Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, NC, Offers Exhibit Focused on Seating

Mint Museum Uptown in Charlotte, NC, will present *The Art of Seating: 200 Years of American Design*, on view from Sept. 16 through Feb. 25, 2024.

The exhibition, drawn from the rich holdings of the Thomas H. and Diane De-Mell Jacobsen Ph.D. Foundation, provides a rare opportunity to survey the history of American craftsmanship and ingenuity, seen through the lens of seating furniture. Featuring many of the most iconic designs and designers from the past two centuries, The Art of Seating encourages visitors to reconsider objects that are a ubiquitous and often overlooked part of our everyday lives, seeing chairs as not just functional objects, but as works of art in their own right. At the same time, the objects in the exhibition also have stories to tell about the history of our country, ranging from the contributions of immigrants to changing tastes in style and aesthetics to new innovations in technology and materials.

More than forty examples of seating furniture from the Thomas H. and Diane DeMell Jacobsen Ph.D. Foundation are included in the exhibition and offer a stylistic journey from the early 1800s to the twenty-first century. Noted makers and designers include John Henry Belter, George Hunzinger, the Herter Brothers, the Stick-

The exhibition also features contemporary and historic designs by some of the biggest manufacturers to commission these pieces, such as Knoll, Herman Miller and Steelcase.

The exhibition was originally developed by the Museum of Contemporary Art Jacksonville and then toured to more than two dozen museums by International Arts & Artists, Washington, DC. It will be accompanied by a fully illustrated catalogue of the collection, produced by The Thomas H. and Diane DeMell Jacobsen Ph.D. Foundation and D. Giles Ltd. The installation will also include a video in which Dr. Jacobsen discusses the collection

Mint Museum Randolph in Charlotte, NC, Features Works by Walter Scott Lenox

Mint Museum Randolph in Charlotte, NC, will present *Walter Scott Lenox & American Belleek*, on view from Sept. 16 through Jan. 21, 2024.

Featuring 80 works from the Mint's permanent collection, as well as other notable public and private collections, this exhibition focuses solely on the earliest decades of American Belleek production and the role Walter Scott Lenox played in its development as an art form.

Curated by Brian Gallagher, the Mint's senior curator of decorative arts, The Mint Museum is the exhibition's only venue.

In 1857, McBirney and Company in the village of Belleek in County Fermanagh, Northern Ireland, began producing a new type of porcelain renowned for its light, delicately thin, ivory-colored body. Named for the town in which it was created, Belleek porcelain quickly became

prized among discerning customers in the British Isles. As its popularity then spread across the Atlantic, several American ceramic manufactories in Trenton, New Jersey, sought to make their own version of Belleek.

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In 1882, Ott and Brewer became the first to succeed. The factory's efforts were spearheaded by three men: John Hart Brewer, the factory's forward-thinking entrepreneur; William Bromley, Sr., the former supervisor at McBirney and Company and the expert on Belleek manufacture; and Walter Scott Lenox, the creative force behind Ott and Brewer's highly fashionable Belleek products.

In 1884, Lenox left Ott and Brewer to join Willets Manufacturing Company, where he supervised the firm's decorating department. Five years later, Lenox left Willets to establish his own firm, Ceramic Art Company (later renamed Lenox, Incorporated). Under Lenox's artistic supervision, all three firms - Ott and Brewer, Willets Manufacturing Company, and Ceramic Art Company - became renowned for the superb quality of their Belleek porcelain. Their products were prized by affluent customers and luxury retailers alike. Among the latter were Tiffany Company in New York, Bailey, Banks and Biddle in Philadelphia, and Marshall Field

Bechtler Museum of Modern Art in Charlotte, NC, Offers New Exhibits

Bechtler Museum of Modern Art in Charlotte, NC, is presenting new exhibitions including:

Art of Another Kind: Selections of Art Informel, is on view in the Museum's Second Floor Gallery, through Nov. 26, 2023.

Art Informel is a radical approach to abstraction that emerged in Europe in the years following World War II. In response to the horrors of the war, many artists rejected what they believed was realism's susceptibility to nationalistic narratives, and sought to develop a universal visual language that communicated freedom, individual expression, and inner states of being.

Championing this new artistic tendency, in 1952 the French curator and art critic Michel Tapié organized the groundbreaking exhibition *Un Art Autre* - or Art of Another Kind - and published an accompanying

catalogue, in which he coined the term "Art Informel." Based on the French word informe, meaning "unformed" or "formless," Art Informel renounced traditional rules of representation and instead emphasized bold, gestural marks that conveyed vitality, emotion, and spontaneity.
