## Doug Dotson Pottery in Pittsboro, NC, Offers The Mockernut Show on Sept. 30 & Oct. 1, 2023

Doug Dotson Pottery in Pittsboro, NC, is hosting *The Mockernut Show*, a multimedia show, in its 17th year of showcasing the two curators work, Doug Dotson and Ronan Peterson, as well as the work of invited artists who focus on metals, paintings, prints, and sometimes on ceramics. The show takes place on Sept. 30 and Oct. 1, 2023, from 10am-4pm both days.

Doug Dotson will have his earthy, functional soda fired stoneware pottery, while Ronan Peterson will have a healthy offering of his extremely decorated functional earthenware vessels. Invited artists include Kate Parrent, and Roberta Marasca.

Kate Parrent will display her drawn on stones from the coast of Maine, a motley crew of characters and critters from Kate's own imagination, with Roberta Marasca showcasing her thoughtful and exquisite jewelry of various metals and stones.

Dotson has been working in clay for decades, and built his studio and soda kiln around 2000. Making pots along with working at SAS in the Research Triangle Park for many years, Dotson established a loyal local following attracted to his atmospheric fired stoneware pottery. Retired recently from his programming job, he is focusing on continuing the development of new forms, glazes and surfaces to add to his already exciting array of functional pottery.

Ronan Peterson has been in the Triangle area for 20 years and maintains Nine Toes Pottery in Chapel Hill, NC. Peterson's primary focus for the past few decades has been working with bright and vibrant colored glazes to complement his decora-

tive approaches to earthenware pottery. Recently, he has begun to explore more surfaces with both low fire and high fire soda kiln firings.

Kate Parrent is a recent retiree from Mc-Dougle Middle School in Chapel Hill, NC, teaching and inspiring hundreds of students during her tenure as a middle school art teacher. For years, Parrent has an annual Summer trip to Maine, in which she gathers smooth, round, ovoid and abstract beach stones to bring back to NC to adorn with her pencil drawings. Each stone necessitates a different character to fill out the canvas, and Parrent's imagination brings forth an ever changing crew of characters and critters on her stony surfaces.

Roberta Marasca is a very active jeweler/ metalsmith in Orange County, NC. Maintaining a hearty local showing, she also teaches classes and has a robust commission schedule that keeps her busy. All her rings, earrings, pendants, etc are made with many historical and physical properties in mind, making each finished piece an exercise in design, concept and cultural relevance. Many folks love Marasca's jewelry, and connect with all of the knowledge and experience that she puts into each finished work.

## Craven Allen Gallery in Durham, NC, Features Works by Clarence Heyward, William Paul Thomas, Charles Edward Williams

The Craven Allen Gallery House of Frames in Durham, NC, will present *TRIPLE THREAT: New Paintings*, featuring works by Clarence Heyward, William Paul Thomas, and Charles Edward Williams, curated by Beverly McIver, on view from Sept. 9 through Oct. 28, 2023. A reception will be held on Sept. 9, from 5-7pm.

To call Clarence Heyward, William Paul Thomas and Charles Edward Williams emerging artists would be disingenuous. The three of them have seen tremendous success over the last several years; each has had museum shows, and their works are in significant public and private collections. But they are young and at the forefront of a new generation of Black painters in North Carolina, following in the footsteps of luminaries like Ernie Barnes and Beverly McIver. In fact, McIver, who strives to, as she says, "reach out to help bring others to the table," is guest curator for *TRIPLE THREAT*.

All three painters were featured in Reckoning & Resilience, the Nasher Museum's most recent survey of the best North Carolina artists working today.
