Please join our Artist-In-Residence, Tyrone Geter in the studio and exhibition space every Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday through Aug. 20 to experience the development of his new series titled, *Brave New World*. Geter has spent years creating works investigating the emotional relationship between humanity and the environment. Having spent extensive time in The Gambia, Nigeria, and South Carolina Geter captured photographs and sketches of the landscape and community and journeyed to develop a series of large-scale charcoal drawings that he will complete in the duration of his tenure as Artist in Residence at 701 Center of Contemporary Art. **Hallway Gallery, Through July 29** - "Tall Women," featuring collage works by Ginny Merrett. Featuring 40 photographs exploring the story of a Black baseball team from Rembert, SC, and their fans. Based on the 1998 book by Frye Gaillard with photographs by Byron Baldwin, the exhibition highlights the story of the 521 All-Stars team of Rembert, SC, a Black baseball team with roots going back to the 1920s. Named for Hwy 521, which runs past their baseball field, the 521 All-Stars play for the love of the game and the pride and solidarity it brings. Featuring more than 40 framed black and white photographs taken during the team's 1996-1997 season, 521 All-Stars depicts baseball in its purest form: scrap metal bases, rotten wood bleachers, teams made up of brothers, fathers, sons and, most importantly, fellowship within the community. **Ongoing** - The South Carolina State Museum, the state's largest and most comprehensive museum, is located along the banks of the beautiful Congaree River in downtown Columbia, South Carolina. **Florence County Museum**, 111 West Cheves Street, across the street from the Francis Marion University Performing Arts Center, Florence. **Ongoing** - "Kindred Spirit: The Personal Worlds of William H. Johnson". William H. Johnson (1901 - 1970) was a man between worlds: raised in the rural South, but educated in New York; black, but his unknown father was white; American-born, but lived much of his adult life in Europe. This diverse heritage gave Johnson a unique perspective and insight, but at times it was also a difficult shadow which followed him as he traveled the world in search of his true artistic voice. Eventually, after many years away from his hometown of Florence, SC, Johnson returned to the United States. Although living in New York, his art began to focus almost entirely on the lives and experiences of African Americans in the rural South. "My travels taught me that an artist must live and paint in his own environment... This development shall continue for the rest of my life, and it is the painting of my people," said Johnson in 1941. **Special Exhibits Gallery, Through Aug. 13** - "Legend: Francis Marion in the Pee Dee." This exhibit will focus on the military career and subsequent legends and legacy of General Francis Marion (1732 - 1795). The exhibition will feature a selection of important 19th century American artworks depicting Marion and his militia during the Revolutionary War, with interpretive emphasis on how Marion's activities in the Pee Dee region of South Carolina contributed to the folkloric "Marion mythos". These artworks will be requested as loans from major national public & private collections. As much as possible, the exhibition will also incorporate historical artifacts recently recovered from archaeological sites associated with Marion's local military activities. Loans of available authentic primary source archival materials such as documents and maps will be explored, to the extent that they would sustain the exhibition's objectives by adding meaningful support to the overall thesis. **Education Gallery, Through Aug. 13** - Featuring a multi-dimensional exhibition highlighting archeological sites alongside the lore of the Snow's Island Community. Inspired by Steven D. Smith's book, "Francis Marion and the Snow Island Community", and the artwork of James H. Palmer. Viewers will be asked to consider the setting, characters and the invisible communities of untold stories. The exhibition aims to encourage and develop digital and critical literacies. A portion of the exhibition is funded by a SC250 Education Grant. **Community Gallery, Ongoing** - This exhibit introduces visitors to the history of the museum and its formative collections. This gallery also exhibits the histories and diversity of the City of Florence, and the incorporated municipalities of Florence County. Additionally, the Community Gallery communicates the lives, stories and accomplishments of significant past and present citizens of Florence County and members of it's communities. This gallery is one of two permanent exhibit spaces designed by award winning exhibit design firm, HaleySharpe Design.

**Pee Dee History Gallery, Ongoing** - This is the largest gallery space in the facility, comprising 3,300 sq. ft. of exhibit space. This permanent collections gallery occupies the entire second floor, east wing of the building. Artifacts are supported by historical images and narrative interpretation, giving a comprehensive introduction to the Pee Dee region from prehistory to the present.
