cesses but also with substrates for constructing her visual scenarios.

Best Practices is a collection of images that presents a sampling of the many ambiguities of her processes, explorations, and thus her paintings. She cites "Science, literary conventions, color perception charts, Abstract Expressionism and Op Art" as inspirations. Through her accessible vocabulary of shapes, she renders a concentrated visual schema of the passage of time and the evolution of color through layering. She leaves no requisite visual entry or path into her works. She affords the viewer freedom to dive into the middle and bathe in the luscious colors or just hesitantly step in at a corner or edge before making the leap.

Williams received her MFA in painting from Kent State University in 1996 and her BA in studio art from the University of Toledo in 1992. Williams was awarded a Pollock-Krasner Foundation Grant in 2011, two Metropolitan Arts Council Grants in 2007 and 2011, the Ohio Arts Council Individual Artist Fellowship in 2002, the Columbus Museum of Art Purchase Award in 2000, the Hall Memorial Award of Painting, Ohio Art League, 2000, and the Carnegie Museum of Art and Associate Artists of Pittsburgh Milone Painting Award in 1997.

In addition, Williams's work is included in the Columbus Museum of Art, OH,

the Morris Museum of Augusta, GA, the Johnson Collection of Spartanburg, SC, the Contemporary Carolina Collection at the Medical University of SC, and the Cleveland Clinic Foundation, OH. She is currently a Professor at Greenville Technical College teaching drawing, painting and printmaking.

lucky. On the Sunday afternoon of my seventh week out of work, I found a canvas with a not-so-pretty floral painting on it. I removed the painting, cut out a photograph from a magazine, sketched it and began to paint. I finished it around midnight and was pleasantly shocked.

"That particular Sunday, I found a song that makes my heart truly sing. I can't stop."

Grubbs adds, "I think that a lot of people possess the ability to be creative, but the realization of it never comes because they never try to give it a chance. I had no clue about myself. What true joy I have found." His works in the exhibit "have been created full of love, heart and soul. It is without a doubt an extension of me totally."

James Allen Bolt says the past two-anda-half years working for Prisma Health as a respiratory therapist during the pandemic "have been the most stressful of my entire career dealing with the COVID 19 virus and its aftermath. A stressful and mostly very sad time. My saving grace was being able to create things that made me and others smile."

The Laurens County, SC, native took inspiration for his creations from his father, who passed away four years ago. "When I was growing up, both my mom and my dad worked full-time jobs. However, with three children, there always seemed to be a need for extra money. My father was a jack of all trades and had spent some time working in carpentry. He began to make wooden toys, my mom would paint them, and they would take them to festivals all over Virginia, North and South Carolina and Georgia. I would say 80 percent of the time they would

"I enjoyed helping them and I began making things from scrap wood and other items I found along the way," he recalls. "I went to festivals with them, seeing other people like us and seeing different artists opening my eyes to different ideas. We always had a great time. Since then, it has been a mission that I thoroughly enjoy, in making something interesting out of whatever I can find. Hence, I find myself picking up wood on the side of the road, and searching through junk shops, flea markets and yard sales for any useful items."

Artists Collective | Spartanburg in Spartanburg, SC, Features Works by Beth Regula

The Artists Collective | Spartanburg in Spartanburg, SC, will present It Begins with a Sketch, on view in Gallery II, from Sept. 6 through Oct. 1, 2022. An artist's talk is scheduled for Sept. 15 during the Spartanburg ArtWalk.

The exhibition consists of more than a dozen free-standing sculptures and relief wall hangings. Each of the small works will be accompanied by the sketches from which they originated.

"This exhibit is about recording life experiences, historical moments, random thoughts, joy and anger in quick sketches," says Regula, chair of the management board of ACS. "As I go through each day, I am onstantly sketching. Many times, the sketches are executed while listening to TV, sitting in traffic, attending meetings or during moments of relaxing at home. There really is no conscious effort to draw a particular thing. I let my hand show me what has been going on in my mind. I draw on anything at hand. Knowing that some of these sketches may be used in more formal creative efforts, I save the ones that 'speak' to me and collect them in my studio."

Regula says the sketches are her "starting place" when she is in the studio. "As I begin working with the sketch as my guide. I use various mediums. During this process the materials used also help me develop the sketch into a more intricate design. Details are added, and I begin to see what was really in my thoughts as I drew the sketch."

Preparing for the upcoming exhibit, she culled through the sketches and picked a group she thought would best represent her thoughts during the past few months. "The thoughts are political, whimsical, love of nature, love of family and feelings of despair. Pretty much a record of my thoughts over the summer of 2022."

"I want people to know that art comes from inside," she adds. "Thoughts, emotions, are expressed through art: my therapy for surviving the times in which I am living. My personal reaction to what is happening around me.'

"I looked around the studio and saw a stack of sketches that I have collected," she continues. "When I go to the studio to work on a new body of work, I sort through the sketches that I do on a daily basis to get an idea of what I want a new body of work to look like. They are the beginning of the work, thus the title It Begins with a Sketch"

Regula notes that some of the works are "political" in nature. "I care about the struggles our country is facing. I care about women's rights. I care about nature and global warming. If a visitor does not agree with me, that is fine. Just maybe, though, I

Spartanburg artist Tad Grubbs struggled with health issues nearly two decades ago, and fellow artist James Allen Bolt has dealt with the stress and sadness of the COVID pandemic over the past two years as a healthcare worker. Both have used those trials to create their art, which they will present in an exhibition.

The exhibition will include 20 works by Grubbs in acrylics on canvas and 25 works by Bolt of mixed media of reclaimed lumber and found objects. The works will be offered for sale with prices ranging from

\$75 to \$2,800.

A health scare 17 years ago surprisingly led to Grubbs, a Spartanburg native, discovering his talent and love of creating art. "Then, I had an intraventricular hemorrhage in my brain," he explains. "After 11 days in intensive care I left the hospital with no physical or mental issues. I was extremely
