mind, so different from commonsense and its logic, that we know the world to be good." Like Nabokov's rejection of prudence, John

Beerman's paintings, if given sufficient time and attention, disrupt assumptions about beautiful pictures and their ability to teach us about the world we are living in.

This exhibition gathers together new works alongside earlier paintings to trace Beerman's approach to the landscape. Often painting places that are gone, disappearing, or changing irrevocably, the artist uses a variety of techniques to articulate the uncertainty of these specific places and spaces, frozen in time on his canvas.

Born and raised in the Blue Ridge Mountains, Ronnie Hughes' passion for working with glass came as a surprise. Despite his aptitude for fine detail, Ronnie's technique of flameworking durable borosilicate glass is largely self-taught, and will be explored in the exhibit Wildflowers: Glass Sculptures by Ronnie Hughes.

Initially inspired by an unexpected field of Pink Lady Slipper orchids during a hike in 1980, Hughes has devoted his studio work exclusively to wildflowers native to North Carolina ever since. His sculptures are characterized by an exacting attention to accurate flower structures and the organic forms that support and reinforce these delicate compositions. Seen here in clear glass, the artist's forms, while drawn from Nature, are almost ethereal in their ability to capture and diffuse light.

Using propane and oxygen-fed torches, Hughes heats the glass to a molten state then shapes his floral subjects while the medium is pliable, without the aid of molds, specialized tools, glues, or paints. The works are finished in a 1040 degree kiln-a process called annealing—in which all thermal stress is removed from the sculptures and the glass is returned to its previous

Works on view were drawn from the collection of Bo Henderson and Ed Springs.

The exhibit, Jagged Path: the African Diaspora in Western North Carolina in Craft, Music, and Dance, will illuminate tne obscured history of African contribu tions to craft, music, and dance in Western North Carolina. Drawing connections from the 17th through 21st centuries, the Jagged Path will demonstrate how African traditions that survived the Middle Passage have helped create the culture of Western North Carolina through interviews, performances, historic artifacts, artist residencies, and

Western Carolina University | Caldwell Arts Council in Lenoir, in Cullowhee, NC, Offers Glass Works by Black Artists Brooks and Joe Lafone

Western Carolina University in Cullo whee, NC, is presenting Cultivating Collections: Vitreographs, Glass, and Works by Black Artists, on view at the WCU Fine Art Museum, at the Bardo Arts Center, through July 29, 2022.

Cultivating Collections is a multi-year series of exhibitions that highlights specific areas of the WCU Fine Art Museum's Collection, which includes over 1,800 works of art in a wide range of media by artists of the Americas. This year, Cultivating Collections reflects on three areas of the Collection - vitreographs, glass, and works by Black artists. Key works in each area come together to tell the story of past, present, and future collecting directions.

In this multi-year series, student researchers work closely with the Museum's curator to gather information about the artwork in the permanent collection and determine future collecting directions. This year's exhibition highlights three areas of the collection - vitreographs, glass, and works by Black artists. The pieces on view convey the stories of bold innovators and speak to the importance of Western North Carolina in the history of glass and printmaking

The Cultivating Collections series began in 2019 with WCU students enrolled in Exhibition Practicum, an annual course designed to familiarize students with the intricacies of museum spaces. Students developed an exhibition from start to finish by interviewing artists, selecting works for display, and writing labels about the Museum's objects. Since 2019, students have continued this curatorial work, focusing each year on a new area of the collection, which includes over 1,800 works in a wide range of media by artists of the Americas. Input from students brings a fresh perspective to the Museum's holdings and unlocks the potential for the Museum to create a more diverse and inclusive collection. This year's exhibition showcases the combined curatorial efforts of nineteen students who participated in the 2021 and 2022 Exhibition Practicum classes.

