Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, Offers A New Exhibit

Hillsborough Gallery of Arts in Hillsborough, NC, will present Reciprocus, featuring works by Ellie Reinhold, Pat Merriman and Lynn Wartski, on view from Sept. 26 through Oct. 22, 2023. A reception will be held on Sept. 29, from 6-9pm.

Says painter Ellie Reinhold, "Our exhibit title takes a step back, etymologically speaking, from the idea of give and take, of reciprocity. Reciprocus is Latin for reciprocal. My title piece takes a slight twist on our theme, edging give and take towards having and losing. The little structure in the woods that has been skulking around in my paintings for the past few years is still present, here deployed to explore loss and the ways of memory... how memory comes to us in bits and pieces, in glimmers, at unexpected times. How it tinges our moods like dreams, leaving warm or blue notes upon us. How it can overwhelm and sometimes feel surreal, like a waking dream or a fairy tale. How we sometimes wish memory would simply free us, and at other times want it to literally take hold, and never let us go.

Painter Pat Merriman returns to the subject matter she loves most - the landscape of North Carolina and the poetry of Mary Oliver. In addition, She has begun experimenting with new techniques using acrylic mediums to produce feminist collages and painting with environmental themes.

Sculptor Lynn Wartski's year began with a piece that featured a young emperor penguin asking his father "So Many Questions." A pair of dancing rabbits titled, "Rabbit Games and Midnight Rainbows", emerged next for a show based on poetry. "These two sculptures started to inform the new designs I found myself sketching"

says Wartski, "and included either multiple animals, or solitary figures that engage in a more direct back-and-forth with the viewer." Wartski's sculptures are more than interesting characters, they each tell a story. "I want to have their personality or humor emerge through expression and gesture, in addition to their costumes." The sculptures are needle felted wool over an armature form of wire, and batting. Some include stuffing pellets to provide volume or ballast. A few of the pieces include hand embroidery or hand-applied elements like beading, sequins, or fabrics as embellishments.

Additionally, Wartski has started to produce gel plate mono-prints. These one-of-akind original works are acrylic on paper. "I first started to explore this media as a way to share images of my sculptures that would be more interesting than photos. Gel plate printing is a method to produce prints that include photo-transfer images. In addition to images that feature my sculptures, I started to play with botanical prints using flowers and leaves from my garden, and are composed with the botanical material on the plate."

The Hillsborough Gallery of Arts is owned and operated by 21 local artists exhibiting contemporary fine art and fine craft. The Gallery's offerings include oil, acrylic and watercolor paintings, metal sculpture, figurative sculpture, ceramics, photography, montage, digital art, mixed media, jewelry, glass, and handcrafted furniture.

important in the history of American glass art. Several artists of the Studio Glass Movement came to the region, including its founder Harvey K. Littleton. Begun in 1962 in Wisconsin, it was a student of Littleton's that first came to the area in 1965 and set up a glass studio at the Penland School of Craft in Penland, NC. By 1967, Mark Peiser was the first glass artist resident at the school and taught many notable artists, like Jak Brewer in 1968 and Richard Ritter who came to study in 1971. By 1977, Littleton retired from teaching and moved to nearby Spruce Pine, NC, and set up a glass studio at his home. Since that time, glass artists like Ken Carder, Rick and Valerie Beck, Shane Fero, and Yaffa Sikorsky and Jeff Todd - to name only a few - have flocked to the area to reside, collaborate, and teach, making it a significant place for experimentation and education in glass. Reform to Restoration: French Drawings from Louis XVI to Louis XVIII (1770-1830) presents over eighty master drawings from The Horvitz Collection, the preeminent private collection of French art in the United States, and showcases some of the most well-known artists of the period, including Jacques-Louis David, Jean-Auguste-Dominique Ingres, and Pierre-Paul Prud'hon.
