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"Rebuilding Affrilachia will be one of the gallery's most socially conscious exhibits ever," President of the Board of Directors Patti Trobaugh said. "It will have thought-provoking sculptures, performances, and the Community Accountability Plan, which gives specific actions that we all can do to make the world a better place. It is with great pride and social awareness that Upstairs Artspace presents Rebuilding Affrilachia."

This show will include an installation in the downstairs gallery illustrating Barton's Community Accountability Plan (CAP), a playbook that guides communities in grassroots revitalization strategies - specifically designed to break down silos and promote cross-generational, interdependent, and just solutions. There will be information on the Hood Huggers Tours, which bring to light the hidden heritage of African American places and people - throughout the Appalachian (Affrilachian) region. Several youth enrolled in another Hood Huggers' initiative, Hood Huggers Under Instruction (HHI/UI), will contribute artwork to the exhibition.

"I'm excited about the opportunity to talk about the CAP playbook," Barton said. "When people come to see this exhibit, they can expect to see found-object sculptures that illustrate the CAP playbook and art pieces that evoke my sense of whimsy and creativity. I hope they leave with a strategy for how we bring people, place, and communities together. This art show was created to express visually and verbally the vision, concepts, and strategies within the CAP playbook. It is art with action."

All proceeds from art sales during the Rebuilding Affrilachia exhibit at Upstairs Artspace will go toward the Hood Huggers International initiative Blue Note Junction, a one-of-a-kind health and business incubator with the motto: "at the crossroads of health and entrepreneurship."

In association with the exhibition, Barton will have a spoken-word performance at Tryon's Roseland Community Center on July 13, at 2pm in conjunction

with Roseland's RISE! (Roseland Institute for Summer Enrichment) program for teenagers. The performance is open to the public. And, on July 22 at 2pm at Upstairs Artspace, Tanisha Akinloye, founder and CEO of Empowering Through Beauty, Inc., will host "African American Descendants Fest," highlighting people, places, and things within Polk County's African American community. "We will celebrate with stories to honor our past, present, and future, with food, fashion, music, and art. Also, during that public event, we will officially launch and announce my organization Empowering Through Beauty, Inc. and Hood Huggers International in partnership in Polk County." she said.

Upstairs Artspace is a nonprofit organization dedicated to presenting contemporary art. It is located on S. Trade Street, in downtown Tryon.

GreenHill Center for North Carolina Art in Greensboro, NC, Features Works by John Rosenthal & 10 NC Photographers

Living in the Ordinary World, a retrospective exhibition of photographs by John Rosenthal, organized by GreenHill Center for North Carolina Art, in Greensboro, NC, opens on July 22, 2023 and runs through Nov. 4, 2023. Finding the luminous in ordinary things has been a pursuit for Rosenthal for five decades. GreenHill's survey will be organized around the artist's major series of New York City, his son as a child, the Lower Ninth Ward of New Orleans, and spectators gazing at art among others. Lili Corbus offered the following about Noggle, "Anne Noggle (1922-2005) was a photographer, aviator, and trailblazer. After serving as a WASP (Women Airforce Service Pilots) during WWII, she became a crop duster and stunt pilot. By the 1960s, after retiring from the military, she moved to New Mexico to study art history and photography. She typically focused her lens on her intimate circle of family and friends, and, later, women pilots in the US and Russia. Noggle also worked as an educator, curator, and earned honors such as three National Endowment for the Arts grants and a Guggenheim Fellowship. She authored three books and her work is now found in

"Noggle often explored the subject

of women and aging, or what she called 'the saga of the fallen flesh'. Many of her self-portraits disrupt traditional views and clichés of aging women with her creation of alter-egos and personas. Blending humor, pathos, and irony, her images continue to defy and challenge traditional concepts of beauty, 'age-appropriate' behaviors, and bring complex, compelling layers to her

subjects. Her portraits are often unflinch-

ing views of those pictured, investing them

with a lively sense of character and spirit,

poignant mortality, or acerbic wit," added

CORPUS is comprised of ceramic and fabric works that encourage reflection on continued above on next column to the right | the meaning of survival in the face of colonialism. Fifteen ceramic sculptures, each with matching tapestries, will be presented in a symbolic representation of the annual Corpus Christi festival in Cusco, Perú. The sculptures reference indigenous pre-Columbian forms and iconographies in a visual representation of syncretic aesthetic, cultural, and religious traditions.

CORPUS engages with and confronts Perú's Spanish colonial past, asserting that pre-Columbian sacred entities

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
