McCallum is still one of my favorite Charleston artists, along with her husband, the late William Halsey, who I was lucky to get to know while doing this publication. I learned so much about Charleston's visual art community, its history, artists, and what it's like to have a long career in the arts. I really miss talking with the two of them, but, their artwork lives on. And their work will always have a home in our publication.

Big Events This Month

There are some really big events taking place this month. All events which we report on at Carolina Arts are important, but the two I'm going to include here are really big (major showcasing) events, both taking place in North Carolina.

The Caldwell Arts Council will present the 36th Annual Sculpture Celebration, a free event, juried by John Douglas Powers, on Sept. 10, from 9am-4pm, at the T.H. Broyhill Walking Park, in Lenoir, NC. Sculptors are invited to bring up to 3 sculptures for this one-day event to compete for \$11,000 in cash awards, along with potential sales and commissions. This annual family-friendly event attracts sculptors and buyers from the eastern United States to Lenoir and in past years, has attracted over

The 2022 Potters Market at the Mint will feature 55 booths representing more than 55 of the top potters working in North Carolina. The event will take place from 10am to 4pm, on Sept. 24, 2022 at the Mint Museum Randolph lawn, at 2730 Randolph Road. In addition to the pottery sale, attendees can enjoy pottery demonstrations, live music, a raffle, beer garden and food concessions, as well as free access to Mint Museum Randolph galleries (open until 6pm on Sept. 24). A Good Friend of Carolina Arts Has Reopened

The Upstairs Artspace in Tryon, NC, has been a good friend of our publication since the days we first started covering the visual arts in North Carolina. They have been advertising their exhibitions and special events with us. Last year they had to close their doors for repairs, but they have finally reopened, after a year of rebuilding, with three exhibitions by seven artists from Tryon, Asheville, Rock Hill, and Los Angeles titled. Carefully Placed Lines on Paper, Human Connections, and The Thinking Eye. These three free exhibitions will be on public display through Oct. 14, 2022.

"The artists in these three exhibitions are the same artists who were here when the flood happened," Patti Trobaugh, Board Member and Treasurer said. "We had their reception on a Saturday night, and after everyone left, the hot water heater broke and flooded all three floors of the gallery until it continued on Page 7

"This produces a vibrant selection of work and makes the gallery a wonderful destination for hand-crafted items from talented Lowcountry makers.'

Jewelry artist Tammy Rudd works magic with glass and intense heat. To create her luminous flame-worked beads, she uses an oxygen-propane torch that heats up to 2000 degrees Fahrenheit. With molten glass and deft hands, Rudd crafts beads that glow with color and mesmerizing detail. Each of her beads is a tiny work of art that creates fascinating focal points in her necklaces and earrings.

Marty Biernbaum's abstract encaustic paintings bring to mind calming landscapes of sky and sea. She begins her paintings by heating beeswax in an electric frying pan and combining it with resin and pigments before applying it to a natural wood support. She uses a propane torch to melt and stabilize as many as 15 layers of wax to complete each painting. This intense heat process helps develop her colors and smooth the surface. Encaustic paintings don't need to be framed, so the ethereal and expressive beauty of Marty's work radiates from the surfaces of her art.

talented ceramic artists and all rely on the tremendous heat of their kilns to convert clay into strong, resilient forms. Typically two trips through the kiln are required (one for bisque firing, another for glaze firing) at temperatures well above 2000 degrees Fahrenheit. An example of the talent in the gallery is Fred Prudhomme who makes functional pottery in stoneware by both wheel throwing pots and hand-building vessels. Prudhomme's highly individualized pieces include mugs, bowls, plates and lidded vessels. With crisp lines, warm colors and distinctive glazing, his work feels good in your hands and looks wonderful in your home.

The newest of the gallery's ceramic artists is Melanie Davidson. She creates her work by layering different clay bodies of varying colors, then using various techniques to manipulate the joined clay bodies to produce patterns, as well as free random effects. Greenville Technical College in Greer, SC, is presenting *Best Practices*, featuring works by Enid Williams, on view in the Benson Campus Galleries, through Sept. 16,2022.

Enid Williams limits her painting voabulary to condensed semicircular shapes rendered in a myriad of bold, almost unyielding colors, as well as subtle, modulated color. She pairs this color complexity with her time-consuming process of building images through the layering of shapes.

She often scrapes through layers to reveal subtle, earlier colors or adds layers to intensify colors. The end result is a stop-action surface that is suspended on and supported by the dense, complex layers of shapes that retain the motion of her brush stroke.

According to Williams, "I continue to explore changing dichotomies within this diverse framework ... "Not only does she explore and experiment with color, with application as additive and subtractive procontinued on Page 13

ing her visual scenarios. Best Practices is a collection of images that presents a sampling of the many ambiguities of her processes, explorations, and thus her paintings. Through her accessible vocabulary of shapes, she renders a concentrated visual schema of the passage of time and the evolution of color through layering. lucky. On the Sunday afternoon of my seventh week out of work, I found a canvas with a not-so-pretty floral painting on it. I removed the painting, cut out a photograph from a magazine, sketched it and began to paint. I finished it around midnight and was pleasantly shocked.

