The exhibition from the Smithsonian Museum presents the history of a nation through the lens of significant and iconic African American men in a historical and cultural landscape. He was born in St. Stephen, SC, and received his BA Summa Cum Laude from Claflin, later studied at the Art Institute of Chicago and earned his MA from New York University.