The main gallery of Cultivating Collections features selections from the WCU Fine Art Museum's vitreograph collection, which consists of over 850 prints made using a glass matrix. It is the largest collection of vitreographs in the world and includes the complete archive of prints produced at Littleton Studios in Spruce Pine, NC, from the mid-1970s through 2008. Harvey and Bess Littleton launched this collection in 2005-2006 when they gifted over 750 vitreographs to the Museum. With the help of the Little-

ton family, this gift grew in subsequent years, creating an unparalleled collection that tells the story of a distinct period in the history of printmaking, one in which Western North Carolina plays a central role. Artists include Walter Darby Bannard, Frederick Birkhill, Warrington Colescott, Ruth Fine, Nancy Genn, Laura Grosch, Dorothy Simpson Krause, David Dodge Lewis, Bonnie Lhotka, Harvey Littleton, Peter Loewer, Tom Nakashima Judith O'Rourke, Miklos Pogany, Karin Schminke, Dan Welden, Sandy Wilcox, Ann Wolff, and T.A. Zive.

To celebrate the creativity of Black artists and acknowledge the need for greater representation of artists of color in the collection, this year's student curators felt it was important to create a gallery solely devoted to Black artists. The majority of these artists have vitreographs in the collection and their work is displayed in more than one gallery in the exhibition. James Tanner's Big South, for example, is a moving portrait of the artist's uncle Mickey, which he describes as "a mirror image of the Old South." From Tanner's perspective, there is a history reflected in his uncle's solemn gaze that speaks to the racial divides that exist in our country and the individuals that have not been given access to certain opportunities. He created the portrait as a reminder of the histories that will never be told.

Several vitreographs by Tanner will be on view in Cultivating Collections, along with work by Arleen Burke-Morgan, Clarence Morgan, Martin Puryear, Therman Statom, and Mildred Thompson. A third gallery highlights a range of

artists who have connections to the history of glass in Western North Carolina. Many of them made significant contributions to the Studio Glass Movement and are teachers, mentors, and innovators who have inspired other artists to work in glass. One notable example is Fritz Dreisbach, who helped build an early glass furnace on the Western Carolina University campus in 1972. Three examples of Dreisbach's work are on view in the exhibition, including an example of sculptural blown glass from 1968/70, a mold-blown mug from 1976 created from an aluminum waffle iron, and a more recent "trick cup" that contains a surprising drinking mechanism Other exhibiting glass artists include William Bernstein, Shane Fero, Jack King, Robert Levin, Harvey Littleton, David Nichols, Roger Parramore, Richard Ritter, Tadashi Torii, and others.

Alamance Arts in Graham, NC, **Features Works by Eric McRay**

Alamance Arts in Graham, NC, will present an exhibit of works by Eric McRay, on view in the Sister Galleries of the 1873 Capt. James & Emma Holt White House, from July 11 through Aug. 20, 2022.

The stars of the art world are usually seen as bad boys with tattoos, piercings, and all the clichés of popular romance. McRay is no cliché. He is an original. He is neither the starving artist nor the profiteering commercial artist. "I am an extraordinary gentleman with an adventurer's heart, but I'm no bohemian!" He is a man that has struggled throughout his career to achieve a high level of technical proficiency, pictorial intelligence, and a sense of artistic legacy.

McRay received a BFA degree at the Maryland Institute, College of Art, where he earned a four-year scholarship for his artistic talent. A native of Washington, DC, McRay moved to North Carolina and has been exhibiting since 1987. In November 1998, he was juried into Raleigh's prestigious Artspace. Since opening his Artspace studio in downtown Raleigh, McRay has served in the offices of Vice-President and President of the Artspace Artists Association, as well as served on Artspace's board of directors and

Executive Committee. McRay's artistic career has been featured on TV and radio programs, and in numerous newspapers, magazines and websites. The Raleigh News & Observer named him one of the "Artists to Watch." Numerous times he has been listed among the "Best Local Artist" and "Favorite Local Artist". McRay has received feature articles in Fortune Small Business, Art Business News, Our State Magazine and Southern Living Magazine.