"That particular Sunday, I found a song that makes my heart truly sing. I can't stop.'

Grubbs adds, "I think that a lot of people possess the ability to be creative, but the realization of it never comes because they never try to give it a chance. I had no clue about myself. 

They become sitespecific maps of a place, offering a form of communication that extends language.

Arzani received her BFA in Painting and Art Education from UNC Charlotte in 2012. She then earned her MFA in Visual Studies from the Pacific Northwest College of Art.

Holly Keogh is a painter based in Charlotte, NC. She is interested in the relationship between memory and our desire to document or freeze time. She is a first generation American, and throughout her hildhood photographs were mailed back and forth between her family members in England and America. These photographs depict cousins' birthdays she never attended or new homes she never stepped inside. She examines the familiar faces in these images in vain; she can't bring them any closer, she can't reconstruct the original moments in time. She treats the figures in these photographs as a starting point from which her own consciousness supplants the subject's personality.

Psychologically charged portraits emerge from tension between her will to remember and her power to project. Images from her family's discarded photographs, saved tabloids, and memorabilia are cropped and refocused. With this treatment, the paintings arrive at something that is as familiar as it is open to interpretation; a combination of that imperfect documentation and her equally imperfect memory. Her work aims to create a sensory experience that brings awareness to how different media construct our reality. Keogh received her BFA in Painting and her BA in Art History continued on Page 15



General admission tickets valid any of the event dates are no longer available at retail locations statewide as in the past.

"This is the most significant operational change in the Festival's nearly three-decade history. We encourage visitors to reserve their date and purchase tickets in advance online while they last. Tickets will be offered at the Festival on-site box office only on event days not sold out in advance," stated Matt Siegel, the Festival's Director of Marketing.

The Festival is open rain or shine. Ticket holders will receive a refund should the Festival not open on an event date due to extreme unsafe weather conditions, a very rare occurrence according to Festival organizers. Additionally, the Festival's online ticket provider works with FanShield ticket protection to present purchasers an option to buy, at a modest additional fee, an insur-

Last year's reopening of the Renaissance Festival came with the impact of additional weekend traffic on an adjacent road system increasingly burdened with new residential and commercial developments now surrounding the Festival's once rural location near the Town of Huntersville in North Mecklenburg County

Beth Coiner offered the following, "I'm a modern dancer turned jeweler. I approach each design much like a piece of choreography, drawing from the inherent movement found in natural and architectural landscapes. My tiny sculpture designs are textured and intimate, creating wearable urban and rural vistas. I find specimens in the natural world and transform them into wearable art.'

"My bespoke jewelry process refers back to an old style of jewelry making," adds Coiner. "It's an intimate, tailor-made process of repurposing under-worn, or family heirloom jewelry into a re-imagined design for my clients. Each project has their own unique stories and little memories that remain after the sentimental materials have undergone their transformation into a new design. I'd like to think there are similar parallels along the idea of intimacy with both my dances and jewelry for my collections and bespoke projects. When choreographing a solo or duet, instead of a large group, the dance is scaled down to focus on gestures and an unspoken narrative to tell a story. With my jewelry, the dance piece is present on a very macro scale. It reveals itself in the curvature of a tiny shell, or the repetition of shapes and textures, as well as how each piece relates to the body. In my creative process, the jewelry is the solo dancer and the wearer is the stage. When I'm not at my workbench making jewelry, I'm usually dancing.'

Matthew Duffus is the author of the novel "Swapping Purples for Yellows", the collection "Dunbar's Folly and Other Stories", and the poetry chapbook "Problems of the Soul and Otherwise". He was born in Pennsylvania and spent time living in Maryland, Indiana, Mississippi, Minnesota, and Tennessee, before finally settling in North Carolina, where he has lived for the past fifteen years.

Along the way, Duffus received graduate degrees in English and creative writing from the University of Mississippi and the University of Minnesota and worked as a graduate instructor and research assistant, tment caretaker, bookseller, co sions supervisor, and residence hall director. He currently teaches and directs the writing center at Gardner-Webb University, in Boiling Springs, NC.

Darrin Griggs, 55, is a printmaker producing primarily woodcuts but also lino prints. All his prints are from his own original drawings, mostly of his environment on the family farm in Grover, where he is at least the fifth generation to live on the same property in Cleveland County.

Griggs moved back to NC in 2019 after 24 years in Oslo, Norway, where he worked as journalist for a global business newspaper, while traveling Europe, Asia and the Mideast as a specialist in the sector for offshore oil and gas.

