Halsey - McCallum Studio

City of North Charleston, SC, Features Works by Jessie Renew and CJ Howard

The City of North Charleston's Cultural Arts Department is pleased to announce that concurrent solo exhibitions of mixed media works by Jessie Renew (North Charleston, SC) and oil paintings by CJ Howard (Wilmington, NC) will be on display at Park Circle Gallery, from July 6-30, 2022. A free reception hosted by the artists will be held at the gallery on July 8, from 5-7pm. The public is invited to attend.

In the exhibit, *Retrofits*, local artist, designer, and illustrator, Jessie Renew presents a collection of interactive, mixed media compositions. To build these pieces, Renew begins by scouring thrift stores, trash piles, buy-nothing groups, sales, and store closings to collect clothing, household objects, toys, craft supplies, and various other objects at the last stop before their ultimate disposal. She then breaks down and rebuilds this "stuff" into colorful 3D collages.

The results are works of art that celebrate the visual and narrative interest of everyday items. By changing their context, these objects are freed of their former lives as practical or decorative. "These pieces are about resourcefulness, reusing, and do-it-yourself approaches - opposing consumerism, wastefulness, perfectionism, and snobbery," Renew explains. "In that same spirit, *Retrofits* are an invitation for the viewer to have whatever type of experience they choose - be it surrendering to the color and abstraction, following the clues to create a narrative, or recalling their own memories and associations."

Jessie Renew was born and raised in Johannesburg, South Africa, before immigrating to the United States in 1995. From an early age, her two great passions took form: art and nature. She began art instruction at age 7 and continued through college where she earned degrees in studio art and art history. Concurrently, she pursued outdoor programs and experiences, especially in sailing, kayaking, hiking, and camping. Page 4 - Carolina Arts, July 2022

After college, Renew became a kayak instructor and evolved into a marketing professional in the outdoor industry. In 2016, she befriended a musician who would become her collaborator, and through this experience her passion for art was reignited. She began working freelance and doing art projects in addition to her job. These included chalk art, murals, graphic design, music videos, and illustration. A period of reevaluation led her to relocate to North Charleston and pursue art full time. Currently, she is working in her home studio on mixed-media paintings and sculpture.

In the exhibit, *Holy Humxns*, Wilmington, NC, based artist CJ Howard presents a series of life-size oil paintings that celebrate matriarchs who are artists. "These powerful and complex human beings are raising children, fighting for justice, working to pay *continued on Page 5*