Some of his collectors include the SAS Institute, American Tobacco Campus, North Carolina Central University Art Museum, Duke University Medical Center, Duke Health Raleigh Hospital, NC State University, UNC – Chapel Hill and Western Wake Hospital, as well as many private local, national and international collectors. Also, McRay was

privileged to participate in the Art in Embassies Program, and his works were displayed in the US Embassy in Copenhagen, Denmark.

McRay's guiding principle is — An artist's style is his visual language by which he communicates. Thus, Eric McRay is multilingual. Openness and exploration rather than a dedication to a particular style best characterize his work. "I believe there is no single correct pictorial solution.

Unlike most painters who have a single style, McRay has a range of style and imagery through which he works up and back. He has a powerful pictorial discernment that enables him to go from paintings with a lot of splash and spontaneity to images with a sense of organization and reason. McRay works in themes and variations to empty himself of

Perhaps it's his Picassoesque spirit that keeps him on the road to reinvention. His various styles are not exclusive phases in an evolutionary process but options from which he selects according to his expressive goals. 'I think great artists are constantly challenging themselves and changing in search of greater truth - look at Picasso and Matisse." So McRay continues to prodigiously produce his paintings, drawings, and collages. He is constantly driven to master the visual language of the next new "McRay."

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University of North Carolina -Greensboro, NC, Offers Exhibition of Beasts & Works by Mary Ellen Bute

The University of North Carolina Greensboro, NC, is presenting Bestiary: Animals as Symbols and Metaphors, on view in the The Gregory D. Ivy and Weatherspoon Guild Galleries of the Weatherspoon Art Museum, through Dec. 3, 2022.

The Guild and Ivy galleries will be awash with an array of beasts this summer. No cause for concern, however, as this menagerie consists solely of two- and three-dimensional representations of familiar animals, many of which are quite benign and intriguing. Drawn from the museum's collection and arranged by species, the exhibition is a contemporary look at the old bestiary tradition. Both a literary and illustrative genre that originated in the ancient world, bestiaries served as a kind of natural history, cataloging known and mythological animals as well as providing moralizing allegories.

The tradition continues in artwork by modern and contemporary artists who likewise use the appearance and habits of animals to comment on human behavior. This exhibition enlarges the concept of animals as symbols by also including depictions of beasts that evoke figurative expressions. A few of the artworks portray the animal kingdom in general, but most focus on a single beast: horses, lambs, apes, snakes, birds of prey and other fowl, whales, cows, and insects, as well as domesticated cats and dogs. Artworks range from Peter Agostini's mythological wonder to Tom Rankin's and Kiki Smith's sacrificial lambs, and from Ai Weiwei's nod to social media platforms to Anne Arnold's anthropomorphic cats. This "zoo" is definitely worth a visit!

Bestiary: Animals as Symbols and Metaphors was organized by Elaine D. Gustafson, curator and head of collections and facilities.

The exhibition, *The Eye and the Ear:* Animations by Mary Ellen Bute, is on view in Gallery 6 at the Weatherspoon Art Museum, through Sept. 10, 2022

From the mid 1930s to mid 1950s, artist Mary Ellen Bute produced more than a dozen pioneering animations that sought to allow viewers to see sound. Born and raised in Texas, Bute left home at sixteen to study painting at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts. Frustrated by the imitations of working on canvas, sh went on to train in stage lighting at Yale University before moving to New York where she forged collaborative relationships with innovators across professional fields and disciplines in the pursuit of presenting music through moving images.

Among Bute's formative creative partners were Leon Theremin, inventor of one of the first electronic musical instruments. and Joseph Schillinger, the music theorist famed for his work with mathematical

expressions. Bute's longest-standing collaborator (and eventually husband), was her cinematographer Ted Nemeth. Making her first films in the midst of the Great Depression, she and Nemeth frequently built their own equipment and generated effects from such inexpensive objects as mirrors, ping pong balls, colanders, cellophane, and even cream floating in coffee. From these ordinary objects Bute created dynamic, abstract images sequenced to iconic classical scores from composers such as Dimitri Shostakovich and Aaron Copeland.