A graduate of Shelby High School, Griggs began drawing well before grade school and has continued all his life. He originally started his studies at Western Carolina University as a drawing student for several years before focusing on creative writing. After earning his Bachelor of Arts degree in English, writing and editing, at WCU, graduating summa cum laude, Darrin went on to earn a Master of Fine Arts degree in creative writing at UNCG.

After 31 years as a journalist, Griggs is now spending his time switching back and forth between his twin loves of writing and drawing, by working on a novel, drawing, and producing art prints.

"Inspired by my love of history, the serenity of country living, Southern folklore and traditions, Allegra Nichole Design embodies a unique and eclectic collection of jewelry combining silversmithing with natural stones. Self-taught and not liking to follow the rules, I create intuitively, letting my materials do the talking. I love and appreciate the inherent beauty and the unique characteristics of the natural stones that I use," added Klett-Wilson.

"Having previously won support from the Regional Artists Project Grant, I was afforded the opportunity to purchase a hydraulic press that changed how I create my designs. As a charcoal portrait artist Naje's work is inspired by African American females and the beauty that comes out of the struggle of being a black girl/ woman in America. Deeply moving charcoal work with bold and playful colors showcase her obsessions with her culture and the women that her culture represents.

Shadae Tompkins is an interdisciplinary artist based in Rock Hill, SC. She has a BFA from Winthrop University. Her work includes sculpture, installation, and printmaking. Tompkins mainly uses recycled clothing, yarn, and other materials in her artistic practice. Her work prioritizes the experience of the young Black woman, fighting to maintain the legacy of Black creators before her. When she isn't in the art studio actively working, you can catch her in the music studio writing and recording.

models. Sketched subjects sit in the artist's studio and tell their stories as she paints them: the feminine Kinnari birds with tongues like whips, la mente malevola, a migraine like a doomed mouse before the feline paw, memories of a mother who worshiped the mango bone. In poems, paintings, and drawings, the artist captures moments of deep listening, translated to word and image.

He frequently made studio visits to see new work and often brought his friends or guests, many of whom also became collectors of Williams' work. As their collector / artist relationship grew, Schwartz, a quick-witted graphic designer, was always eager to share his expertise, time and graphic design skills when needed. As an advocate, encourager, and promoter of Williams' work, Schwartz remained a devoted friend, steadfast in his support until passing unexpectedly in January 2022.

The fish paintings, landscapes, and sculptural works from Schwartz's collection provide the opportunity to compare and contrast at once, both subtle and not so subtle, changes characterizing three decades of Mike Williams' career.

The purpose of this exhibition is two-

fold in that it places a spotlight on the artist/ collector relationship through this example and, also, provides the opportunity for these works to be acquired and placed in a new environment so they may continue to be appreciated in another setting.

During his 32-year career, Columbia, SC, artist Mike Williams (b.1963) has created upwards of 5,000 paintings, drawings and sculptures. Orangeburg County Fine Arts Center in Orangeburg, SC, Features Works by James H. Green, Jr.

The Orangeburg County Fine Arts Center in Orangeburg, SC, will present James H. Green, Jr: The Man and His Times, curated by Dr. Frank C. Martin, II, on view from Sept. 7 through Oct. 26, 2022. A reception will be held on Sept. 7, from 6-8pm.

"Through the art presented in this volume, had it not been for the illness in his life, James could have been one of the most accomplished artists in this country," the author and photographer, Cecil Williams, once a close friend of the late artist, writes in the foreword to his book Timeless Expressions: The Rediscovered Art of James H. Green, Jr.

Williams further writes that their paths to pursue the arts diverged when Green, in 1956, left his family home and life in Orangeburg, having been awarded an art scholarship from Ohio Wesleyan University. There Green would study painting and sculpture. The university prioritizes preparing students to become professional artists and proudly lists a roster of alumni recognized nationally and internationally. Green's illness, which first presented itself during his student years, would cripple his life, but as his family would discover 55 years later, it did not interfere with his art. Returning to Orangeburg, he continued, quietly and persistently, to paint and sculpt for 26 years, residing and storing over 150 pieces of his work in the attic of what is now the long-vacant family home.

Treasuring Green's undiscovered art as reverently as he had their friendship, Williams carefully transported "this art treasure" and as with overlooked and lost "Old Masters," initiated the process of restoring and preparing the artist's works for viewings.

Williams, reflecting on the reclusive life of his close friend Green, whom he called Jimmy, said he was never able to experience the critical reaction, certain appreciation his works would have received, but the man, as an artist, will be recognized and his art has been retrieved

Among the first to view the collection, was Dr. Frank C. Martin, II, former curator lirector of The LP Stanback Muse & Planetarium on the campus of South Carolina State University, in Orangeburg, who is now a member of the faculty of the university's department of art. His reaction to inspecting the collection was instantaneous. "James Green is an extraordinary Orangeburg artist, who has mastered the figurative tradition and the far more difficult organization of poignant compositional abstraction. He shows evidence of wonderful influences from Orphism, particularly the paintings of Robert and Sonia Delaunay, in addition to influences from Pointillism and Divisionism."

