He is from Columbia, SC, and is the son of the late Dr. Collie Coleman and Anne H. Coleman. Coleman currently serves as the Fine Arts Manager for the Lake City ArtFields Collective, where his primary responsibilities are the facilitation of all aspects of the annual ArtFields visual arts competition.

Before accepting his position at Art-Fields, Coleman was the Director of Art Education at the Sumter County Gallery of Art. He studied graphic design and art history as an undergraduate at Howard University in Washington, DC, and Alabama A&M University in Huntsville, AL. He is currently in his third year of a Doctoral program for Learning and Organizational Change at Baylor University, in Waco, TX. Koger Center for the Arts in Columbia, SC, Offers The Project: A 2021 Call for Art Exhibit

The Koger Center for the Arts in Columbia, SC, is presenting *The Project: A* 2021 Call for Art Exhibit, on view in the Center's Upstairs Gallery, through Aug. 31, 2022.

The exhibit features works by the 2021 winner, Mary Robinson, as well as works by Honorable Mentions: Christopher Lane, Rebecca Horne, Skip Willits, Arden Cone, and Susanna King.

Mary Robinson is a Professor of Art and Head of Printmaking at the University of South Carolina. She received her BFA in Studio Art from the University of Colorado, and MA in Art History from University of Wisconsin, and an MFA in Printmaking from Indiana University. Her work has been exhibited in galleries, museums and art centers throughout the United States as well as Australia, Denmark, England, Germany, Italy, Malaysia, Hong Kong, and South Korea.

Robinson offered the following artist's statement, "I first started working with a pattern of ovals in 2003 when I heard pianist and friend Marina Lomazov play a quick, sweet, fleeting, Chopin etude as a concert encore. Each note existed individually as well as blending with others, and then quickly lost vibration. I began to see a resonance between a musical note and a human life. Through studying Bud-

dhism and practicing yoga for many years, my recognition of the ephemerality of human nature has expanded to encompass all living beings and the interconnectedness among us. Humans are indeed part of, not separate from, nature. I visualize this condition of creation and destruction as a tapestry, with stretches of sustained rhythm as well as moments of ruptures and mends. The driving question in my artmaking is: how can I visually present both the euphoria and horror I experience in the 21st Century as we humans savor, destroy, and attempt to mend life on Earth?"

"Throughout printmaking I draw, carve, etch, print and layer marks to present my experience of being part of a larger life aggregate. I often cut, tear, smother, tangle, weave, glue and stitch the paper and fabric to reflect the ruptures that occur in the aggregate. My concurrent practices of weaving and dyeing fabric with patterns influence (and are influenced by) my printmaking."

The Project: A Call for Art from the Koger Center for the Arts is an annual artistic competition that supports the work of South Carolina visual artists. Each year, one chosen artist will receive a \$500 stipend, gallery space, and staff support

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701 Center for Contemporary Art in Columbia, SC, Features Works by Adrian Rhodes

701 Center for Contemporary Art in Columbia, SC, is presenting *How to Untie a* Tight Knot, featuring works by Adrian Rhodes, in the Center's Main Gallery, through Sept. 1, 2022.

Adrian Rhodes, The 701 CCA Prize 20 winner received a six-week, paid resi dency at 701 CCA; How to Untie a Tight *Knot* is the resulting solo exhibition. The purpose of the 701 CCA Prize is to identify and recognize artists 40 years and younger whose work is exemplary in its originality, shows awareness of artistic developments and is of high artistic merit. The winner was selected by a panel of three art profession-

Rhodes, 38, is a relative veteran of the 701 CCA Prize, having submitted to all four previous Prize competitions. Also in age and career, Rhodes was the veteran among the three finalists. The printmaker and mixed media installation artist holds both an BFA and MFA from Rock Hill's Winthrop University and has exhibited widely and often throughout the Carolinas and beyond. She was selected for the 2019 and 2021 701 CCA South Carolina Biennial and the recent region-wide exhibition Coined In The South at The Mint Museum in Charlotte, NC.

Rhodes' work is about relationships, and the complexity of closeness- the desire to separate from your past and return to it in the same breath. For Rhodes, print becomes

a method for creating structure. This framework, indulging a desire for order, creates space for disruption. Using prints as modular components allows the work to inherit visual information across a body of work. She is interested in how this repetition of imagery and motif reflects recurring thought patterns and an unwillingness to move on.

Tedious handwork is an anxiety response, reflecting an obsessive desire for

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