Unlike many abstract filmmakers of her time, Bute sought an audience beyond art houses and galleries, and she rented her films to venues such as New York's Radio City Music Hall and Trans Lux Theater to screen before their feature films. Although dismissed by many in the art world for this embrace of popular appeal, she was undeterred from her pursuits. Likewise, friends recount that Walt Disney invited the artist to join his commercial studio, but she declined—committed to her experimentations. By the 1950s, Bute was consulting with Ralph Potter from Bell Telephone Laboratories in order to use an oscilloscope—an instrument for testing radar equipment—to draw her images with light. In writing about this work, her indelible commitment to both joy and learning rang clear, "I venture to predict that the forms and compositions artists can create on the oscilloscope, and organize and preserve on motion picture film, will not only give aesthetic pleasure to all kinds of men and women . . . but will help theoretical physicists and mathematicians to uncover more secrets of the inanimate world."

"My mother once told me, sometimes she felt like she 'didn't have no life.' That statement, made with so much honesty, conviction, and passion, yet free of even a hint of self-pity has throughout my career been one of the guiding principles of not only how I live my life, and relate to other people, but has also profoundly influenced the philosophy of my art," says Geter.

"In the early nineteen hundreds when she grew up, life was a struggle. Survival was day-to-day and filled with the perils of discrimination, poverty, illiteracy and a host of other dangers inherited from a lifetime of being poor, black and undereducated. Yet she survived and passed her legacy of love, compassion, hope and a

"My work finds its foundation in her legacy," adds Geter. "It refers to the trials of youth and the struggles of the aged. It seeks to speak to, and for those, with no voice. My work embodies compassion,

hope, justice, and perseverance — concepts I learned from my mother."

In a career that spreads across two continents, Tyrone Geter has built an international reputation as a world-class artist, painter, sculptor, illustrator, and teacher. Recently retired associate professor of art at Benedict College in Columbia, SC. Geter grew up in Anniston, AL, during a time defined by strict segregation laws and social injustice. Anniston was a site of numerous acts of racial violence during the Civil Rights Era. The immediacy of these events and an inherited legacy of spiritual strength and fortitude against all the odds inform and shape Geter's work.

Geter received his Master of Fine Arts from Ohio University in 1978 with an emphasis on painting and drawing. An exceptional draftsman, his portraits are sensitive, timeless, and masterfully executed. Their power, displayed through their expression, gesture and adornments, seem often suspended in an otherworldly environment. Equal to the history his figures embody, they also speak of a spiritual world overflowing with compassions and empathy. In this regard his work is uniquely distinctive.

In 1979, Geter relocated to Zaria, Nigeria. For seven years he lived, drew and painted among the Fulani and other local peoples of Northern Nigeria. During this period, he created numerous paintings that captured the richness and depth of the cultures of the region. He describes the experience as an experience that taught him "to understand the nature of life in a society where life and nature are sometimes both hard and cruel." Further, he experienced "a lesson in the creative process that no art school would ever teach me."



Those years in Nigeria proved to be a turning point in his development and the most important influence in his life and art. In 1987 he returned to the US and a teaching position at the University of Akron, where he transformed his experience in Nigeria into the most powerful work of his career.

Geter's work has been exhibited at the Columbia Museum of Art, Florence County Museum, and WaterFront Gallery (Charleston) in South Carolina, and Center for Afro-American Artists (Boston), Butler Institute for American Art (Youngstown, OH), Hampton Institute College Museum (Hampton, VA), and Museum of Fine Art (Boston) to name a few. His honors include placing first at Moja Arts Festival and in the Robert Duncanson Award from Taft Museum (Cincinnati), and he received an artist fellowship grant from Foundation for the Arts and Humanities (Boston) and a grant from Columbus (Ohio) Arts Council.

this way. "In the visual arts, the figureground relationship is the way we perceive objects in a work of art to be the object of focus (the figure) or the background (ground). ground had to be created by repeating the figure in a variety of ways—perhaps by way of a silhouette, an outline, or text related to the figure. I find that I am most creative when I have fewer tools and establish limitations. This series of work gave me room to play, think, and grow.'