Looking closely at the abstract pieces, Martin continues, "Regarding the Pointillist and Divisionist methods, Green employs small, squared strokes of pure color, placed side-by-side to juxtapose bits of vibrant

pigment with contrasting colors employing a technique perfected by the Impressionists and Post-Impressionist based on simultaneous contrast of colors. This method led to the generation of "optical art" in which the spectator's eyes organize the composition into varying, highly nuanced color sets."

When Martin stands before what are considered Green's earlier works, he noted that the artist first worked as "a figurative artist and there are some very interesting, wellcomposed still-life pieces. And it seems to be evident from the still life pieces that he looked at, perhaps in his career as a student, French painter, Paul Cézanne but also artists like Norman Lewis and African American artists who started out as figurative artists, but who later turned to abstraction. The thing that is striking is the rhythm Green establishes in the compositions, and I would also say he looked at some of the works of Alma Thomas, who was quite a famous African American abstract artist, who had a number of very important exhibitions in the 1970s. The very distinctive square brush stroke was something that she also used to juxtapose and contrast vibrant elements of color, creating a shimmering visual effect in her work comparable to what Green has done.³

Considering the piece titled *David's* Report Card, observed as the image of the young boy with a report card, Martin identifies other influences and commonalities seen in Green, for years a cloistered recluse "You see the influence of Modigliani and other artists from the modernist period. So, he's very much an artist working in the modernist tradition transitioning out of simple representation into a sort of enjoyment of moving paint media around on the canvas.'

"When he moves away from the figure," Martin offers one last observation, "he is working toward a kind of abstract expressionist ideal. And he's taking influences from these earlier artists in the 20s, 30s and 40s Like the Delaunays and their use of Orphic, emotive colorism, and the nuanced influence of individuals like Amedeo Modigliani."

Both Williams and Martin, as the exhibition takes shape, curated by Martin, contemplate from their different perspectives the complexities of Green's works, yet to be discovered by others in our regional art communities as these works are further explored.

"He (Green) is going to take a good deal more study because his work merits very careful scrutiny," Martin states as he surveys the show that will introduce James H. Green, Jr. to the world.



For the past 2 years, the Quilt Show was cancelled due to COVID Concerns, but is now back better and stronger than ever.



"My sketchbook is a constant companion on business trips and vacations," he states. "The majority of these sketches were drawn on site, often with some details finished later, such as additional trees, shadows, and textures, often in a hotel room or airplane. Others were drawn based on photographs and notes made on site when there was not adequate time to sketch on site. I think the more successful images resulted from drawing on site under time constraints: with too much time, it is easy to draw too much. I have found the simpler, quicker sketches to be the more successful, and often most descriptive, drawing only enough to capture the essence of the subject.'

"My illustrations blur the lines between make believe and reality," she said. "Playful, whimsical, at times satirical, these characters address the foibles and absurdities of being human and female in a modern world. Initially, I used them as a way of



portraying a connection between a sense of self and the desire to retain strength while exhibiting softness and perhaps vulnerability.

Each of the four Asheville artists - Jeff Kinzel, Martha Skinner, Ralston Fox Smith and Kevin Hogan - are exploring space in fundamentally different ways in the exhibit *The Thinking Eye*. They are investigating their chosen subjects and paying attention to the dynamic elements that make up a piece of artwork, in particular the third dimension, depth.

Jeff Kinzel was born and reared in New York. He pursued his initial art studies at the Art Students League, The National Academy, and as a studio assistant to painter Ellsworth Kelly. He graduated from Boston University with a bachelor's degree in English and received graduate training at the University of Iowa. His works have been featured in exhibitions abroad, as well as in New York, Iowa, and North Carolina. Kinzel has worked in education, both in the public school system and recently as director of Naturally Grown School. He maintains an art studio in Asheville

Martha Skinner, born in Colombia, is an international multi-media artist with a master's degree in Architecture and Urban Culture. Her career as an artist, researcher, professor, and public speaker spans 25 years. She converses with our built environment through visualizations of the cycles of life to address temporal, social, and environmental issues of our delicate ecology. She utilizes this methodology in her work to filter, transmit, capture, and commemorate the intangible qualities of the passing of time with playful representations of the relationships between humans and the environment in which they are situated.

"I will exhibit a series of drawings expanding space through collaboration and interplay with light. As an exploration at various scales, they're also installations and performances - moving, changing, and inhabitable. There will be pieces that transform as we move past them. And some that we think are static and, like life itself, suddenly after some time, we noticed they've changed. The space of my dismantled installation of last year's flooded exhibit presented me with a display of light - what eped through the missing other materials when I came back to pick up my work. With that I have created another piece, as a seamless continuation of where we left off when interjected by the enormity and intricacy of life - the flood and my dad's passing.'

