She was in such a state that when the other mourners left her father paid the grave diggers to lift the coffin from the grave and open the lid. 'There she was,' the woman said, 'the only one who loved me.'"

"The stories are as varied as those telling them, but there is no doubt that these women played an important part in the social fabric of America. They deserve recognition," say Bostic.

The Caldwell Arts Council in Lenoir, NC, is presenting *LOGOLEPSY: An obsession With Words*, featuring works by Lenoir artist Jenna Bailey, through Sept. 24, 2021

Bailey is a local artist and art teacher at Hibriten High School in Lenoir. She holds a BFA in Art Education with a concentration in painting from UNC Greensboro and has taught high school level art for 11 years in Wilkes and Caldwell counties. Originally from Gastonia, NC, Bailey enjoys working in a variety of mediums including watercolor, oil, encaustic, printmaking, and ceramics. Her artwork creates tranquil moods through the use of

soft, muted colors, patterns, and layered imagery that focuses on graceful female portraits and natural elements, such as plants and wildlife.

Bailey offered the following statement, "My idea for Logolepsy originated after I read an article about how language and words evolve over time. I learned that, in the English language, more words are dying out than new words are being created and that our contemporary vocabulary range has decreased over time. I found it a bit sad to see so many intriguing words falling out of common usage today, so I set off on a journey to collect and in a

way, preserve the words that I find beautiful in some way. Each artwork is titled with the word and definition that it was inspired by."

"For me, the process was a bit like reading a great book, where the author's precise word choice allows the reader to create a rich, detailed image of the scene in their mind's eye," adds Bailey. "The connotations and imagery different words evoke intrigues me and that is what I wanted to explore and document in this collection of artwork. I let my mind wander as I thought about each word and let the compositions, colors, and images freely arise in my imagination. I allowed myself the freedom to create what made me happy, without any expectations, and I found that this was incredibly freeing to my artistic voice and creative process.'

"This collection is primarily female portraits with elements from the natural world incorporated, like animals and plants. I work primarily with acrylics and encaustics, which is melted pigmented beeswax. I enjoy being inspired by a variety of colors and patterns as embellishments and experimenting with different opacities to layer multiple images together. I want to create a sense of serene, peacefulness in my artwork that captures the beauty of our humanity and our interconnectedness with nature. I always consider myself an eternal optimist, so I want to represent the awe inspiring beauty that I see in the world, and share it with others.'

Bailey continues, "I would like to especially thank my husband, Ben, and family for their support and respect of all the studio hours that went into the creation

The Caldwell Arts Council in Lenoir, NC, will present *VARIATIONS: Work During the Pandemic*, featuring works by Lenoir artist Thomas Thielemann, on view from Sept. 3 through Oct. 15, 2021

The work in this exhibition explores the pandemic in abstract ways. The mixed media work focuses on the relationships between people and locations as the quarantine began. Like people disappeared from social environments in large cities and small towns, so do the figures in these works. They fade into the setting and away from interactions and each other.

The intaglio works are more nonobjective, combining black and white linear elements with type. In these works, the ground becomes a constant while the words become a variable. The words make abstract references into situations and events experienced during the past year.

Thielemann and his wife Lynda Lea Bonkemeyer met as graduate students working on their MFA at Radford University in Virginia (yes, Virginia is for lovers).