Potter Evelyn Ward's work for this show has been evolving in her studio over the winter. "As with everything in my work, it's been a slow evolution - refining forms, developing a few new slip colors - but always working within the same framework. In relation to the title of our show: Figure & Ground, I've been playing with the use of negative space, sometimes flipping the colors used on two pots and then seeing how that affects the overall pieces, especially in relation to each other. It's been an interesting and informative exercise. I hope you enjoy the new work that has surfaced these last couple of months!

Helen Frankenthaler (1928–2011) is most known for her bold, colorful abstract paintings. Raised in New York City, she was a trailblazer in Abstract Expressionism, an art movement initiated in the late 1940s that emphasized spontaneous, expressive, large-scale painting. Armed with commercial paints and house painters' brushes, Frankenthaler and her contemporaries rebelled against restrictive political and artistic norms by using techniques considered revolutionary for the time.

Frankenthaler was one of the few vomen artists within the male-dominated art scene and became especially renowned for her drive for experimentation throughout the six decades of her career. In the 1960s, she began to pursue printmaking, a medium that similarly allowed for great experimentation and one in which she would work for the next fifty years. Each print in this exhibition was made at a different studio and with a distinct technique, chronicling Frankenthaler's varied methods and the numerous printmakers with whom she collaborated.

Helen Frankenthaler: Un Poco Más (A Little More) champions the significance of printmaking within Frankenthaler's rtistic practice. It explores the cooper tive, exploratory process through which the artist worked and highlights the six proofs (test prints) and final edition print of *Un Poco Más* (1987), completed during a period of time the artist spent in Barcelona, Spain. *Un Poco Más*, as both work and exhibition, invites viewers to imagine the lively and dynamic conversations between Frankenthaler and the printmakers with whom she partnered as they shared techniques and encouraged themselves to give "a little more" to reach their artistic

The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, NC, will present two new exhibits including: Alexis Rockman: Shipwrecks, on view at the Ackland Art Museum, from July 8 through Sept. 4, 2022, and *Houseguests:* American Art from the Art Bridges Collection Loan Partnership, on view at the Ackland Art Museum, from July 15 through Sept. 4, 2022.

Alexis Rockman (American, born 1962) created his dramatic series, "Shipwrecks," depicting historic sea disasters, to explore the impact of transportation and migration — from goods and people to plants and animals — on our planet and its waterways.

"Rockman's large-scale oil paintings and watercolors remind us of the shadow of potential disaster that looms over ocean voyages. He places these concerns in a global narrative, but they have a special resonance in North Carolina, where the "Graveyard of the Atlantic" has claimed thousands of ships since record keeping began in the sixteenth century," said Lauren Turner, Associate Curator for Contemporary Art and Special

While many of the catastrophes to which Rockman alludes have receded into history, his works point to how our interconnected world has generated significant global changes. Some experts now refer to our age as the Anthropocene, a term coined by biologists for the time period in which human activity has dominated and fundamentally altered Earth's natural systems. However, Rockman's works in this gallery often prioritize omitting actual humans from the scenes, focusing instead on the representation of other flora, fauna, and material culture that bear witness to humankind's