Ralston Fox Smith grew up in New Hampshire and attended Amherst College where he earned a bachelor's degree in fine art. He continued his art studies at the Santa Monica College of Design, Art and Architecture, studying under contemporary abstract artist Laddie John Dill, Beat Generation artist George Herms, and contemporary painter and educator Lisa Adams. This unique school, with its collaborative teaching, fueled Fox's passion for oil painting and its direct expression of self and surroundings. He is inspired by and presently lives in Asheville with his wife, two children, and large dog.

"I continue to work with colorfield and geometric abstraction that explores spatial relationships and our perception of them," he said. "Hard-edge, minimal and (mostly) continued above on next column to the right

monochromatic, these paintings are born from a constant awareness of and intrigue by simple spaces that we pass by or through on a daily basis. Rendered in an axonometric perspective, with parallel lines and no vanishing points, same-size shape repetition and tinted colors create transparent spaces for the eye/brain to contemplate. Positive and negative shapes are both separate and melded together in this work, the simple compositions belying the complex possibilities. Exploring this minimalist and ordered world is satisfying to me, especially in this day and age."

Kevin Hogan was born in Liverpool, England and came to the United States in 1965. He attended Cooper School of Art in Cleveland and Kent State University in the 1970s. During that time, he was the Gallery Director at NOVA and was instrumental in the founding of SPACES. He and his wife Jo moved to Asheville in 1979. During his time in North Carolina Hogan has shown his work in every major institution in the state. He is co-founder of Square Zero, the first arts space in Asheville's downtown arts district and Asheville Working Press, the second arts space in Asheville's River District. Hogan has a diverse artistic practice

Penland School of Crafts in Penland, NC, Offers Works That Tell Stories

"Stories we live with, construct from our past experiences, shape from our culture, and fashion from our dreams and aspirations: the story is given form by the artist." That's how Penland Gallery director Kathryn Gremley introduces the work in a remarkable new show called Retold: Chronicles and Other Stories. This exhibition presents work by five artists working in a range of media, making work that presents personal and cultural narratives. The exhibition will be on view through Sept. 17, 2022.

Jennifer Ling Datchuck works with porcelain and other materials often associated with traditional women's work, such as textiles and hair, to create sculptures that explore her layered identity, which includes being female, Chinese, and a "third culture kid." The exhibition includes two of her sculptures and a video piece.

Colette Fu's complex, oversized pop-up books combine vivid color photography and paper engineering to create complex, three-dimensional, narrative scenes. Her pieces in this show are from a series called We are Tiger Dragon People that documents the cultures of the minority tribes of Yunnan Province, China.

Karen Hampton describes her process as working from the perspective of anthropology and the study of her own genealogy. She uses textiles, dyeing processes, text, and stitching to evoke enslavement, displacement, struggle, and resilience.

Sculptor Anne Lemanski makes lifesized forms of animals and objects by creating metal armatures and covering them with paper she has printed with collage imagery. There are three of her pieces in the show with the center of the gallery occupied by her six-and-a-half-foot-tall white horse dot ted with dozens of intriguing and resonant images

Stephanie Santana is represented by two self-portraits. These are photographs of the artist screenprinted onto fabric and appliquéd onto painted and embroidered quilts. These pieces, she says, consider "the promise and the so-called limitations of Black girlhood" and also the "lasting truth of change," a concept from the writing of novelist Octavia Butler.

The work in this thought-provoking

pieces were made by pottery industries outside of North Carolina. Likely reasons for that are the larger out-of-state potteries could furnish more wares and many of those potteries used Bristol glaze, which was not favored in NC, on which blue or black stenciling was easy to read. This exhibit features only jugs and jars promoting NC businesses and towns

Presentation wares typically only have the name of the person for whom the piece was made and possibly the name of a town or a date, although some may also have the potter's mark as well. Although made relatively infrequently, Presentation wares were produced by potters across the state from the Piedmont to the Catawba Valley and Western NC. This exhibit features only those Presentation wares made in North Carolina.

Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, **Features Works by Page Laughlin**

Reynolda House Museum of American Art in Winston-Salem, NC, is presenting Page Laughlin Paper Dolls: The Labor Series, on view in the West Bedroom Gallery through Dec. 31, 2022.

The genesis of the project came to Winston-Salem-based artist Page Laughlin during contemplative walks through Reynolda House and grounds, and was inspired by the three generations of Reynolds women who created it—and by all women who carry us forward.

For the "Paper Dolls" series, Laughlin reated digital images of young engaged in traditional acts of manual labor: carrying, digging and watering. She then transformed the digital images into drawings to which she alternately added and removed oil paint, creating large, lush and layered works on paper. Laughlin prefers to work on paper, rather than canvas, and to hang the pieces in a way that they appear to float so that they, as the artist describes, "have breath behind them."

"I am interested in how we are defined by and through the 'things we carry' - the physical, psychological and social markers of who we are," said Laughlin. "I portray women in young adulthood, when we shift from being carried to having to carry. I am interested in the distance between what we pick up and what we must accomplish."

