The title of the show comes from a poem by mystic poet Rumi, "We are the mountain. You are the sounds coming down". Providing spiritual sanctuary, refuge, natural beauty and wonder, the Blue Ridge Mountains are a constant source of inspiration for local artists. Created with the heavily impastoed, and expressive use of oil paint that the artist is known for, the paintings depict moments of inspiration, or what Sheldon likes to call 'ecstatic moments' with people and nature.

Sheldon's sculptural works explore, in three dimensions, the underlying, universal forces of nature the artist experiences on his frequent hikes 'up mountain'.

Sheldon received a BFA in Painting from the Rhode Island School of Design in 1984, which included a formative year spent painting in Rome, Italy, as part of RISD's European Honors Program. As a grad student, Sheldon brought sculpture into the mix. His thesis show for his MFA in 1990, at the University of Maryland, incorporated large-scale, mixed-media paintings, as well as sculptural works.

Sheldon continues to create cuttingedge sculptural works in metal, as well as provocative public art. Modernist sculpture, with its emphasis on the dynamics of form and space, continues to be a major influence in his work. Sheldon endeavors to create what he calls "spatial music".

Mark Bettis Gallery offers unique and distinctive works of art in a variety of mediums including contemporary paintings, glass, and sculptural work, as well as a variety of rotating exhibitions by local and nationally acclaimed artists. One can argue that Mexico has been an important center for Surrealism for centuries. Long before the influx of Surrealist artists and writers fleeing Europe at the onset of World War II, Mexico had a Surrealist movement of its own percolating. The landscape of Mexico is surreal itself: pyramids, Olmec, Mayan, and Aztec sculptures and friezes repeatedly depict double headed serpents, masks of Bat God, huge Olmec heads, skulls with bulging eyes and bared teeth, effigy vessels in the shape of jaguars and other fantastical beasts.