Johnson painted his Fighters for Freedom series in the mid-1940s as a tribute to African American activists, scientists, teachers performers and international heads of state working to bring peace to the world. He celebrated their accomplishments even as he acknowledged the realities of racism, violence and oppression they faced and overcame. Some of his fighters-Harriet Tubman, George Washington Carver, Marian Anderson and Mahatma Gandhi—are familiar historical figures; others are less wellknown individuals whose determination and sacrifice have been eclipsed over time. Drawn entirely from the collection of more than 1,000 works by Johnson given to the Smithsonian American Art Museum by the Harmon Foundation in 1967, this exhibition is the first-ever presentation of this series in Johnson's home state of South Carolina. "Fighters for Freedom: William H. Johnson Picturing Justice" is organized by the Smithsonian American Art Museum with generous support from Art Bridges, Faye and Robert Davidson, and the Jacob and Gwendolyr Lawrence Foundation. Gallery 9, Through Aug. 7 - "A New Deal: Artists at Work". During the Great Depression of the 1930s, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt launched his ambitious Works Progress Administration (WPA) programs that sent millions of unemployed Americans back to work, including more than 5,000 artists. The Federal Art Project, formed under the WPA, afforded opportunities to a diverse group of artists, including women, African Americans and recent immigrants from China, Russia and Germany. This monumental effort to put artists back to work resulted in a collection of artworks intended to uplift the national spirit and encourage creativity in the face of great challenges. The Gibbes is one of a select group of institutions across the country that houses a historic collection of Federal Art Project prints. Gallery 2 & 3, Through Oct. · "vviillam Eggleston Photographs from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection". It is said that William Eggleston's unique ability to conflate the epic and the everyday has made him one of the most impactful figures in late 20th century in black-and-white but became one of the first fine art photographers to use color to record his observations in a more heightened and accurate way. Today, his strikingly vivid yet enigmatic

photography. A native of Memphis, TN, Eggleston first photographed his local environs in the 1950s images of parked cars, billboards, storefronts, diners and other artifacts of the ordinary world are considered groundbreaking. The photographs presented in this edition of the museum's Charleston Collects exhibition series were selected from the Laura and Jay Crouse Collection and represent many of the pioneering artist's most notable works. The following year, he began working for architectural firm Skidmore, Owings and Merrill when Roger Milliken hired them to design Milliken's new research facility in Spartanburg. design the spray fountain outside of the facility which functions as a recycler of air conditioning water. lina — Randolph, Moore, Lee, and Montgomery counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship, as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for handmade, traditional pottery. July **16 - Dec. 11 -** "Diedrick Brackens: ark of bulrushes". This exhibition presents a new series by Los Angeles-based artist Diedrick Brackens including large-scale (8-feet) weavings and premiering the artist's first woven sculptures. Known for making colorful textiles about African American and queer histories, Brackens has developed a process of combining the tactility of varn with the ethos of storytelling. For this exhibition, the artworks tell timeless narratives about emancipation and remediation through pattern, body, and the power of craft. Bridges and Levine Galleries, Ongoing - "Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection". Focused on the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer, this installation is a survey of contemporary British studio ceramics. Comprising functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and today, the show features work by artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Gordon Baldwin and Rupert Spira, and cutting-edge ceramicists such as Julian Stair and Kate Malone. Several recently-gifted works from the Grainers are included. Alexander, Spangler, and Harris Galleries, Ongoing - "Portals to the Past: British Ceramics 1675 - 1825". The Mint Museum's collection of eighteenth-century British pottery and porcelain is widely respected for its scope and quality. The collection numbers over 2,000 objects and includes important examples of both salt-glazed

and dry-bodied stoneware from Staffordshire; tin-glazed earthenware from Bristol, Liverpool, and London; and cream-colored earthenware from Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and Yorkshire. Notable eighteenth-century porcelain factories represented include Chelsea, Bow, and Vauxhall in London, Longton Hall in Staffordshire, Worcester, Bristol, and others. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY; and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. The two works — "No. 17 [or] No. 15" and "Untitled 1951" — are the only paintings by Rothko currently on view in North Carolina. Craft + Design Galleries, Ongoing -"Craft in the Laboratory: The Science of Making Things." is the first installation in the Southeast to explore how craft artists and designers use science and math concepts when creating works of art. 