Laughlin is a project-based artist whose work spans painting, alternative media drawing, site specific and communityengagement projects. She has exhibited widely in galleries, museums and nonprofit exhibition spaces throughout the United States. Her artwork has been selected for more than 40 competitive exhibitions,

Staprans' work is considered to be in the circle of Wayne Thiebaud and Richard Diebenkorn; he was friends with both of them. Sotheby's, Bonhams and Christie's have sold his work, although recent auction records have come through California-based Clars Auction Gallery at \$147,600 on Sept. 12, 2020, and then \$187,500, June 17, 2022. Available paintings by Raimonds Staprans are very scarce.

Also still living is Ed Mell, born in 1942. He has his own gallery in Phoenix, AZ, with his work gaining popularity sharply in recent years, leaving almost no inventory of his original paintings for sale. Surprisingly, the two art auction majors, Christie's and Sotheby's, have yet to bring his work to auction, but since his auction results have recently exceeded \$100,000, that may be simply a matter of time. His Shadowed Walls, measuring 40" x 78", is available through Sunset River Gallery. It is a striking showpiece of 20th century American art.

Angel Botello is represented with two charming pieces Reclining Girl, 35 7/8" x 48" and Niño con Caballito, 24" x 30" in the Sunset River collection. Born in 1913 in Puerto Rico, he essentially began as a street artist. His work is so unique and appealing that his fame grew during his lifetime such that resales at various auctions quickly outpaced his original art prices. He was both a painter and a sculptor. Botello's work is often sold at Sotheby's and Christie's, His auction maximum was achieved at Christie's in 2007 for Nina Durmiendo at \$397.000.

Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, Offers Works by Sue Sneddon

The Craven Allen Gallery in Durham NC, will present A Life of Seeing: Sue Sneddon, a retrospective exhibition of works by the late Sus Sneddon (1953-2022), on view from Sept. 17 through Oct. 29, 2022. A reception will be held on Sept. 17, from 5-7pm.

Sue Sneddon was one of Craven Allen Gallery's most popular artists, with 14 shows over 25 years. Her fifteenth show of original work was in the planning stages when she passed away unexpectedly of cancer in January of this year.

A Life of Seeing features works from throughout Sneddon's decades-long career, including works for sale. Collectors are generously sharing special artworks for this retrospective, along with stories and memories of Sneddon.

Sneddon's land- and seascapes convey the quiet grandeur of the natural world in paintings ranging from intimate pastels to large oils on canvas. In her words, "Sometimes the smallest landscape can evoke the arger setting, the feeling of the expan siveness of the environment. The whorl of a shell, a hurricane, a galaxy - how similar these shapes are. How odd, I've always thought, are the square and rectangular borders placed on two-dimensional art. There are choices to be made on how to convey the reverence and emotion inside these boundaries."

Sneddon's passion was coastal North Carolina, and she was known for her unusual perspectives, as in the oil Should *I Be Out Here?* from 1995. A wave dominates all but a small corner in the upper left of the painting, where the sky is glimpsed, giving the viewer a visceral sense of the ocean's power.

Sneddon grew up in Pennsylvania, and moved to Durham in 1976. She exhibited widely; her work is in numerous public and private collections. In 2003, she fulfilled another goal, building a home and studio in Shallotte, NC. Sneddon is featured in Liza Roberts' forthcoming book about North Carolina artists, Art of the State.

dorn, owner of Craven Allen Gallery:

"Sue Sneddon was a wonderful artist and great friend. We hosted 14 exhibitions of her work over the course of 25 years, and the last time we spoke she was telling me some of her ideas for the next one. It was early in December (2021), and I don't think either one of us imagined that it was the last time we would see each other. It's a painful loss that all of us here are still grappling with."

e considered the gallery space a second home. A week before an opening, she would set up camp downstairs, working on pieces, hosting friends who occasionally came by, listening to Joni Mitchell. We would spend hours together hanging and lighting the show. I'd get frustrated when things weren't ready as soon as I wanted them, but we were both passionate about the work and the way it was presented, and the installation process was important to both of us. We both wanted people to experience the show in a certain way. We could tell each other years later where we hung certain paintings, and why. It was a privilege to spend that kind of time with her, learning about each piece. There was always lots of laughter. and often a few tears."

"Openings were exciting, with big crowds of people, and friends bringing flowers," adds Bloedorn. "Later, Sue would host private gatherings and play music with friends in the gallery during the course of a show. And lots of people came back after the opening to see this



quiet, intimate work when they could spend time with it alone."

"She forever changed the way I see the world and experience nature. Especially at the coast, I am constantly seeing the world [the] way Sue taught me to see it. I am so grateful to be sharing Sue's work again in the gallery for this retrospective. Love you, Sue.'

The following is a statement from Sus Sneddon about her own work.

