Her formal training was with Master Potter, Yosuke Haruta and has studied briefly at: Parsons School of Design/Adelphi University, Kansas City Art Institute, Pacific Northwest College of Art, Savannah College of Art and Design in Savannah, GA, and has studied abroad at the Savannah College of Design in Lacoste, France.

Mike began his art studies with Ceramics instructor Yosuke Haruta, with an emphasis in traditional wheel thrown pottery and glaze calculation at Jackson College, Jackson, MI, in 1979. For International Professional Development in 2005 Mike traveled to Tokyo, Japan, where he enjoyed the experience of staying in a traditional Japanese home. While in Japan Mike visited and studied the peoples and cultures of urban and rural Japan. Visits included excursions to the Historic Pottery village of Mashiko, Japan, where Mike researched traditional Japanese Potteries.

In 2005 Mike assisted Patz in an International Artists-in-Residence at the American School in Japan in Nomizu Chofu-shi, Tokyo, Japan. In 2008, Mike was commissioned to create a permanent Wall Installation Sculpture commemorating the Environmental Discovery Center at the Lynches River County Park in South Carolina.
