An Artist Talk will be offered on July 11, beginning at 6pm. "Invisible Planet" is an imaginary world that represents untouched beauty and the raw wonder of creation. Russo created "The Planet" which aims to be a refuge for neuro-divergent people who suffer from sensory issues and overstimulation. This world in her work is a mysterious and ethereal land filled with mountains, cliffs, mushrooms, and an ever-present orange sun. Smolin's experience growing up half-Jewish in the Deep South - Birmingham, AL - is reflected in his symbology and exploration of identity issues. His flamboyant and androgynous characters, as visitors on "The Planet", challenge gender norms and societal expectations. Smolin's work delivers condensed psycho-symbolic imagery that deals with themes of identity, religion, oppression, and conformity. We remember the stories, values, and lessons that our elders taught us, and we teach those things to our children." Inspired by the Pattern & Decoration Movement of the mid-1970s to early 1980s, Haney's work incorporates floral imagery, pattern, and decoration, dismantling the hierarchy of fine art over craft and blurring the line between art and design. Born in Decatur, AL, Haney received her Bachelor of Arts in Art with a Studio Concentration, cum laude from Rhodes College in Memphis, TN, and her MFA in Painting from Claremont Graduate University in Claremont, CA. This flora and fauna series began during Bree's artist residency at Olive Stack Gallery in the small town of Listowel, County Kerry, Ireland in February of 2022 and ended in Bree's residency in the even smaller town of Orquevaux, France in February 2023. This multi-step process began as a collection of leaves and flowers from her daily walks around the village, which she then printed them in acrylic on canvas and covered with more realistic paintings. At the end of a traumatic winter, she was interested in creating "dreamscapes", landscape paintings of places that don't quite exist - vivid, soft, multi-layered, and safe. Through Aug. 12 - "SMOKE HOUSE," featuring works by Cedric Umoja. "I make drawings, paintings, found material sculptures, murals, collages, site-based installation work, and most recently, ritual performance film work. These mediums allow me to critically explore a Black Speculative future while honoring and paying homage to a Black past. There is a focus on intersectional Blackness and the celebration of Black life in its totality, with emphasis on ancestral lineages, land preservation and African American contributions to Black Diasporic culture.