"I grew up in the beauty of the Allegheny Mountains and Laurel Highlands area of western Pennsylvania, in a family where creativity was highly valued. One of my first memories of drawing was trying to figure out how a dandelion flower turned into a ball of small seeds with fluffy tops that could be carried by the wind. I was probably five at the time, and at that early age I was drawing what was in front of me - bugs, flowers, clouds, trees - realistically, so I could attempt to understand how nature worked."

"My mother and three aunts were all artists, and my father was trained as a classical violinist, but became a jazz enthusiast, along with my mother. My fascination with Carolina landscapes began on childhood vacations to Southern beaches."

"I had my first thought of really being a painter when I was 13 or 14. My mother and I were discussing whether the pink in a bank of oyster shells was a reflection of the pink sky or in the shells themselves. We were on the south end of Pawleys Island, SC, witnessing a glorious sunset. I said to myself, 'if I could paint the joy I feel in this moment, then I could be a painter."

"Most of my work, as it turns out, is exactly that - fleeting moments of light in the sky, on water, or on wet sand. And there's no place I've experienced this in a more compelling way than at my beloved Emerald Isle. These moments do something to me that I can only express by trying to capture them on paper or canvas. I like to approach a subject realistically at first, so that it gets filed in my brain somewhere, to be called on when I want to express how I feel about the moment of a sighting that has moved me."

"I live for these moments of joy and wonder and reverence. Whether or not there is a human figure in the work I create, I may also be influenced by a conversation, visit, walk, or relationship associated with a particular moment I am trying to capture. And although water-related subjects are the ones I most frequently choose, there are other landscapes that I have painted over the years, particularly rural settings of trees, fields, and aging barns and houses.

"Mixing a palette of colors for an oil painting is very intense for me. This ritual signifies the commitment of many days, weeks, or months of painting to capture this one moment. The application of a medium onto a surface can transport me to that first inspiration. I may hear the water, wind, birds, or a song I was humming. My senses are filled as if I were witnessing it for the first time."

"I work from memory. My memory is sometimes sparked by the notes and sketchbooks that are filled with these moments that I don't want to forget. There are a lot of notes and sketchbooks. Sometimes I do see something and immediately paint it. But there can also be a long process of distilling an experience to its essential elements and then working to capture those in my work."

"Oil, pastel, acrylic, pencil, gouache, watercolor, oil pastel, pen and ink, and mixed media all have a station in my studio. I like to have options in my choice of medium, and also in the music that accompanies my workday. My tastes there are eclectic, as well, ranging from jazz to rock-and-roll, to classical, to folk and other genres. All of my artwork seems to have a soundtrack."

"I am fortunate to have a studio that gives me access to my main sources of inspiration and allows me to mark my time by sunsets, tides, moon phases, solstices, and equinoxes. My studio looks out onto the marshes of a tidal river, the Shallotte River. A short drive takes me over a bridge to the Atlantic Ocean, as at Emerald Isle. It's the place I feel most alive - where that powerful body of water meets the soft sand, with the ever-changing play of light on water. I am so very thankful."

Sound in such a way that the sun rises over the Atlantic and sets over the Sound. While I had not planned to do so, I realized after I had finished a few paintings that I seemed to be concentrating on those specific times of day. I decided, therefore, to see how many ways I could paint them that captured the ephemeral nature of light at those precious times, and was not cliché'

Due to the pandemic as well as several surgeries, glass artist Pringle Teetor had been out of the studio for almost two years. "Finally back in the studio in mid-November, my muscle memory was gone, and my body didn't move the same. I felt lost, with no creativity and was very close to giving up, but instead I reflected on past work to motivate and rekindle my creative energy.

My new work feels like finally coming home from a difficult journey. I love combining many colors to create a "painting" in glass. It's difficult because colors never heat equally. I hadn't used copper wire forms in 15 years. Blowing molten material into something so restrictive makes beautiful organic and abstract vessels. I love chemistry in glass that work together to create new colors. Glass is liquid, strong, delicate, unforgiving and mesmerizing. It is a dance of fire, fluidity, motion and color.

Photographer Eric Saunders says that for outdoor photographers the most magical time is early morning or late afternoon when the light is best, or a time of unusual weather, such as fog, storm, or ice and snow. "When I photograph images, I am inspired by unusual abstract patterns of light, color, and tone, which are found in nature and in human artifact, in times of unusual light. I then try to visualize these patterns into artistic compositions, which follow certain rules so that the resulting image is accessible and compelling to the viewer."

Saunders uses camera settings and computer software to "polish the picture" before



Gately (1946 -2021), and feature a selection of paintings, mixed media assemblage, and works on paper created in the 50-year period approximately between 1970 and 2020. Gately was best known locally as the C.B. & Marlene Asking Professor of Art, and Coordinator of Visual Arts Programs at Francis Marion University, where he taught for 48 years. He received his MFA degree from Florida State University. Although an accomplished realist artist, the overall corpus of Gately's work can be described as formal abstraction, emphasizing foundational principals and elements to achieve modernist compositions. He was the subject of over twenty solo exhibitions during his lifetime. His work is represented in the collections of the Gibbes Arts Gallery, Charleston; The Columbia Museum of Art, Columbia; the State Art Collection of South Carolina; and various other public and private collections. 

