Blowing Rock Art and History Museum, corner of Chestnut and Main streets, downtown Blowing Rock. Fort & Atwell Galleries, Through Dec. 30 - "GIFTED: Collecting the Art of California at Gardena High School, 1919-1956". The exhibition was developed for the hundredth anniversary of the Gardena High School Art Collection (GHSAC) in 2019 and illustrates the unlikely history of a communal approach to collectionbuilding and a microcosm of California's modern art history. BRAHM is pleased to announce that it will be hosting this exhibition in the summer of 2023. This will be the first occasion that the Gardena Collection has been exhibited on the East Coast and further cements the Museum's role as an important site for interpreting early American Modern painting, including Impressionism, figurative, landscape and genre painting. Accompanying the exhibit is a catalog of over 200 pages with color plates of the entire collection and interpretive analyses of its historical background and artistic significance. Photo print courtesy of the Blowing Rock Charity Horse Show Foundation. In 1923, one of Blowing Rock's most beloved traditions began as a small tournament on the hill behind Green Park Inn. A century later, the Blowing Rock Charity Horse Show has transformed into a monumental event on a beautiful preserve that draws equestrians from across the country due to its reputation for being an exceptionally "fun" show for participants and spectators alike. A Hundred Years of Horses commemorates this growth and success through stories and objects illuminating the history of BRCHS. Schaefer Gallery, Through Aug. 6 - "Earth & Fowl: Chickens and Other Poultry in Clay". The ceramic objects found in this exhibition are obviously of a kind. Birds have long been a common subject for sculptural objects meant for the home. In particular, domestic poultry-ducks, geese, guineas, pigeons, and turkeys, with chickens chief among them—are animals that have been deeply integrated into our visual culture. They are signs and symbols of prosperity, familial health and wealth, and avatars in children's stories and more recently of agricultural independence. Their likeness can be found on wallpaper and china patterns, decorative hand towels, mass-produced porcelain figurines, and nearly any other decorative object we might as sociate with the home. They are also a perennial subject in North Carolina's rich pottery tradition. Rankin West Gallery, Through Nov. 11 - "Artists Alley: Building a Creative Community in Blowing Rock". This exhibition illustrates an essential, animating force in Blowing Rock's artistic history: the small community of Artists Alley. Located on a single eponymous road just minutes from Main Street off Highway 221, Artists Alley emerged in the late 1950s and would ultimately host a varied yet tightly knit band of artists and craftspeople living and making alongside one another for over 60 years. Exploring that which makes us most uncomfortable, Larassa Kabel explores the emotional and intellectual space between life and death, love and loss. Through drawing, painting, performance, and sculpture, she confronts our view of ourselves "outside of Nature" and our desire to distance ourselves from our mortality. In addition to designing the lighting for Passage, Nina Elder created the exquisite graphite drawings in Time Pieces contemplations on the physical texture of time and the potential for transformation. Katherine's "Weeds Collection" explores the manipulation of traditional techniques and materials by utilizing her gilt cast o s to create delicate oral slips reminiscent of the beautiful botanical illustrations from the Victorian era. Each composition captures the beauty of weeds and invasive wild owers native to North Carolina that Diuguid has photographed and sketched near her house and her parents farm in Iredell and Caldwell counties.