The simple flattened forms create a canvas, a front and a back, where I can fully express my intentions. All of these techniques come together to give the pieces a raw complexity, conjuring explorations of our memories," said Spake. 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

From crocks, jars, and jugs to pitchers, candleholders, and vases, "turning pots" is one of the oldest and richest craft traditions in North Carolina. For more than 200 vears, members of the Cole family have been potting in central North Carolina - Randolph, Moore, Lee, and Montgomery counties. Six generations of Coles, and no fewer than 18 individuals, are represented in The Mint Museum's permanent collection. More than 60 highlights of their wares are included in the installation "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters". One reason for its long-term success is that making pottery has so often been a family tradition in the state. Fathers taught the art of forming, glazing, and firing clay objects to their sons, and in later generations also to daughters, who in turn taught their children, and so on through the decades. These family dynasties not only helped to keep the potting craft alive, but ensured continuity in techniques and craftsmanship, as well as introduced artistic innovations in succeeding generations. "The Cole Family: A Dynasty of North Carolina Potters" presents a visual history of "turned pots" and the family that helped turn North Carolina into one of America's centers for hand made, traditional pottery. Through Dec. 11 -"Diedrick Brackens: ark of bulrushes". This exhibition presents a new series by Los Angeles-based artist Diedrick Brackens including large-scale (8-feet) weavings and premiering the artist's first woven sculptures. Known for making colorful textiles about African American and queer histories. Brackens has developed a process of combining the tactility of yarn with the ethos of storytelling. For this exhibition, the artworks tell timeless narratives about emancipation and remediation through pattern, body, and the power of craft. Bridges and Levine Galleries, Ongoing - "Contemporary British Studio Ceramics: The Grainer Collection". Focused on the collection of Diane and Marc Grainer, this installation is a survey of contemporary British studio ceramics. Comprising functional and sculptural objects made between the 1980s and today, the show features work by artists either born or residing in Great Britain, including established "contemporary classics" like Gordon Baldwin and Rupert Spira, and cutting-edge ceramicists such as Julian Stair and Kate Malone. Several recently-gifted works from the Grainers are included. Alexander, Spangler, and Harris Galleries, Ongoing - "Portals to the Past: British Ceramics 1675 - 1825". The Mint Museum's collection of eighteenth-century British pottery and porcelain is widely respected for its scope and quality. The collection numbers over 2,000 objects and includes important examples of both salt-glazed and drvbodied stoneware from Staffordshire; tin-glazed earthenware from Bristol, Liverpool, and London: and cream-colored earthenware from Derbyshire, Staffordshire, and Yorkshire, Notable eighteenth-century porcelain factories represented include Chelsea, Bow, and Vauxhall in London. Longton Hall in Staffordshire, Worcester, Bristol, and others. Individual works in the collection are exceptional because of their rarity, craftsmanship, provenance, or as representative examples of particular types or methods of production or decoration. Ongoing - "American Glass". The nineteenth and early twentieth centuries represented a time of extraordinary growth for the American glass industry. Such companies as Boston & Sandwich Glass Company in Sandwich, MA; Steuben Glass Works in Corning, NY: and Libbey Glass Company in Toledo, OH, began operation and soon developed notable reputations for producing fashionable wares that were coveted by many middle- and upper-class consumers. "American Glass" showcases objects by these and other American glass companies, illustrating the variety of forms and styles that prevailed during this period. Glass-manufacturing techniques will be another focus of the exhibition, with representative examples of pressed, cut, blown, and molded glass. Nearly all of the works on view are from The Mint Museum's permanent collection of glass, which is second in size only to the ceramics collection in the museum's Decorative Arts holdings. Although works from the collection can be found on loan to museums across the country, this exhibition marks the first time works from the collection have been brought together to be viewed together in one exhibition. American Made will include more than 100 highlights of the foundation's paintings and sculptures. Through Mar. 2023 - "Rendezvous With Rothko". For the first time in its 85-year history, The Mint Museum has not one, but two, Mark Rothko paintings on view. Through a long-term loan with the National Gallery of Art in Washington, DC, two paintings by the Abstract Expressionist painter Mark Rothko are on view in the Modern Contemporary galleries at Mint Museum Uptown. The two works - "No. 17 [or] No. 15" and "Untitled 1951" - are the only paintings by Rothko currently on view in North Carolina. An extensive exhibit of artifacts and photos is enhanced with computer-generated holograms and other imagery, sound, and special effects that leave a lasting and haunting impression on the visitor. The museum gift shop is rich in Cherokee tradition. Locally created baskets, pottery, wood carvings, decorated gourds and beadwork are among the art available for sale. 
